At The School Board Meeting

The Board of Education unanimously ratified a Memorandum of Agreement with the Hicksville Congress of Teachers at the School Board meeting on October 21. The two year contract provides for salary increases of 8% across-the-board and includes a retirement incentive. However, the Hicksville secretaries, who have been negotiating for 20 months, still do not have a contract.

Representatives of the Secretaries' Union, Adrienne Mayer and Betty Zagajski, appeared before the Board, seeking a decision on a proposal they submitted to President John Ayres at a special meeting on Sunday. Board Vice President Virginia Germer and member Frank Grimmer protested strongly because they were not notified about the meeting. An Executive Session was called before adjournment and it was announced the Board and the secretaries will hold public negotiations on October 29 at 8 p.m. in the Little Theatre of the High School.

Superintendent Wilber D. Hawkins asked the Board to approve the combination of the positions of Director of

Personnel and Director of Pupil Personnel. He recommended Mr. Ronald Friedman, present Director of Personnel, for the newly created position at a salary of \$40,000. The Board approved his appointment. They also approved the appointment of Walter Olsewski as Girls' Varsity Swimming Coach and recalled to tenured service Richard Susser, replacing Myron Lessie as an Industrial Arts teacher, whose retirement was accepted.

Also approved was an increase in the rate of compensation of substitute teachers to \$38 per day and addition of four hall monitor positions at the Junior High School.

Dr. Hawkins reported that Saturday, October 24 is the Homecoming Football game and encouraged everyone to come out to the High School Field to watch Hicksville vs. Massapequa at 1:30 p.m. preceded by a parade at 12 o'clock. Dr. Hawkins also reported that November 3 is Superintendent Conference Day and there will be no school for the students.

Dr. Catherine J. Fenton gave a presentation of the academic profile of Hicks-

ville students grades 3 thru 8 based on the Iowa Test of Basic Skills. Hicksville students do better than 80% of the country at all grade levels in a national comparison. Against high socioeconomic districts, Hicksville matches or does better than 50% at most grade levels. The districts' performance is better in math than in reading and verbal ability. Because of this profile, programs were analyzed and adaptations have been made to assist the children; for example, the Intermediate grades 4-6 Gifted and Talented program which begins in November. Charlene Anci announced the first meeting of the Committee for the Gifted and Talented will be on Wed., October 28 in the Administration Building Board Room. This meeting is open to everyone in the district.

The Board approved recommended action with regard to deletion of policies regarding Health Service Rate, School Hours, and School Doctors Rate of Pay at Home Football games. It amended policies regarding minutes of public meetings and free lunch programs authorizing the principal of

each school to make the determination as to which children are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

The Board approved the recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped pertaining to placement of students and awarded bids for athletic supplies, magazines and periodicals, and library supplies. Claims and Warrants were also approved.

Several citizens spoke before the Board, including former member William Bennett. "We have been losing 7.6% to 8.9% in enrollment. In 1976 we had 8,500 students, now there are 6,000," he noted.

Arlene Rudin questioned if the Board was going to have a policy regarding requirements for High School graduation. President Ayres told her they are awaiting a recommendation from Administration. It was noted that there is an Administration guideline citing 18 credits as the minimum for a diploma and 16 credits for ROCES students.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Education will be on November 4 at 8:15 p.m. in the Administration Board Room.

Arson Keeping Hicksville Vamps Busy

During the past few weeks, arson caused fires have accounted for most of Hicksville's serious fires. Tuesday, Oct. 13, unknown persons threw a fire bomb at the old Hicksville School District Administration Building on Newbridge Rd. behind the Sr. High School. Quick action by neighbors enabled the fire fighters to confine the blaze to the point of origin. Vamps, under Asst. Chief Magee and Schuckmann were on the scene for over two hours using 6 pieces

of apparatus overhauling fire in the walls and basement ceiling. County Fire Marshals and the Police Arson Squad responded. The alarm came in at 9:32 p.m.

A month earlier, a 50 foot high structure behind the grandstand and about 10 yards from the old Administration Building was torched. That structure was destroyed. Almost a year ago, the same structure was destroyed.

On Thursday, Oct. 15, at 8:06 p.m., a vacant 2 1/2 story dwelling on Rail Road Lane, off Old Country Rd. was torched. The building was fully involved as nearby Vamps arrived. Several buildings next to the fire building were protected, as other Vamps set up heavy stream operations using deck guns and the Department's 5 in. hose system to douse the blaze. Operations were under Chief Rich

Kershaw and his three assistants. The Plainview Fire Dept. supplied one engine to stand by at Hicksville's Headquarters.

Early Sat. morning (2:40 a.m.), Oct. 17, a car, on Frank Rd. in the industrial section off Duffy Ave. was torched. The 1981 vehicle belonged to the American Permag Co. of 200 Frank Rd. The car was a total loss. Fire Marshals are investigating.

On Tues., Oct. 20, shortly before 1:09 a.m., person or persons unknown broke into a trailer truck at the Agway Petro. Co. at 351 Duffy Ave., Hicksville, punctured 27 cases of motor oil and set fire to it. The trailer was parked next to the office and bulk oil and gas storage platforms, and also several tank trucks. A roving police ambulance driven by P.O. J. Rochford spotted a liquid running down the apron into the street. Upon investigation,

he found the fire and quickly altered Hicksville Vamps. Six pieces of apparatus, under Chief Rich Kershaw responded.

Kershaw credited Rochford in helping prevent a major fire at the installation. Had it gone undetected any longer, the entire area would have went up in flames. The County Fire Marshal's office sent an investigator to the scene.

The Duffy Ave. area has been hard hit by arson this past year. Railroad box cars were torched, parked trailer trucks and rubbish have been set afire. Fire and Police officials urge anyone in the area to call Police at once if they notice anything suspicious.

There were 109 alarms during the month of Sept. 1981. The breakdown for the Hicksville alarms are: 51 fire alarms; 51 rescue calls; 7 malicious false alarms.

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Nassau County American Legion Legislative Breakfast

Nassau County AL Commander Ed Smith opened the Annual American Legion Legislative Breakfast held in Massapequa on October 4th, chaired by PNCC Jack Bland. Chairman Bland outlined the ten objectives of the 1981-82 Legion program; namely: seeking passage of legislation regarding the following subjects - payment of a bonus to Korean and Vietnam veterans, amending Section 458 of the Real Property Tax Law in order to preserve veterans' real property tax exemption on a percentage basis if assessment changes; the obtaining of prior service pension credit for war and conflict service to all war veterans in all retirement systems in NYS; establishing a permanent standing committee on Veterans' Affairs in both houses of the NYS Legislature; mandating the death penalty be administered upon those persons found guilty of committing felonious crimes previously covered by the death penalty statute; requiring a course on American History and Government be a mandated requirement for graduation from any public or private high school under the jurisdiction of the NYS Board of Regents; restoring Civil Service Preference to Veterans in reduction or abolition of jobs (amend Article 6, Section 85); establishing a home for veterans on Long Island, requiring the State of New York to use the date established by the Federal Government with respect to the closing date of the Vietnam War and to oppose any attempt to delete or amend Article 17, Section 357 which relates to the County Veterans Service Agencies.

Among the distinguished legislators present were: Congressman Norman Lent, Raymond McGrath, John LeBoutillier and Greg Carman; Assemblymen Philip Healy, Fred Parola and Angelo Orazio; Town Representatives: TOH Presiding Supervisor Thomas Gulotta and Town Clerk Daniel Fisher; Councilman Richard Guardino; Oyster Bay Presiding Supervisor Joseph Colby and Councilman Douglas Hynes; and Councilman John DaVanzo from the Town of North Hempstead.

Each of the legislators gave his discourse and the floor was opened for questions. Congressman Lent discussed in depth the Triad Principal regarding the three basic weapon systems and stated that he introduced a resolution regarding drug traffic aimed at letting countries know that foreign aid may be withdrawn if drug trafficking persists. He also stated that he thought Universal Military Training was desirable in order to have

Also present is County Commander Edgar D. Smith. The event was held at Massapequa Post # 1066.

competent officers and NCO's capable of handling our sophisticated weaponry if the recent salary increases do not produce sufficient talented volunteers.

Congressman Ray McGrath discussed the MIA's with a view towards not negotiating any trade agreements with Vietnam unless we get an accurate counting of every man lost. He advised that he was holding a Veterans' Forum on November 12th at the Inwood VFW Post with members of his staff and representatives from the Veterans Administration in attendance who will assist veterans with their

problems.

Presiding Supervisor Tom Gulotta reminded all to keep in touch with their legislators advising them of their opinions on legislation, and supporting them when they back legislative programs their constituents favor. He also advised that the Town of Hempstead for the first time has a Veterans' Advisory Committee whose purpose it is to remember the veterans and their families.

The car is one of 99 new patrol vehicles purchased by the department to replace aging automobiles. The new cars are the second generation, mid-size police vehicles which have more power, better acceleration and better gas mileage than present patrol cars operated by the department. Gasoline is one of the major operating expenses for the police department.

Free Flu Shots

County Executive Francis T. Purcell today announced a program of free flu shots to try to give senior citizens a flu-free winter.

The prevention plan, sponsored by the Nassau Departments of Health and Senior Citizens Affairs, will begin on Nov. 5 in Levittown and continue to Dec. 9 with five scheduled sessions at different locations.

"Telephone pre-registration is necessary for these flu prevention inoculations," Purcell said. "I urge everyone over 60 years of age - and others who have chronic diseases - to participate in this program."

Anyone who wishes the free flu shots should call the Senior Citizens offices in Mineola as soon as possible to register. The number is 535-4523.

The Health department will administer a trivalent vaccine, which is a combination of A/Bangkok, A/Brazil and B/Singapore, Purcell said.

"I am pleased we can offer

this program of preventive medicine for the older members of the community," Purcell said. "They are in a high risk situation and should take every precaution to avoid illness."

DEC. 3, Thursday, 10 AM to 3:30 PM, HEMPSTEAD, Briery Community Center, 65 Dartmouth Street, corner of Clinton Street.

DEC. 9, Wednesday, 10 AM to 1 PM, MINEOLA, at the Nassau Chapter of the American Red Cross, 264 Old Country Road, just west of Franklin Street.

More than 200 friends and associates of The Nassau Plan for Health Care saluted the health maintenance organization (HMO) at an "Initial Development Party" at the Salisbury Inn in Eisenhower Park. The celebration marked the grant to the HMO of \$1,450,000 in Initial Development funds by the Department of Health & Human Services.

NPHC is a staff model HMO which, when operations commence next fall,

will provide its members with virtually complete health care coverage including hospitalization for a fixed monthly premium. NPHC's medical facility will be located on Glen Cove Road in Carle Place. The plan will be offered to potential enrollees where they work, as an alternative to traditional health insurance.

Initial Development is the third of three stages required by the federal government of HMOs seeking fed-

eral qualification. The first two stages, Feasibility and Planning, have already been accomplished by NPHC with prior federal grants.

Commenting on the grant award, Steven Jonas, M.D., M.P.H., chairman of the plan's board said, "We're particularly pleased with the success of our grant application. As we all know, the current administration is cutting back sharply on federal grant programs such as

HMO support, and competition for these dollars was extremely keen. I'd like to thank everyone associated with us - both those on the staff and our friends outside - for all the support and help they gave us. I am confident that the board and staff, working together, will achieve the success of developing a truly health oriented HMO that has been predicted for us by the action of the Public Health Service in awarding the grant."

They approved Resolution No. 761-1981 granting the extension of time until Dec. 31, 1981 to obtain a certificate of occupancy of William Farrell, for a special use permit to be used as a racketball and health club in Syosset, granted by Resolution No. 358-80 dated April 15, 1980. This time extension was requested by Mr. Farrell due to the erratic financial market and high interest rates existing at present.

They approved Resolution No. 766-1981 relating to an \$80,000 increase for concrete on Contract No. H71-3930B, improvement of Caniague Rock Road North, in JERICHO, Nassau County.

At this meeting, as well as at an evening session, the Town Budget hearing was conducted. Several democratic candidates and democratic committee persons complained that they had difficulty in obtaining ten copies of this budget to study in advance. It was explained that these copies cost \$30 each, and were printed in limited numbers and that they were only given out singly and to libraries throughout the Township. The Board, through its Supervisor, Joseph Colby stated that a committee to study this existing policy will look in to the matter and the complaint and to advise the Board as to whether or not

they recommend a change in the policy governing the printing and distribution of these expensive budget copies in the future.

Mrs. Gladys Nelson of SYOSSET, spoke on the subject of the salaries of the Board, which had recently been raised. Mrs. Nelson stated that she felt that the size of the Town of Oyster Bay and the tremendous amount of duties involved in the Board's duties made their salaries most fair and not in any high bracket, especially if compared to the salaries of school administrators throughout the County.

Individual thought is not easy, it demands dedication and work. It is impossible in our every day lives to avoid television and television is truly fulfilling much of it's journalistic potential. Therefore we must watch television with a questioning eye and be aware of the different ways our minds can be maneuvered.

Individualism or televisionism, we must decide which "ism" will dominate our thinking in the future.
