Yevoli, (D-Old Bethpage), has de-manded the closing of Re-public Airport during evening hours. Last week's midnight plane crash at the Rathnase State Park Colf Bethpage State Park Golf Course which killed all three passengers on board is what prompted the As-semblyman's latest demand.



Hicksville resident Karen Levinson presented an address on "Toxic Chemical Problems in New York State" before 300 community activists attending the First Annual Statewide Citizens Annual Statewide Criticals Alliance Membership Convention in Albany, New York on October 11.

Mrs. Levinson during the (spoke during the Opening Ceremonies of the citizen group's two-day statewide gathering. The event, which marked the one-year anniversary of the non-profit, non-partisan citizen organization, was held at the Campus Center of the State

Levinson, who is an evening student at Nassau Community College residing on New South Road, outlined the efforts of citizen groups in various parts of the state to clean up toxic chemical hazards in their communities. Examples of

communities. Examples of toxic chemical campaigns included Love Canal in Niagara Falls, PCB pollution in the Hudson River near Poughkeepsie, water contamination in Vestal near Binghamton, and private well contamination in Babylon. Mrs. Levinson is a leader
