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Yevoli To MTA: Close Republic At Night

In a strongly worded letter to Metropolitan Transportation Authority Chairman Richard Ravitch, Assemblyman Lewis J. Yevoli, (D-Old Bethpage), has demanded the closing of Republic Airport during evening hours. Last week's midnight plane crash at the Bethpage State Park Golf Course which killed all three passengers on board is what prompted the Assemblyman's latest demand.

Yevoli said, "The site of the most recent crash is within walking distance of thousands of homes, it's just a miracle that a major disaster was averted." The

Assemblyman, who has been pressing the M.T.A. to institute a curfew on night flying at Republic for several years, pointed out in his letter to Ravitch that this was the fifth air crash in the last eight years. He noted that sixteen persons have perished to date as a result of these accidents; all of which involved light aircraft attempting to land at or take off from Republic Airport in Farmingdale. The crashes have been in close proximity to densely populated communities. It's like playing Russian Roulette - sooner or later our luck has to run out," he added.

According to Yevoli, the evening hours pose an extremely serious threat to the residents' safety because the Airport's control tower is shut down from 11 P.M. to 7 A.M. The Assemblyman said, "There is absolutely no justification for allowing planes to take off and land at Republic during the evening, particularly since MacArthur Airport is just a few miles away. Concerned residents, Senator Owen Johnson, and I have made repeated requests to the M.T.A. to abandon this policy to no avail." Last winter Assemblyman Yevoli and Senator Johnson (R-West Babylon) introduced

legislation in Albany that would establish a curfew on air traffic at Republic during the evening hours which is being reviewed by the committees in both houses. "The most recent tragedy underscores the dire need to prohibit flying at Republic in the evening," Yevoli said. "The M.T.A. has to realize that it is jeopardizing the lives of thousands of residents as long as planes are allowed to fly in and out of the airport at night." The Assemblyman has sent copies of his letter to M.T.A. Chief Ravitch, to Governor Carey, and the Federal Aviation Administration.

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has notified the Hicksville Citizens Alliance that it will conduct a "full scan" investigation of the ground water discharges of the Hooker Chemical Company plant on New South Rd. in Hicksville.

The Hicksville citizens' group had requested a "full investigation" of the firm's groundwater discharges which are regulated by the State Pollution Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) permit program. The group filed comment letter in March and August concerning a February request by Hooker to modify its SPDES permit.

In a letter to the Hicksville Citizens Alliance from DES Region I Director Donald J. Middleton on Oct. 21, 1981, the agency stated that "because of widespread public concern about the groundwater discharges which are subject to this permit, this Department has arranged for a "full scan" of all the 129 EPA Priority Pollutants."

"Any Priority Pollutant

detected in the effluent will be received to determine whether additional effluent limitations and monitoring requirements are appropriate," the Middleton letter stated. "This analysis will be done before the permit modification is issued."

"The Department's decision to expand its ongoing investigation of the Hooker Chemical Company by conducting a "full scan" discharge analysis shows that public pressure can bring about strict enforcement of laws designed to protect the quality of Long Island's groundwater and to protect the health of Long Island residents," said Gregory Yatzushyn, Hicksville Citizens Alliance Chairperson.

The SPDES permit program is "the heart of the water pollution control effort," the group noted, "since it is the most important mechanism to carry out the mandates of the Clean Water Act." With few exceptions, no pollution discharges to surface or groundwaters are allowed unless they are regulated by a SPDES permit and are in

full compliance with the permit's requirements.

The Hicksville Citizens Alliance, which is one of over 35 chapters of the Citizens Alliance organization across New York State, is taking part in a statewide legislative campaign to win improved Community Right-To-Know measures

surrounding toxic chemicals, and to win a state "Superfund" to complement the federal fund. The "Superfund" would be supported by industry fees and would be used to cover the costs of pollution-related clean-up. The group is conducting an opinion survey of Town of Oyster Bay officials on these proposals.

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Hicksville Resident Addresses 300 At Albany Convention

Hicksville resident Karen Levinson presented an address on "Toxic Chemical Problems in New York State" before 300 community activists attending the First Annual Statewide Citizens Alliance Membership Convention in Albany, New York on October 11.

Mrs. Levinson spoke during the Opening Ceremonies of the citizen group's two-day statewide gathering. The event, which marked the one-year anniversary of the non-profit, non-partisan citizen organization, was held at the Campus Center of the State

Levinson, who is an evening student at Nassau Community College residing on New South Road, outlined the efforts of citizen groups in various parts of the state to clean up toxic chemical hazards in their communities. Examples of toxic chemical campaigns included Love Canal in Niagara Falls, PCB pollution in the Hudson River near Poughkeepsie, water contamination in Vestal near Binghamton, and private well contamination in Babylon.

Mrs. Levinson is a leader of the Hicksville Citizens

of a Hooker request to weaken its on-site monitoring for discharges of phenol, a suspected carcinogen on the federal "priority pollutant" list.

"At first I thought that public health problems caused by toxic pollution was a neighborhood issue, but now I've learned that this problem is not just neighborhood-wide, or Town-wide, or County-wide, but it's a statewide problem. And a statewide problem requires statewide solutions," Levinson told the group.

Mrs. Levinson urged the Citizens Alliance members to join together to support the organization's statewide Legislative program on toxic clean-up, which includes proposals for Full Disclosure-Community Right-To-Know requirements, and the establishment of a statewide "Superfund" Clean-Up Fund which would be paid for by industrial producers of hazardous wastes.

Her 10-minute speech was enthusiastically received by the Convention audience.

The Citizens Alliance Convention also featured a 1 1/2-hour "Speak Out" on Rising Utility Rates featuring Paul Gioia, Chairman of the NY State Public Service Commission, who gave his position on the group's

legislative proposals on utility reform.

PSC Chairman Gioia declared his support for the Alliance position on de-control of natural gas prices and agreed to send letters of his position to the state's Congressional delegation opposing the accelerated lifting of price ceilings. General for the "Marijuana Research Study Program." The study is to measure the benefits of marijuana to cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy treatment.

According to Bornstein, "The State will provide the marijuana cigarettes for the patients undergoing chemotherapy treatment. Such therapy has such negative side effects as nausea and vomiting, and it

is believed that the limited use of marijuana before and after chemotherapy can alleviate these side effects."

I.S.O. Up-Grades Hicksville Classification

The Insurance Services Office of New York recently conducted an inspection of the Fire Dept and Water District operations. A direct result of that inspection was an improvement from Class 4 to Class 3.

The evaluation included Fire Dept. response, training, equipment and hydrant flow tests. Fire District, Water District personnel, along with the four Fire Chiefs, assisted in the tests. Officials were informed that the Class 3 rating was the best that could be issued. There are very few Class 2 in the country and no Class 1.

The result will be decreased fire insurance rates for many insured properties within the Hicksville Fire and Water district. The new rates went into effect Nov. 1, 1981.

Hicksville Fire Chief Richard Kershow reported that delivery of a new 2,000 GPM Pumper is expected in December and another is awaiting final bidding. A new computer is being installed to help Fire Dispatchers get important hazardous material, disabled persons and hydrant locations information to responding Vamps. Additional personal papers, portable two-way radios for fire ground communication are also being requested, along with recommendations to the Water District, for certain hydrants in high risk areas to be changed to allow attachment of the Department's new 5" hose system. A complete review of the District's fire alarm system is also underway.

Nassau County Board of Supervisors Meeting

At the Nassau County Board of Supervisors meeting held on Monday, Nov. 9, Phoebe Goodman of the Nassau Citizens Budget Committee, Inc., read a statement to the Board in regards to the County's budget. She stated that "only two hearings are held. The first, the pre-budget hearing, is held in the middle of the summer, the least convenient time of the year... The second hearing follows publication of the budget and is therefore based on advance information. But it is held only a few weeks before the start of the new fiscal year, which is too late for major changes to be made." She asked the Board that the budget be published well in advance of Election Day; that full information be made available before any hearing takes place; that hearings be organized either according to the responsibilities of the Deputy County Executives, who should attend the hearings, or by some functional grouping; that hearings be held during the day and at night to permit all Nassau residents to participate; that the entire budgetary timetable be made public well in advance and be available upon request from the Office of Management and Budget.

The Board passed a bond ordinance authorizing \$239,000 for the County Streamflow Augmentation Study. \$3,256,000 was initially provided for this project in 1978. The additional cost is a result of extra time allocated to the work.

The Board passed a resolution - an agreement between the County acting for and on behalf of the Planning Dept. and the Metropolitan Suburban Bus Authority whereby County will pay \$38,000 to the Authority for the Authority to conduct on-site manufacturing inspection of Grumman / Flexible buses prior to acceptance and delivery of the buses.

They also passed a resolution for the planning department to release a builder's performance surety bond of \$25,000 following completion of required public improvements in a development in Syosset known as "Hunting Hill at Syosset, Sec. No. 1."

Christmas Boutique

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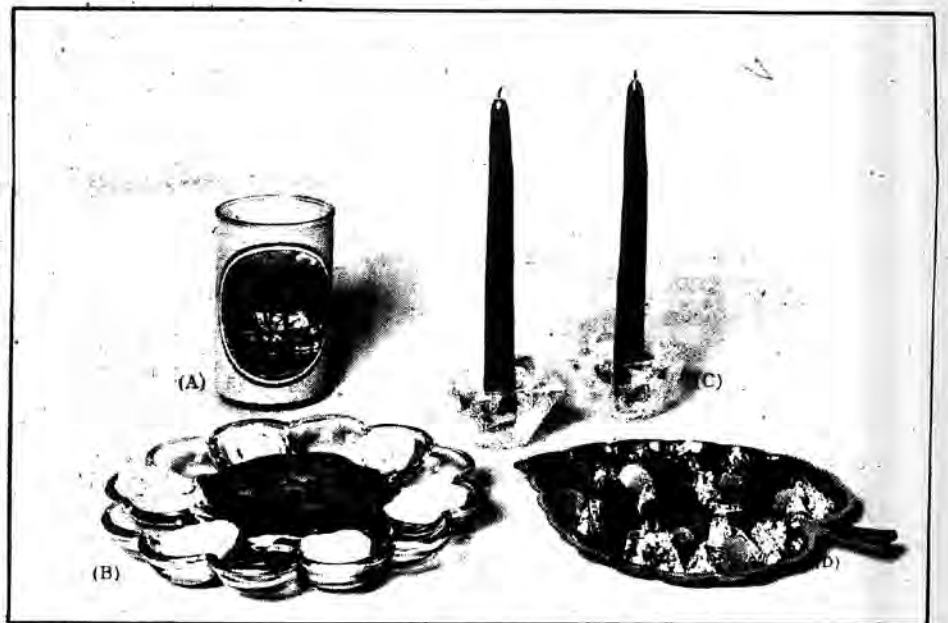

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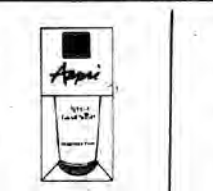

Job Development Authority Amendment

Voters gave a clear signal for more jobs in Nassau and Suffolk Counties by passing Amendment # 1 on Election Day according to Senator John R. Dunne (R-Garden City). The Amendment to the State Constitution allows the New York State Job Development Authority (JDA) to increase its total lending limit from \$150 million to \$300 million.

Senator Dunne, Chairman of the New York State Senate Committee on Corporations, Authorities and Commissions, was the prime sponsor of legislation that placed the Amendment on the ballot.

The JDA is a bank-like financial institution that makes low interest loans available to businesses and industries for machinery, equipment and real estate.

Senator Dunne said: "The successful passage of the JDA Amendment is a victory for taxpayers and small businessmen alike. Since the JDA began in 1961 over 90,000 new jobs have been created statewide with approximately 33,000 of those new jobs in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. Increasing the amount of money that the JDA can lend means more jobs and economic development are on the way

to Long Island.

"The Job Development Authority is self-supporting with loan interest charges covering its operating costs, therefore, there will be no cost to the taxpayer. The bonds are sold to private investors who want to finance business expansion and provide new jobs.

"The JDA will now have more resources available to attract new business to New

York and to keep and expand businesses that are already here. This will create more private sector jobs at no cost to the State taxpayers.

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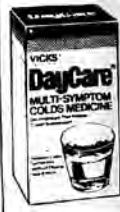


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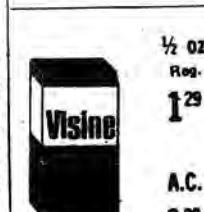

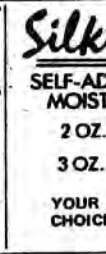
