A fire, burning out of control at the New York Diagnostic Center at 247 Old Country Rd., Hicksville, destroyed the facility early Sunday evening. A passing LILCO unit manned by John Lupski reported the fire which was already blowing out the windows.

The December 26th alarm was received by Hicksville Vamps at 6:41 p.m. First arriving Chief on the scene — Chief Richard Kershow requested a 2nd alarm. As Hicksville Vamps, using the 5" large diameter hose system prepared to battle the blaze, mutual aid assistance was requested from the Jericho Fire Dept. within the next hour as heat, heavy smoke, wind swept flames and numbing cold hampered Vamps. Additional help was called from the Plainview, Bethpage, Levittown, East Meadow, Westbury and Syosset Fire Departments.

The 1 1/2 story brick and frame building measuring 200 ft. x 75 ft. served as a preventive medicine center. The numerous small rooms and hallways helped the fire spread rapidly.

### Handicapped Parking At Hicksville RR Station

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced Town Board approval of a resolution to provide a total of six parking spaces for the exclusive use of handicapped commuters at the Hicksville Railroad Station Commuter Parking Field.

"These restricted parking

spaces will help to provide handicapped residents with access to the Railroad Station in Hicksville," Clark said.

All residents should be aware that parking in these restricted spaces without the proper identifying sticker is punishable by a ten-dollar fine.

### Mailhandler Exams For Hicksville MSC P.O. Announced

MSC Manager/Postmaster Anthony M. Murello has announced an area-wide entrance examination for future mailhandler positions within the Hicksville sectional center. The resulting register will be used to fill approximately (100) career positions over the next two years in the following offices: Hicksville, Bay Shore, Huntington Station and Smithtown. The starting salary is \$9.26 per hour including cost of living adjustment.

Applications will be issued and accepted from Monday January 4, 1982 through Friday January 8, 1982 at Hicksville and all of the associate offices beginning with the 117 zip code. No applications will be mailed. They must be obtained in person and returned to post offices between the dates mentioned above. The general age requirement is (18) years. There is no maximum age

limit. No experience is required.

All applicants will be required to take a written examination designed to test aptitude for learning and performing the duties of the position.

A physical examination will be required before appointment.

When eligibles are within reach for appointment they will be required to pass a test of strength and stamina, demonstrating the ability to lift, shoulder and carry 70 pound sacks of mail. All applicants must be citizens of or owe allegiance to the United States of America or be non-citizens who have been awarded permanent resident alien status.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, political affiliation, or any other non-merit factor.




## Redeemer Lutheran Church Dedicates New Worship Facilities And Organ

On Sunday, December 6, Redeemer Lutheran Church at 17 New South Road in Hicksville, celebrated its sixth move forward since its

founding in 1958. This was the culmination of a renovation program of almost two years duration, which included renovation and remodeling of the worship facilities, rebuilding and augmentation of their seven-rank pipe organ and two structural additions to the existing facilities.

Redeemer Lutheran Church has long been known as the "Church of the Open Door", and included in the building program was provision for an "open door chapel", which will be opened at all times for wor-

ship and meditation. The original nave was reversed on the interior and remodeled to provide for additional organ pipes, and a new narthex was added providing entrance thereto.

On December 6, a Dedication was held at the enlarged and renovated facilities, and the church was filled to overflowing. The Rev. Winston Bone, who is assistant to the Bishop of the New York Synod of the Lutheran Church of America, was the guest preacher. The Dedication Liturgy was conducted by

Redeemer's own pastor, the Rev. Dr. Theodore S. Grant. Assisting in the service were the Rev. Audrey B. Foley and the Rev. Henry W. Wuerz, each of whom were former members of Redeemer Lutheran Church, who have become ordained ministers of the Lutheran Church. This relatively small congregation boasts of sending a total of four people into the ministry.

The predominant architectural feature of the new facilities is a skylight and tower, which the Rev. Winston Bone referred to as a beacon to the community. The Architect was John Sandgren, the General Contractor, Edwin Henn; the Renovation Program Chairperson, Effie Krogmann.

Following the worship service dedicating the organ and facilities, refreshments were served and guests were conducted on a tour by members of the congregation. The congregation of Redeemer wish to thank all those who supported and participated in this tremendous project. They especially want to express their appreciation to members of the local clergy who were present at the celebration, and extend a heartfelt invitation to any who are looking for a church home to visit this vibrant congregation.

## Beethoven Hosts "A Night At The Arts"

The presence of Ludwig van Beethoven added to the lustre of the Hicksville Public Schools' day-long celebration of his 211th birthday anniversary. Throughout the day of Wednesday, December 16, Beethoven met with selected classes at the Senior High School, discussing his music, his life, and his philosophy. With accompanying slides, students heard excerpts from the "Emperor" Piano Concerto as well as symphonies No. 3, 5, 6 and 9. Beethoven explained his desire for universal peace and brotherhood, as expressed in the "Ode to Joy," used in his Ninth Symphony, and compared himself to John Lennon, whose "Imagine" served to articulate the same hope. The students enjoyed the opportunity to question Beethoven in depth about some of his works.

From 2 - 3:30 PM, Beethoven was honored at a gala reception at the Senior High School Library, hosted by Librarian Dorothy Hanrahan, a member of the Humanities Team, and members of her staff. In attendance were faculty members, PTA leadership, members of the Board of Education, student leaders, and administration. Beethoven is reported to have been deeply moved by his gesture, and to be considering a return to Hicksville at some point in the future.

At 7 PM, community members attended the opening of "A Night at the Arts," presented in conjunction with the Board of Education meeting. After viewing over 500 square feet of exhibits illustrating the new curriculum approach and design recently initiated by the Department of Comprehensive Arts, residents attended a concert presenting the Old Country Road

the Beethoven Piano Sonata, Op. 14, No. 1 by Dr. Terrell Stackpole, Supervisor of Comprehensive Arts.

Some participants in the day's events noted a striking similarity between Beethoven and Gerald Shanley, a member of the Humanities Team and an English faculty member at the Senior High School.

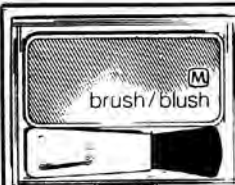

## AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES APPENDIX A

### BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Appendix A, "Building Zone Ordinance" of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same are hereby amended to read as follows:

ADD: A new Section 22 to Appendix A, "Building zone Ordinance" of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay to read as follows: Sec. 22. Moratorium on Issuance of Permits within a certain area in Hicksville. (a) Legislative Intent. In view of the additional development and the subsequent adverse results therefrom on the area near the intersection of South Oyster Bay Road and Woodbury Road in recent years, it is the intention of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay to provide for this moratorium, the purpose of which is to allow time for a review of the zoning and planning of this area of Hicksville in order to provide for its orderly development and thereby promote the health, safety and general welfare of the community as a whole. (b) Moratorium on Building Permits. No building permit for the construction, erection, alteration, or extension of any building or structure on any lot or lots or property lying within that certain area at Hicksville, in the Town of Oyster Bay described in Subsection (c) hereof, shall be issued by the Department of Building and Zoning or any other official or officials of the Town of Oyster Bay for a period of sixty (60) days from the effective date of this ordinance, or until the effective date of any required amendment to the zoning in that area, or until the Town Board makes a final determination that no change is necessary, whichever occurs first.
