Fire Destroys Health Center

A fire, burning out of control at the New York Diagnostic Center at 247 Old Country Rd, Hicksville, destroyed the facility early Sunday evening. A passing LILCO unit manned by John Lupski reported the fire which was already blowing out the windows. out the windows.

The December 20th alarm was received by Hicksville Vamps at 6:41 p.m. First ar-riving Chief on the scene Chief Richard Kershow re-Chief Richard Kershow re-quested a 2nd alarm. As Hicksville Vamps, using the 5" large diameter hose system prepared to battle the blaze, mutual aid assistance was requested from the Jericho Fire Dept. within the serich or re beet, which the smoke, wind swept flames and numbing cold hampered Vamps. Additional help was called from the Plainview Bethpage, Levittown, East Meadow, Westbury and Syosset Fire Departments.

The 1 1/2 story brick and frame building measuring 200 ft. x 75 ft. served as a preventitive medicine center. numerous small rooms and hallways helped the fire

spread rapidly.

was estimated at \$250,000 and \$400,000 to the building Two Vamps were injured. Ex-Capt. Henry Hawkins was taken to Central General Hospital with chest pains. Ex-Capt. Michael krummanacker suffered a knee injury. Hawkins was admitted.



Beethoven met with selected classes at the Senior High School, discussing his music, his life, and his philosophy. With accompanying slides, students heard excerpts from the "Emperor" Piano Concerto as well as symphonies No. 3, 5, 6 and 9. Beethoven explained his desire for universal peace and seemoven expanded as ob-sire for universal peace and brotherhood, as expressed in the "Ode to Joy," used in his Ninth Symphony, and com-pared himself to John Lennon, whose "Imagine" served to articulate the same hope. The students enjoyed the opportunity to question Beethoven in depth about some of his works. From 2 - 3:30 PM, Bee-thoven was honored at a gala

reception at the Senior High School Library, hosted by Librarian Dorothy Hanrahan, a member of the Humanities Team, and members of her staff. In attendance were faculty members, PTA leadership, members of the Board of Education, student leaders, and administration. Beethoven is reported to have been deeply moved by his gesture, and to be considering a return to Hicksville at some point in

the future.






