To youngsters in history classes today, World War II was in the "olden days." To many, John F, Kennedy's death is part of a list of other tragedies, including the violent deaths of William McKinley and Abraham Lincoln. That is especially so. when we see photos of that very same Hook and Ladder equipment on a gleaming yagon pulled by powerful horses. One fact is clear, however, Nassau County has come a long way since its day of

He was chairman of the Jockey Club and Prosident of the West. and President of the West-chester Racing Club. He built the Belmont Race Course as a monument to his achievements in the sport of racing.
