# Nassau County Celebrates A Birthday

Our Nassau County celebrates a birthday on Jan. 1 - it is a little hard to imagine that we are that young and, indeed, that old. The fact is, this county was born just before the turn of the century in 1899, carved with considerable wailing and gnashing of teeth from a gigantic Queens County and moulded with great effort and opposition from many in the towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead and Oyster Bay.

This birthday was brought to mind a short while ago when a notice was received from New York State, indicating that Nassau's Old County Courthouse in Mineola had been listed on the Register of Historic Places. The golden-domed courthouse was a first product of the new county government in 1900, slightly

more than a year after the birth of the new municipality. Of course, the courthouse, enlarged over the years, remains a vital part of county functions as a busy office building at the corner of Franklin Avenue and Old Country Road in the heart of the governmental center. Perspectives in history are always difficult. To youngsters in history classes today, World War II was in the "olden days." To many, John F. Kennedy's death is part of a list of other tragedies, including the violent deaths of William McKinley and Abraham Lincoln. Certainly, the global war and the horror of political assassination remain vivid in the minds of those of us who are older. Newspaper headlines remain clear in our minds,

but are only lines in a textbook for today's children. Similarly, the momentous event of Jan. 1, 1899, is less dramatic in our eyes today. It is hard to imagine the gentlemen in high collars and derby hats gathering at the Mineola Hook and Ladder Company headquarters to take the reins of a new municipal entity. That is especially so, when we see photos of that very same Hook and Ladder equipment on a gleaming wagon pulled by powerful horses. Consider, too, that visitors to the first day function of the new county arrived in buggies, stage coaches, trolleys, or aboard a smoke-belching railroad train. One fact is clear, however, Nassau County has come a long way since its day of

birth. Fewer than 10,000 people voted on the county seat site and for the first elected officials. Less than 300 square miles were included in the county, and it was all rural. A few villages were scattered among the farms and along the shorelines, where fishing people plied their trade.

Today, Nassau is a mature county with diversified industry, a strong, rooted population and a high quality of life. We are larger in population than 15 states and if we were a city, we'd be sixth largest in the nation. Nassau has become something big from something rather small in just over 80 years... and the cycle isn't nearly complete. I believe we shall continue to grow and prosper until our 100th birthday and beyond.

The \$1.6 trillion defense expenditure proposed by the Reagan Administration over the next five years will not buy true military readiness unless waste and mismanagement is tightly reined in at the Department of Defense. This is exactly what Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger proposes to do: "We intend to see that every dollar Congress votes provides real muscle for our nation's security," he pledges. Billions can be saved, asserts senior editor Eugene H. Methvin in the January Reader's Digest, but it will be an uphill fight against bureaucracy. Congress appears willing

## Pentagon War On Waste Called Critical To Defense

to help. It is close to enacting a bill to set up an independent inspector general, who will coordinate DOD's 14,000 auditors and investigators, track action on their recommendations and issue periodic reports to Congress. Thanks to a law enacted last year, the bureaucracy will be held accountable for waste. "Henceforth, whenever a major weapons system's cost overruns estimates by more than 15 percent, the Pentagon must halt spending and provide Capitol Hill with the names of the program managers responsible, reasons for the overrun and a plan for correcting it," Methvin

writes. The Congress has also recently allowed multi-year contracting at the Pentagon, a move experts believe could save as much as 30 percent on big weapons buys. General Alton Slay, who for three years administered all Air Force weapons contracts comments, "Through the savings we could make on multi-year contracting alone, President Reagan could do all the things he wants to do." When Slay took over Air Force weapons buying, he gave orders to increase competitive bidding on contracts, which generally reduces costs by 10 to 30 percent. The 54 percent in-

crease in competitive contracting Slay instigated saved DOD billions. Congress has not yet moved to target raises in military pay according to the needs of the services and duties performed. "We can do better with \$500 million in increases we can target than with \$5 billion across the board," a General Accounting Office specialist declared. "We now have a national defense effort," says Secretary of the Army John O. Marsh, Jr. "However, that consensus is fragile and will not last unless we can enlist everybody in the war on waste."

## Columbia Corner August Belmont, Jr. Of Hempstead

Metropolitan Opera until her death in the early 1970's. August Belmont was one of the founders and for twenty years President of the First National Bank of Hempstead now part of Chemical Bank. He was also a founder of the Meadowbrook Hunt Club. His beautiful federal style

mansion on Fulton Avenue was a landmark in Hempstead until it was torn down in the mid 1960's to make way for a multi-level apartment building. Mr. Belmont had sold the mansion to the Hempstead Elks Lodge shortly before his death, and it was occupied

by the Elks until its demolition. August Belmont's contribution to the development of Hempstead is remembered with the naming of one of the village's more beautiful boulevards, Belmont Parkway, in his honor.

Mr. Belmont, a banker by profession, was best known for his activities in the sport of thoroughbred horse racing. A multi-millionaire, he owned several champion race horses including the famed Man O' War. He had two stud nurseries, one in Kentucky and one in Babylon, Long Island. He was chairman of the Jockey Club and President of the Westchester Racing Club. He built the Belmont Race Course as a monument to his achievements in the sport of racing.

Mr. Belmont was married twice, first to the former Elizabeth H. Morgan of New York who died in 1898. His second wife was the former Eleanor Robson, an actress, whom he married in 1910. The second Mrs. Belmont was a great supporter and benefactress of the

The Nassau County Police Department Arson Squad notes that there has been an increase in incidents of arson over the last few years, and cites several underlying reasons for such an increase. Revenge is the most common and constant cause of arson, along with juvenile

mischief and difficult economic times. Since 1979, the burning of a vehicle is also considered arson, and this too has added to the increase of incidents.

The Arson Squad is grateful for and encourages resident information, no matter how insignificant it may seem, regarding a fire. Call the Squad at 683-5807 if ever you have something to report. Remember also, that the Police Department encourages residents to call 911 to report any suspicious car or activity in their neighborhood. Your call may help to prevent an arson from occurring.

Our volunteer firefighters give so much to our

communities - far more than meets the eye. The hours they spend on community awareness and fire prevention programs make the risks they take when answering a call to a fire that has been caused by a senseless, destructive act, a cause for anger and concern to us all.

We should all be watchful of any suspicious activity in our neighborhoods and not hesitate to call the proper authorities to report anything out of the ordinary. Perhaps in this way, we can help to cut down on the number of suspicious fires that unnecessarily endanger our volunteer firefighters as well as our community in general.

### GLORY FOR ALL

Ornaments are once again being carefully packaged and tucked away in attics. Dried Christmas trees lay forlorn on many curb sides awaiting sanitation trucks. The lament that Christmas has past, once again is being heard throughout the community. But wait, hold everything-hands off that glass ornament-let the tree stand, for the celebration has not past, today there is another feast we must enjoy, for the Christmas mystery has two parts: the Nativity and the Epiphany.

In the first we have celebrated God's humble entrance into the world and in the second we acknowledge

his manifestation to the world-that he had come for all nations. A fact represented by the wisemen. Jesus was born so that all humankind might be saved. Christ was a Light to lighten the Gentiles as well as the Glory of his people Israel. Think of what a Gentile was when this was written-an absolute outsider with no claim to the covenant. At Christmas, the stress that Jesus came for us as individuals is appropriate, but at the festival of Epiphany, Christ's coming is put into sharper focus. He has come as the light for all the world. "We know that the ox and the ass are the right animals to navigate on." "And look at what odd gifts they bring." Or as we say today. "Who are those strange people that lift up their hands to heaven whenever they praise the Lord...Some of them even speak a strange kind of jibberish... tongues." I believe they call it. "Or, Have you seen that strange looking church the Greeks built in Hicksville. It really doesn't belong in our community."

As we celebrate the festival of Epiphany, God proclaims to us that no race, no country, no denomination, no church, no individual has an exclusive right to Bethlehem-no race, no country, no denomination, no church, no individual has cornered the market on the truth. Today is the day

supreme to break down the walls that divide us. Today is the day to be proud that we are among the baptized, that we belong to the universal church of Jesus Christ. We need not hold back in our relationships with other Christians but rather celebrate them.

Today we celebrate that God was manifested to the entire world. We must constantly endeavor to strengthen ties with those who we see as different-those who make longer journeys by different pathways led by different stars. In spite of all the different Christian denominations, and all the differences within each denomination, and all different churches in a community, we stand arm-in-arm with each other, and with Mary the mother of our Lord, and with the shepherds, and even with those strange Magi-for together we behold the glory of the only Son sent for each of us. Yes, but even more, we behold the glory of the only Son of God sent for all of us.
