## Clark Opposes Use Of Federal Funds For Joint District Pool Renovations

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark has informed the Town of Hempstead that he is opposed to utilizing federal funds for renovations on two pools in the Hicksville-Levittown Joint Park District as this could force the pools to be open to non-residents.

"I believe the people of the Hicksville portion of this district would prefer to

continue handling the maintenance expenses themselves rather than be forced to open these neighborhood pools to people from other areas," Clark said.

Clark stated his position in a letter to Hempstead Councilman Joseph Mondello who recently held a meeting with residents on this matter to explain the necessity for

the renovations and possible alternatives to using federal funds. Councilman Clark, who was sitting on an Oyster Bay Town Board public hearing on zoning until 2 AM, was unable to attend the meeting held by Mondello.

"Although I could not be there, residents from the Hicksville section of the district did contact me to let me know of their

opposition to the use of federal funds," Clark explained. "I support their position and have informed the Hempstead Councilman of that fact."

The joint district, while requiring both Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Board action on certain major determinations, is administered, managed and operated by the Town of Hempstead.

## School Board Takes Stands On Quality Education

The Hicksville Board of Education has passed two resolutions regarding federal regulations having an impact on educational programs in the district.

With one resolution, the Board expressed opposition to additional black grant proposals that fail to retain the levels of funding represented in the programs being consolidated. These programs include Programs for the Handicapped, ESEA Title I, and Vocational Education. This position was taken by the Board because black grants and the deregulation of federal funds would reduce revenues to certain programs and eliminate others entirely.

In the second resolution, the Board opposed dereg-

ulation of Public Law 94-142, which was originally enacted to ensure that pupils with handicapping conditions would receive an education comparable to that available to other students.

The two resolutions, passed at a recent regular business meeting of the Board, will be sent to Congressional representatives and Vice President George Bush.

"We want those of us who represent us in Congress to know where we in Hicksville stand on these vital issues," explains Board president John P. Ayres. "We will strongly oppose measures which will negatively affect the quality and scope of educational experiences provided to our students."

**HOLIDAY BLUES**

There's a widely held public assumption, fed in part by growing numbers of news articles in recent years, that Easter, Christmas, and other "togetherness" holidays bring depression to large segments of the population. Who is affected? It is something called the "holiday blues" that is bothering them? The subject has many sides.

Psychologists note that holidays are periods when many people feel a need to be alone. Others see the time as an opportunity to be joyful and giving. Therapists suggest that when these needs are blocked, such as by recent contact with friends or family members, confining weather, or comparisons of one's own situation to that of others, personal feelings of loneliness can be aroused. Feeling lonely does not necessarily lead to serious depression; emotions said to be associated with "holiday blues" may primarily affect people whose past life experiences made them prone to depressed feelings. Personal experiences attached to past holidays—not the mere ringing in of a new holiday—may produce a seasonal unhappiness in some people.

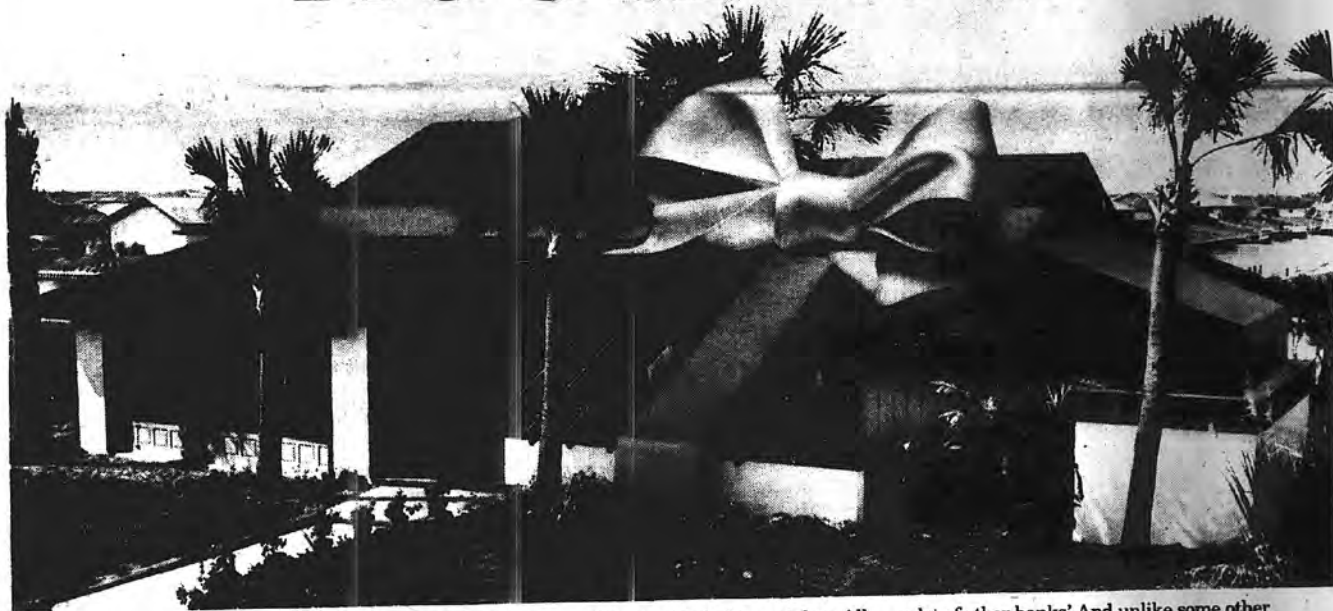

## Our Town's Regulations And Schedules For Rubbish Removal

There's a feeling of spring in the air these days. If you've walked outside on some of the balmy days we've had, you've probably noticed that spring snowdrops and crocuses have appeared, adding color to the landscapes around the Town.

We all begin to sense that winter is probably over, and many of us experience a feeling of fresh energy as we approach spring cleanup chores.

Planning ahead and being aware of the Town's regulations and schedules for rubbish collection will

help to keep you feeling good about the spring season.

Since rubbish collection days vary from route to route throughout the Town, be sure you know what your pickup day is. Call the Sanitation Collection Division at 921-3850 to find out if you're not sure. Residents in the incorporated villages or who have private sanitation collection service, should call those people directly to learn schedules and regulations for the disposal of large items or large accumulations of refuse.

Town sanitation regulations provide that any

item that can be bundled or placed in containers not exceeding 50 pounds or four feet in measurement in any direction, may be placed at curbside for pickup on scheduled rubbish days. No more than 200 pounds of rubbish may be placed at the curb on any one day. Items which cannot be broken down and contained will need a special bulk pickup. Call 921-3850 and you will be given a date on which the item (air conditioners, freezers, large pieces of furniture and the like) will be picked up.

For those residents who

wish to dispose of rubbish immediately after a cleanup, the Town will again open its solid waste management facility in Old Bethpage for five consecutive weekends beginning on Saturday, April 17, and continuing each Saturday and Sunday through May 18. From 10:30 AM to 6 PM residents in private cars or trucks, who show proof of residency, will be permitted to dispose of refuse directly at that site. Please use the entrance located on Bethpage-Sweet Hollow Road, between Winding Road and Round Swamp Road for access to the site.
