School Board Approves Proposed Budget

The School Board unanimously passed resolutions to accept the total budget of \$34,750,296 and to reinstate a minimum summer school program for Hicksville students at the meeting on May 12. Board member Honey Singer introduced the motion to include \$40,000 in the budget for the purpose of having summer school and a representative of the Hicksville Council of PTA's read letters urging consideration of the program. Superintendent Wilber D. Hawkins will submit a study to the Board outlining details of a summer school at the next meeting.

The budget represents an approximate 7% increase over last year and will not require an increase in the tax rate due to an accumula-

tion of surpluses. Budget vote and school board elections are scheduled for May 26 from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. in local schools. Incumbent Thomas Nagle is challenged by Bernard Goldman. Honey Singer is running unopposed. Michael Meyer and William Bennett are running for the seat to be vacated by Virginia Germer.

Mr. Bennett expressed his disturbance regarding fliers distributed to teachers, making a financial appeal for the purpose of defeating Mr. Nagle and Mr. Bennett. Superintendent Hawkins has instructed school principals not to let this kind of political thing happen.

Mr. Bennett also spoke about the \$2.3 million increase in the budget, saying

the expenditures are much too high. He gave statistics itemizing where the surpluses were and was questioned by Budget Committee Chairman Larry Wolfson. "Why didn't you come forth in September with some of the information you had?" he said "You were a member of the committee and we had many discussions."

A resident questioned the \$2 million payment to BOCES for services. President John Ayres said the figure was correct and 40% is returned from the state the following year.

A resident of 4th Street told the Board there is a shopping center being planned on Broadway opposite 4th Street to contain a supermarket, 15 stores and park-

ing facilities for 553 cars. A representative of the district will attend a rezoning hearing scheduled at Town Hall on Tuesday, May 18 at 10 a.m.

Superintendent Hawkins again stressed the importance of fulfilling Physical Education requirements in order to graduate. Make up classes are in session and parents have been informed. He was hopeful revised high school diploma requirements will be on the agenda of the May 26 meeting.

Superintendent Hawkins recommended that the Board grant tenure to Dr. Catherine Fenton, Assistant Superintendent, Dr. Manus Clancy, Elementary Principal and Ms. Ruth Jacobson. (Continued on Page 4)

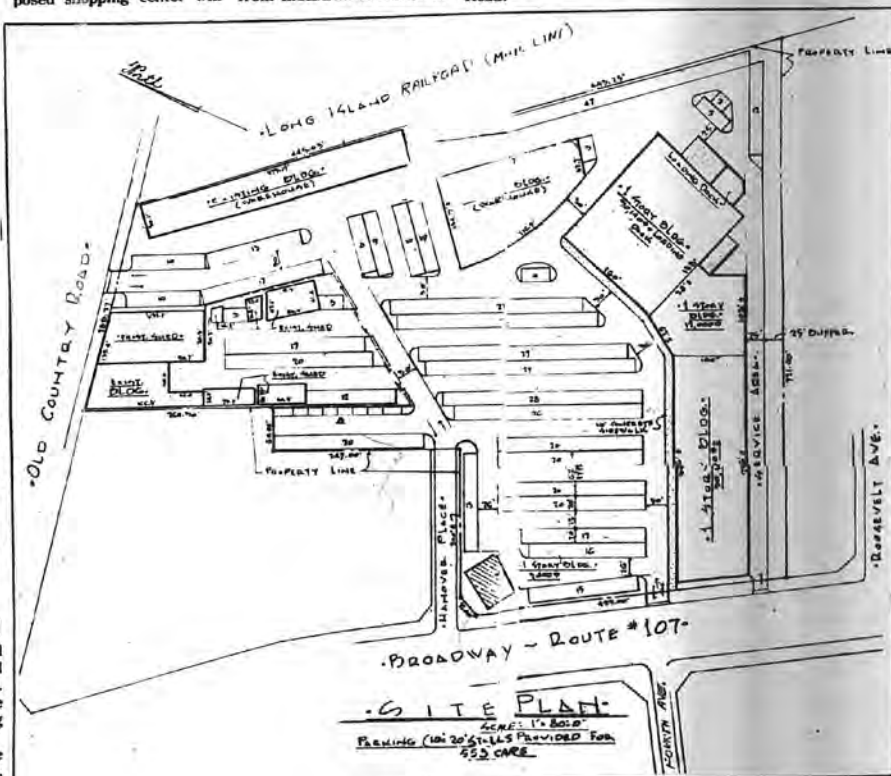
The entrance to this proposed shopping center will

Invitations have gone out to many well known midwest race car drivers and owners who are members of the Eastern Old Timers' Auto Racing Club sponsors of the Race Car "Hall of Fame" at Flemington, New Jersey, into which Mike Caruso was inducted in 1978.

Among the well known sportsmen and devotees of midwest racing car days who have accepted invitations to honor Caruso, some of whom are bringing antique midwest race cars for display on May 15, on the Heitz Place Courthouse grounds are: Johnny Kay of South Lyme, Conn., who is coming with Caruso's restored # 2 car, the famous "Black Deuce" and the championship car's present owners Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Barlow, and Henry

Banks, the Indianapolis Race driver, who drove Caruso cars to outstanding wins. Other fine midwest car wheelmen coming to honor Hicksville's racing car Hall of Famer and to see the large exhibit of Caruso memorabilia at the Gregory Museum are Johnny Rogers and Myke Collins, officers and trustees of the Western Old Timers Racing Club, co-sponsors of the program honoring Mike Caruso.

The program dedicating and opening the exhibit will begin at 1 p.m. The public, old friends of Mike and race car enthusiasts are invited to see and hear leaders in midwest car racing reminisce about Caruso's great cars, his never-to-be forgotten drivers and the thrilling races and championships they won. Six or more midwest racers will be on hand for inspection.

The exhibition of Mike

Caruso's racing car memorabilia and trophies will be available for viewing after the program honoring Mike. It will be on display in the historical room of the Hicksville Gregory Museum which occupies the Old Heitz Place Courthouse and Jail, a National Historic Place.

Displays will range the field of midwest car racing, a sport which once attracted and thrilled millions of Americans. Mike Caruso's distinctive and memorable mechanical innovations revolutionized much of midwest car racing. Supervisor of Reading. The Board enthusiastically complied, offering praise, congratulations and applause.

The Board approved the recommendation to designate the Church at Hicksville Christian School as giving equivalency of instruction, and also approved participation in the National School Boards Association Direct Affiliate Program for the 1982-83 school year at a membership fee of \$375.

The Board passed resolutions to take action of Board policies, recommendations of the Committee of the Handicapped and approved textbooks. It also awarded bids and approved warrants. The Board accepted Dr. Hawkins recommendation and approved the district's application for Town of Oyster Bay Recreation Grant.

It approved recommendations regarding education and civil service personnel.

The Board recognized an Award which was presented to Mrs. Lillian Gold, a counselor at Hicksville High School, by the Long Island Personnel and Guidance Association. The award was for outstanding practices in counseling and guidance, for her bereavement project.

On Monday, May 17, the Board of Education with the Hicksville Congress of Teachers will hold an Educational Workshop at the Jr. High School at 7:15. It will highlight educational problems and focus on the budget.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board will be May 26 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building.

Dear Mr. Meyer:

In your letter to the Editor, you asked some questions and I would like to respond and ASK YOU A FEW QUESTIONS.

You stated in your letter, in part, "This view of combativeness and conflict characterized his previous term as a member of the board. In his previous tenure and in his letter of April 30th, he shows that he believes that conflict is necessary and appropriate between the Board of Education and its employees. I ask Mr. Bennett why? Why must there be continuous conflict in this district?" In response to your statement and question, Mr. Meyer, the conflict you speak of originates with the teachers and their union. And since you were not part of the action, let me and the community bring you up to date.

In May 1979, the union lost their demands fair and square under the collective bargaining procedure between the board and the HCT. But they never forgave the board members who took part, and I was one of them. We as a Board, had a responsibility to protect the interests of the entire community and to safeguard our managerial prerogatives.

The PTA had remained neutral during these negotiations, as they should under the terms of their charter, but the teachers and their union turned their wrath on the PTA and instituted a boycott that continues to this very day, Mr. Meyer. The union also boycotted student after school activities that were

sponsored by the PTA. The "T" in PTA was effectively erased. The union also saw fit to stay away from board meetings for a long period of time.

Further, Mr. Meyer, the teachers and their union backed Row "A" last year. (AYRES, GRIMMER & SCHWARTZ), and soon as negotiations started and things were not going their way, the teachers union turned on Mr. Ayers, Mrs. Anci and Mr. Schwartz, and applied the same rudeness and contempt during the public sessions as they did with me and the Board in 1978-79. Mr. Meyer, if you would have taken the time to attend our board meetings during the past year, you would have witnessed this "COMBATIVENESS AND CONFLICT" on the part of the militant teachers and their followers.

Secondly, you stated in your letter your agreement with the board action of extending the teachers contract at a cost of over one million dollars. Were you not at the April 21st meeting? Did you not hear Mr. Arena's statement that, "this was the first time our board acted on a negotiated contract on an individual member basis and not discussed as a collective body." Did you not hear Mrs. Gerner state that she knew nothing about the agreement until the night before the board action? How can you give your consent to those methods?

Isn't it strange that this extension of the contract was made just before the deadline filing date of April 26th, for seats on the board?

In your letter you also

supported the budget - again, there was NO INPUT from you at the public budget meetings. Nor, Mr. Meyer, did you elect to join Mr. Wolfson's Citizens Advisory Budget Committee, and thus give us your expertise on budget matters. For that matter, you have NEVER publicly addressed the board, or this community, for the ENTIRE year, until Mr. Ayres selected you to run for the Gerner seat.

I now appeal to my friends in this community - please judge me on my past performance and on my record as a board member - not on what the new slate says in the letters or expensive advertisements. I am an independent candidate and on my own, without funds - I NEED YOUR HELP, your contributions, but most of all your VOTES. My opponents have money, power and a strong organization - they succeeded last year and have the means to do it again.

Please help me with a small contribution of just two dollars for ads and flyers - for we must elect a BALANCED BOARD OF EDUCATION IN HICKSVILLE - not one made up of three professional educators and two former PTA Officers.

Since that time the nurse shortage problem has persisted in the continued presence of stiff competition ... So to Congress it was evident that authorizing the VA greater flexibility in offering competitive salaries and benefits is a "must" and action along these lines will be taken.

will conduct and Mary Elizabeth Latorre will provide piano accompaniment.

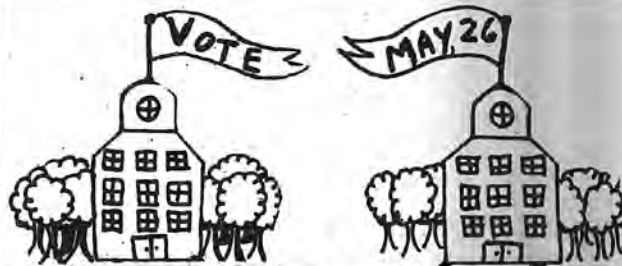
