Budget Passed - Nagle, Bennett & Singer Win Election

Hicksville residents passed the school budget, but at the annual district meeting on May 26, the predominant interest focused on the vote for school board trustees. Incumbent Thomas Nagle defeated Bernard Goldman and William Bennett won in a race against Michael Meyer. Honey Singer, who ran unopposed, was also elected.

Board President John Ayres had strongly backed Michael Meyer and Bernard Goldman in the controversial race. After the ballots were counted, Honey Singer was sworn in immediately. Thomas Nagle thanks everybody who voted for him. "It gives me renewed strength to carry on to promote better education for all the students of Hicksville," he said.

William Bennett also thanked the voters. "I have to thank the cross section of the community for supporting me because I know that it crosses a whole spectrum of

philosophy from liberal to conservative. It doesn't matter how much money you put into a campaign, you can still win with honesty and integrity," he said.

A breakdown of the vote may be found in page eleven. Virginia C. Germer, retiring vice president of the board, received 35 write in votes.

Prior to the vote counting, a regular meeting of the Board was conducted, wherein a complaint was heard about congregating teenagers, lighting and security problems around the schools. It was announced money is in the budget for increased security beginning July 1, and new lighting will be installed.

Former Board President McCormick spoke in favor of raising the salaries of teachers in Adult Education, and former Board member Frank Grimmer questioned a letter he received dissolving the Buildings and Ground

Committee, which he chairs. "All committees are dissolved when we have no more business," Mr. Ayres replied. "There is nothing else we want that committee to do this year."

The Board heard reports on the extension of the elementary Gifted and Talented program and the Junior High School Gifted and Talented Program.

Discussions were held regarding policies for Diploma requirements and Senior Citizens Privileges. Lowering the age of senior citizens entitled to free tuition in Adult Education was considered and further discussions will be held after the policy is reworded. High school diploma requirements were reviewed and 20½ credits is being considered. An evening high school diploma will require 18.5 credits, as physical education is not part of that curriculum, and special education students will be eligible

to receive a high school diploma upon successful completion of 16 units plus passing grades on the competency exams.

These policies, together with a policy revision of Selection of Textbooks will be submitted for hearing and approval of the recommended actions at subsequent meetings of the Board.

The Board adopted the proposed school year calendar for 1982-83, approved textbooks, took action on policies and handled routing business, including items relating to personnel and finance. It took action on recommendations of the Committee of the Handicapped and authorized Mr. Schwartz to make the annual inspection of the school building on June 10, 1982.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board will be June 9 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Bldg.

Hicksville Takes Aim At Chase Soccer Cup

At the Chase Soccer Cup Tournament enters it's Third Round, the Hicksville American Soccer Club still has nine teams vying for position and setting their sights on the Championship games which will be played from June 19th to 26th at Adelphi University for the 20 age groups of boys and girls.

Congratulations to the winners in Wednesday's School Board election and budget vote. We commend you and wish you well as you work on the Board to give our young people the best possible education for the tax monies so allocated in our district.

CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL — On May 7th; the advanced chorus of 32 fifth and sixth graders from Lee Avenue School performed at the New York State School Music Association Festival. The sang three numbers from level four music — the highest level allowed for elementary school. Two judges awarded the chorus an A rating and a perfect score of 120, which included grades on tone quality, intonation, diction and interpretation. The chorus is conducted by Mrs. Mignon McClain and was accompanied by Mrs. Marilyn Abt. Mr. John Mateer is Principal of Lee Avenue School.

Well, the question still remains in our eyes, no matter what the courts decision is, "Are these appointed and paid trustees now working on finding a suitable site for a replacement of this Home, which is provided for in Mr. Jones' will or do they believe that their power gives them the right to abrogate or set aside this man's will? Secondly, if they are working on this project when may we have at least an interim report ... and thirdly, if they are not working on this project, what are they working on and where are the assets from this sale to King Kullen?"

Long Island Lighting Company's 28th Annual Population Survey, released today, shows that seven of the 13 towns in Nassau and Suffolk Counties registered population increases during 1981, as did the Rockaway Peninsula of Queens.

Following the pattern of the past 24 years, Suffolk County led in population growth. Suffolk added 2,566 persons for a total of 1,290,106, or an increase of .20 percent. Nassau County's population declined by 10,194 persons, or .77 percent, to 1,305,491. The Rockaway Peninsula, which has had little population change in the past 21 years, experienced a .18 percent growth, or 172 persons.

The population of LILCO's service area is greater than that of each of 21 states and the District of Columbia. Long Island Lighting Com-

pany now serves an estimated 2,595,597 people, a total that includes 98,451 Rockaway Peninsula residents.

The Town of Brookhaven once again showed the largest population gain. Suffolk's most populous town, Brookhaven grew by 3,754 persons, a 1.02 percent rise, bringing its total population to 371,600. The Suffolk County Towns of Southampton, Babylon, East Hampton, Southold, Riverhead and Shelter Island each registered population gains, ranging from a high of 670 persons for Southampton to Shelter Island's addition of 44 persons.

Figures in LILCO's survey indicate that while the combined population for the bi-county area declined slightly — by .29 percent or 7,629 persons — in 1981, the number of households in the area continued to rise, even though the size of the

average household diminished somewhat. "Since the 1980 U.S. Census, not a single Nassau or Suffolk County major municipality (township or city) experienced a decrease in household count even

though population losses occurred," according to the survey. LILCO estimates that Nassau gained 4,349 households, and Suffolk gained 10,072 households since the Census figures were released in April, 1980.

previously approved Land Use Plan necessitated to comply with regulatory agency requirements and to permit the continued use of such facility as a landfill.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$2,279,200, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$2,165,200 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

b) By the issuance of \$114,000 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the

aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 6-a of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. District, and for modification of 1963 restrictive covenants, so as to permit on premises southwest of Charlotte Ave. on the southeast side of Duffy Ave. in Hicksville. If approved, this would be a continuation of what is already in operation. No one appeared to oppose this petition.

They reserved decision on a petition of Jay Dee Tomfor Transportation, Inc. for a special use permit to construct a building and use the premises for automotive repairs and storage and repair of school buses, in addition to gasoline storage to be provided for the private use of fueling this firm's school buses, at 34 Charlotte Ave. in Hicksville. This firm, which also has a facility in Bethpage, wishes to consolidate this operation at

its Hicksville location, which is located on the southside of West John St., west of Lombardy St. and covers three acres. A letter from Mr. Caputo of Hicksville opposed this proposed consolidation. He expressed concern about run-off and drainage problems. He also stated that in his opinion no repair work should be done in the open.

permit to maintain and operate in a Bus. G. District, a public garage, with one indoor pump in connection with cars being repaired and no gasoline pumps to serve the general public and for permission to modify a 1955 Restrictive Covenant on property on the southeast corner of Woodbury Road and Park Avenue in Hicksville.

They approved Resolutions No. 461 and 461, 1982, increasing the consultants fees for continuing consultations to provide Environmental Impact regarding the Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex, and to retain Henry Diamond, attorney, to act as legal consultant in connection with the Town's Waste Disposal Facilities. Mr. Diamond also serves as the legal consultant for the Town's Industrial Development Agency (IDA).

They approved a resolution giving a contract for more work to be done in the Hicksville and Plainview areas on the necessary underground cables for the low-sodium lighting, to Johnson Electrical of Hauppauge, who submitted the lowest bid.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the construction of various improvements at refuse disposal plants and areas throughout and in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes is \$803,040, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$762,880 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

b) By the issuance of \$40,160 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of such class of objects or purposes, is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 6-a of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual

appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said Town, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money; or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Newsday & Plainview Herald, together with a notice of

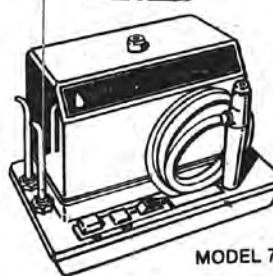

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$119,160 SERIAL BONDS AND \$6,280 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF AN ADDITION TO AND THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE EXISTING MAINTENANCE GARAGE AT THE INCINERATOR SITE.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the construction of an addition to and the reconstruction of the existing maintenance garage at the incinerator site of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$125,440, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$119,160 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and
b) By the issuance of

\$6,280 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 12(a) (1) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New

York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said Town a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, bond anticipation notes and capital notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money; or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Newsday & Plainview Herald together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 36.00 of the Local Finance Law.
