Old Bethpage Burglary
A burglary took place in the Bri-Den Construction Company, 90 Battle Row in Old Bethpage on June 8-9. Entry was made through an unlocked side window. A Polaroid camera and \$375. in U.S. currency was stolen. Detectives are investigating.

Fatal Moped Accident
A 17 year old Hicksville youth was critically injured when his moped struck a door being opened from a parked car and glanced in front of a moving car.

Michael Berris, 17, of 211 Lee Ave., Hicksville, was riding his 1980 Suzuki moped northbound on South Broadway in Hicksville when Roberto Mercado, 25, of 777 Conklin St., Farmingdale, opened the door of his 1971 Chevrolet parked 10 feet north of Hanover Place, into the path of the moped and Berris struck it. The moped then glanced off the door into the path of a 1970 Ford heading northbound being drive

"Bounce Back To Health" was the topic for discussion at the June 9 meeting of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club.

The guest speaker at the meeting was Mr. Tom Fletcher representing the Conter Company of Los Angeles, California, a manufacturer of miniature trampolines. Mr. Fletcher spoke of the advantages of exercising to keep physically fit, and demonstrated how this could be done on the mini trampoline. As Mr. Fletcher performed a series of exercises on the bouncer, he explained how it helps circulation, develops a sense of balance, and strengthens all

parts of the body. He explained further, that only a relatively small space is required to use the bouncer, and that it can be used indoors in any room, or outside in the yard, driveway or patio with equal physical benefit.

After the demonstration, several members of the Kiwanis Club tried to duplicate some of the basic bouncing exercises with various results. Tragic accidents claimed the lives of two persons in Hicksville. On Saturday, June 12, Thomas McGill, 55 of Levittown apparently suffered cardiac arrest while driving his truck on Pewter Lane, Hicksville about 4:45 p.m. His vehicle struck parked cars and he was thrown out and run over by his own vehicle. Peter Christy of Pewter Lane and Ed Zagan of Westbury started C.P.R. on the victim until arrival of Hicksville Fire Fighters and Police. He was rushed to the County Medical Center, where he died at 6:20 p.m.

Seventeen year old Michael Berris of Lee Ave., Hicksville, was on a moped traveling north on South Broadway when Roberto Mercado, 25, of Farmingdale opened his car door. Berris struck the car door and veered into the path of an auto and was struck. Hicksville Rescue Squad transported

the victim to Central General Hospital where he died at 2:40 a.m. Time of the accident was 10:22 p.m. in front of 255 So. Broadway.

Total alarms answered in May 1982 - 116; fire calls, 52; rescue calls, 53; malicious false alarms, 11.

Community Council Honors Oldtimers And A Newcomer

The Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks were the first to adopt "Flag Day" on June 14, 1907. I would like to urge my fellow citizens to write or call Assembly Speaker Fink (Albany, NY 12247) and Senator John R. Dunne (100 Gdn. City Plaza Gdn. City, NY 11530) to urge them to use their good offices to accomplish this task in the two weeks left in the session.

If such a bill is not passed, I leave it to the imagination who will have to pay for the mess.

consideration of his piece of a community above the needs of the community as a whole.

We have only to look at the soaring costs Suffolk County taxpayers have experienced since the switch to a ward system in that County to understand how easily government costs can skyrocket when a government is split into legislative pieces.
