Tragic accidents claimed the lives of two persons in Hicksville. On Saturday, June 12, Thomas McGurl, 55 of Levittown apparently suf-fered cardiac arrest while driving his truck on Pewter Lane, Hicksville about 4:45 p.m. His vehicle struck park-ed cars and he was thrown out and run over by his own vehicle. Peter Christy of Pewter Lane and Ed Zadigan of Westbury started C.P.R. on the victim until arrival of Hicksville Fire Fighters and Police. He was rushed to the County Medi-cal Center, where he died at 6:20 p.m.




