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Eighth Precinct Police Report

Fireworks Arrest
Police have arrested a Hicksville man and charged him with sale of fireworks in the rear of Sears Auto Center, Route 107, Hicksville at 7:30 P.M. on July 1.

Det. Richard Hipp while on a routine narcotics investigation approached Michael Robinson, 29, service writer, of West John St. while he was standing near his auto allegedly selling fireworks.

The defendant asked the officer if he was a cop and he replied no. A sale was made and Robinson was placed under arrest.

In the trunk of the auto was 7 large boxes containing assorted small and large type fireworks valued in excess of \$500.00.

Robinson was released on an appearance ticket and appeared at 1st District Court

in Mineola on July 2.

Jericho Diner Update
A fifth male suspect in the Jericho Townhouse diner robbery that occurred in late May was arrested on July 4 in Brooklyn, by Nassau Detectives.

The Detectives, Sergeant John Rinaldi and Raymond Store, arrested 21 year old Aubrey Bruce Rawlings of Wilson Avenue in Brooklyn, at the 71st precinct. Rawlings was being sought as the final suspect in the diner robbery that occurred early in the morning on May 25th. During that robbery, customers were terrorized for about one half hour before they were relieved of cash and valuables.

Rawlings was charged with Attempted Murder Second Degree, Robbery First Degree and Assault Second

Degree. He was arraigned in First District Court, Mineola.

Bethpage Vandalism
Some person or persons unknown did \$1,000 dollars worth of damage to a mock-up of Grumman's Lunar Module in the Bethpage Rotary Club park in a public Town of Oyster Bay Parking Field around 1:30 a.m. on July 2.

The Lunar Module was encased in four 5' by 5' panes of bulletproof glass, each pane costing \$500 dollars apiece. The vandal, or vandals, had strapped M-80's to two sections of the glass and lit the fuses. The resulting explosion ruined the two panels.

The Grumman Corporation had donated the Lunar Module replica to the Bethpage Rotary Club, who, in turn, set it up as a display in

their park section of Parking field B-5, off of Stewart Avenue, near the Bethpage railroad station.

The damage was discovered by a passing patrol officer at 5:30 a.m. as he was driving through the parking field proper. The damage would not have been seen from Stewart Avenue.

The Eighth Squad is investigating. And is asking the assistance of the Public. A male approx. 40 years of age was known to be on the platform and board an East-bound train at 1:00 A.M. which was about the time of occurrence. The Eighth Squad would like to hear from that man or anyone else who can provide any information. Phone 535-6853 all information will be kept in confidence and it is not necessary for any caller to identify themselves.

The Board of Commissioners, Hicksville Water District, through its Chairman Gilbert E. Cusick and his fellow Commissioners, Stanford Weiss and Nicholas Brigandi wish to make known the various efforts the District has made to resolve some of the numerous water quality problems confronting us.

Dr. John J. Dowling, Commissioner, Nassau County Health Department, called a meeting on May

25th, at Department Headquarters after some prior discussion between Messrs. Donohue of the Health Department and Dettloff of the Water District, to make preliminary plans for additional cooperative efforts between the two agencies in the improvement of water quality conditions in the Hicksville area.

Commissioner Dowling pointed out that he felt that the Nassau County Health Department now has a good

groundwater in the area. A discussion followed on the Syosset landfill, and the County's plan to put in five test wells and to share the information, as it develops, with the Water District. The Health Department Staff will look into Hicksville's suggestion for placing monitoring wells at the landfill site in locations other than the north perimeter.
A further meeting was set up between the Commissioners of Hicksville and Jericho Water Districts, to appraise what is going on in the area by the Health Department, and to ask for and develop a joint program of activity to the betterment of all water supply interests in the area. The meeting date was set for June 16th, a report of this will be made in next week's edition of the Herald, as it is worthy of separate reporting.

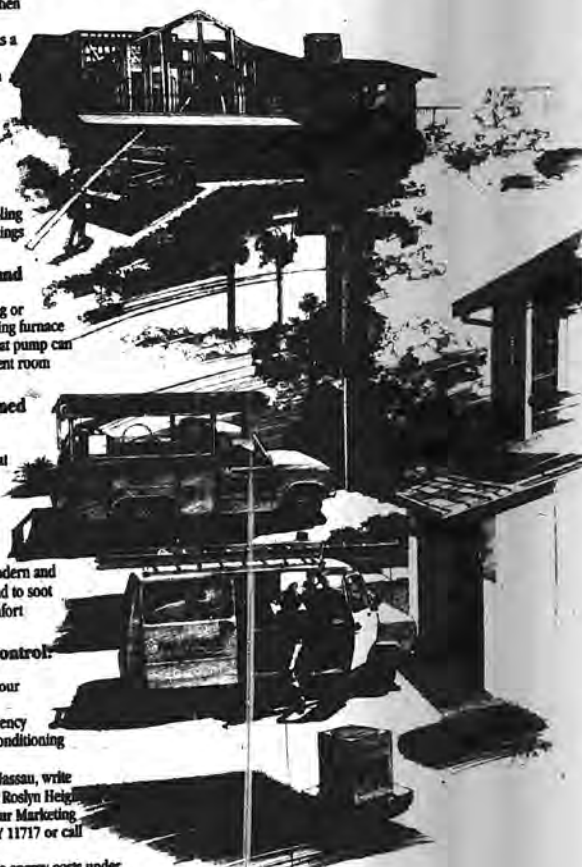

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News From LILCO

Long Island Lighting Company announced that, despite recent oil price increases, the fuel cost adjustment (FCA) will be reflected on monthly electric bills for July as a credit, rather than a charge, for the fourth consecutive month.

The monthly bill, exclusive of taxes and service charges, for a typical household that uses 600 kilowatt hours of electricity during July will be \$6.38, or 8.9 percent, lower than the bill for equivalent electric consumption in July of last year. The credit for a 600 kilowatt hour bill this July will be \$2.02.

Airman Carlton Copp III, son of Karen E. Copp of Bridle Lane in Hicksville, has graduated from the U.S. Air Force electronic communication systems repair course at Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas. Copp will now serve at Kelly Air Force Base, Texas, with the 693rd Electronic Security Squadron. He is a 1980 graduate of Hicksville High School.

Economy measures taken offset recent price increases for the oil that the utility uses to generate electricity, but also saved customers more than \$5 million.

By purchasing less expensive nuclear, coal, and water power from upstate utilities, and burning excess natural gas to generate electricity, LILCO avoided burning 722,000 barrels of oil for a total savings of \$5.4 million.

LILCO purchases economy power from other utilities and substitutes natural gas for oil in its generators whenever either or both of these alternatives are available.

In the first six months of this year, these alternatives have enabled the utility to displace 3,564,000 barrels of oil and save more than \$28 million. These savings have been passed along to LILCO's 900,000 electric customers through the FCA, a mechanism that enables a utility to reflect fuel cost changes in a timely fashion.

Editorial

A Balanced Budget Amendment

There is no reason that the federal government cannot balance its budget - NOW!

If you or I fail to balance our own checkbooks, we get into serious trouble. We can be fined, lose our good credit ratings, or even go to jail. Yet lawmakers in Washington seem to think that it's okay to spend more than they take in. Since 1960, Congress has balanced the federal budget only two times. This is an almost criminal disregard for good sense and sound judgment.

This is why I actively support a balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution. An amendment to the Constitution will force Congress to act responsibly and do what the American people know is right.

I believe that there are several important advantages to an amendment of this kind. First, it would force the Congress to limit spending. For the past twenty-five years, Members of Congress have been spending our money as if it grew on trees. It's time that we started to cut back on unnecessary programs, to eliminate fraud and abuse, and to start making government bureaucrats accountable for what they spend.

A second advantage is that the amendment will give Congress the economic flexibility it needs in emergencies. In times of war or during severe economic situations, Congress can vote to spend more than it takes in so that it can handle the crisis.

Third, the amendment makes Members of Congress more accountable to the people. Under the balanced budget amendment, Congress would have to vote directly for deficit spending and on tax increases. The appropriations procedures and tax bracket creep make it very difficult for people to understand what's happening until it's too late. And it's too late when you're paying more taxes, bringing home less pay, and getting ripped apart by high interest rates.

It's obvious that something has to be done to force Congress to do the right thing. Excessive government spending and government taxation are hurting all of us. If it takes a Constitutional Amendment to stop these foolish policies, then let's do it. The time is right, and the time is right now!

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Beware The Dangers Of Summer

Summer is upon us and already the hospital emergency rooms are full—fire and police rescue crews are busy. People are injuring themselves at a record rate. We wish to remind residents of the dangers:

- Never spray lighter fluid on burning coals. Never use gasoline as a starter—it is explosive. (A man in Suffolk County was seriously burned using gasoline.)
- Use caution in storing chlorine for your pool. Don't store large quantities—keep it in a dry place—keep out of the sun.
- Be sure there is no exposed electrical equipment near your swimming pool.
- Propane barbecue grill owners—don't store propane in or near the house. As men-

tioned before, propane can be dangerous if you do not know how to handle it.

Courtesy of the Conservative Gas Co., the following are some hints for the safe use of propane:

Ten Helpful Hints On SAFE USE OF 20 Lb. GAS TANK

1. ALWAYS store and transport in UPRIGHT position.
2. NEVER store INDOORS or any place that is not well ventilated.
3. DO NOT TRANSPORT IN CAR TRUNK; MAKE CERTAIN care is taken to insure that tank does NOT TIP over when being transported. KEEP car WINDOW partially OPEN, AND DO NOT SMOKE.

tank "OFF" when gas is not being used and BEFORE disconnecting from barbecue.

5. TEST ALL connections with a mild soap-suds solution. IF BUBBLES form, a LEAK exists and the fitting should be tightened or replaced.

6. ALWAYS keep OPEN FLAMES and CIGARETTES AWAY from gas tanks and lines.

7. NEVER OPERATE WITHOUT the use of an approved regulator.

8. If possible, KEEP TANK in a COOL, SHADED place and NOT in direct sun.

9. PAINT ONLY WHITE or other light reflective color.

10. Should you have ANY QUESTIONS regarding your

barbecue or your LP-GAS equipment, CONTACT the Branch office nearest you.

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Spider Mites Like It Hot

These microscopic pests can be tough. They greedily feed on nearly all native, exotic, deciduous, broadleaf and needlebearing evergreen ornamentals and shade trees. Most of this injury occurs during summer's hot, dry weather.

Spider mites suck plant juices and chlorophyll from the leaves as well as other tender parts of the selected host. This infested foliage then becomes mottled or pale in appearance, and may even turn brown and drop prematurely.

Stich insects can frequently be controlled with an insecticide. A miticide should be combined with the insecticide. A miticide should be combined with the insecticide to prevent future spider mite problems. Be sure to thoroughly spray the lower surface of the foliage where mites especially like to feed.

To correctly diagnose and treat an infestation of these and other sap-sucking insects on your plants and trees, consult the local

New York State Arborist ISA member in your neighborhood before the damage spreads.

Blood Supplies Are Critically Low: Colby

The month of July heralds the start of vacation time, but to our local hospitals the summer season signals the beginning of a period of time when blood supplies reach critical lows. There is always a demand for blood but, because of a rise in the number of accidents due to summertime travel and recreation activities, the summer months present a crucial problem.

Since blood cannot be stored for more than a few weeks, fresh donations are constantly needed. Only about four percent of our population donates blood, so our suppliers must rely on imports from Europe to provide almost 40 percent of the needs for the New York Metropolitan area. Our Long Island hospitals alone require more than 500 pints a day for the treatment of patients with hemophilia, anemia and leukemia as well as for surgical patients and accident victims.

Oyster Bay Town employees will be participating in their annual blood program during the month of July, and I would like to encourage all Town residents to participate in

similar programs this summer. The donation procedure is simple and takes a very short time to complete. Donors are screened and a careful medical history is taken. Except for unusual circumstances, healthy people can easily spare one pint of blood. The fluid lost through donation will be replaced in about 24 hours and the red blood cells will be replaced in about eight weeks. Giving blood is no major sacrifice for the donor, but is critical to the person who is on the receiving end.

In most communities there is at least one organization—employer, church, temple, fraternal or civic—that has a blood program. If you don't know of one, call Long Island Blood Services at 752-7300. They'll know where you can go to donate blood.

Our local hospitals' need for blood never goes away—especially during the summer months. Please consider donating before you leave for vacation this summer. One-half hour of your time donating one pint of blood will help keep our blood supplies from "taking a holiday" during this critical time of year.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,165,200 SERIAL BONDS AND \$114,000 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE ORIGINAL IMPROVEMENT OF THE OLD BETHPAGE LANDFILL IN AND FOR SAID TOWN.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the original improvement of the Old Bethpage Landfill in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau

County, New York, in accordance with a previously approved Land Use Plan necessitated to comply with regulatory agency requirements and to permit the continued use of such facility as a landfill.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$2,279,200, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$2,165,200 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and

b) By the issuance of \$114,000 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty years, pursuant to subdivision 6-a of paragraph 1 of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such

notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on the taxable real property of said Town a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, bond anticipation notes and capital notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money; or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Newsday and Plainview Herald, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 31.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law.
