School Board To Refurbish High School Auditorium

A new push button microphone system was an added attraction to the July 14 Board of Education meeting officiated by recently elected President Charlene Anci. Sketches were distributed of the proposed renovating of the Hicksville High School auditorium to correct acoustical problems and refurbish the seats. The estimated cost of the project is \$95,000. There will be advertisements for bids at a future date.

Ms. Anci will be contacting the community through Ms. Alayne Shoenfeld to recruit people to serve on committees. The following people volunteered to chair committees: Honey G.

Singer - Community Relations, Jay M. Schwartz - Policy, Larry Wolfson - Budget, William P. Bennett - Nassau/Suffolk Legislation, Daniel E. Arena - Long Range Planning, Virginia Germer and Neil McCormack will co-chair Adult and Continuing Education.

The Board passed resolutions to take action on amending policy regarding the selection of textbooks, recommendations of the Committee of the Handicapped, awarded bids and approved warrants.

Following a lengthy Executive Session, Personnel matters were acted on by the Board. It received the resignation because of retirement of Robert E. Whearty, Prin-

cipal of the Dutch Lane School, effective July 1, 1983. The Board appointed Joyce E. Millstein as one of the coordinators of the Elementary Gifted and Talented Program.

The Board also accepted the resignation because of retirement of Mignon McClain, elementary music teacher, effective July 25, 1982. It approved a one year leave of absence extension for Howard Schwartz, industrial arts teacher and a leave of absence for David Persinger, math teacher. It approved the abolition of 2 senior high academic tenure area positions, 2 junior high academic tenure area positions and 4 elementary classroom tenure area positions.

It created position as follows: Industrial arts tenure area - 1 position, home economics tenure area 0.8 positions, physical education tenure area 0.2 positions. It approved appointments and recalled to service Michael De Angelis, an excessed teacher. The Board approved Oyster Bay Matching Funds Youth Activity Program Supervisory Changes and Extra Classroom Activities Advisors. It handled resignations and appointments of Civil Service Personnel.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board will be July 28 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Bldg.

Local Water District Officials Probe Further Into Water Quality Concerns

The members of the Board of Commissioners, Hicksville Water District, their Superintendent and Consulting Engineer, together with similar representatives of the Jericho Water District, were invited by Dr. John J. Dowling, M.D., Commissioner of Nassau County Department of Health, to meet with him on June 16, for a briefing on the scope and status of the program to monitor groundwater quality beneath the Syosset Landfill and to share such other information with the group concerning the project and to solicit support for his department's effort with regard to those whose discharges exceed groundwater limits on quality.

Both water districts expressed a strong desire to willingly share in the

Commissioner's presentation and in turn did request certain other information which he has since provided.

Asked for and received, was a complete summary of the MEK Spill in Hicksville on February 16, 1982. Dr. Dowling's department will continue to encourage EPA involvement to the extent of evaluating the spill. He also provided copies of his letters to the DEC and to the EPA - Region II.

Also provided the districts was a list of industries discharging industrial waste to the ground within the boundaries of the Jericho and Hicksville Districts. He has indicated that he will continue to work with the Department of Public Works to obtain compliance with Department ordinances re-

quiring industries to hook up to sanitary sewers within two years.

We were also presented upon request a summary of matters which have been referred to the DEC for enforcement action. Dr. Dowling pledged to continue to work with the DEC to resolve matters referred to them for enforcement. Responsibility for assuring satisfactory quality of drinking water is shared by Federal, State, and County governments under the general provisions of law relating to protection of public health and welfare. Regulatory responsibility rests with the USEPA, SHD, NYDEC, and NCDH. Quality control of drinking water delivered to the consumer is a basic responsibility of the water supplier.

Despite such well defined areas of responsibility all those present felt it proper

for the Commissioners to communicate their concerns to the EPA requesting evaluation and enforcement where necessary and to make the same information available to our legislators in the State Assembly and Senate, requesting their assistance in pressing our appeal to the DEC and EPA.

Each of the Legislators for our area and the local Commissioners hold office by virtue of the same electorate entrusting them with certain community concerns, therefore, on behalf of the common good, Chairman Cusick, Commissioners Weiss and Brigandi, did make known in letter form to the various agencies and legislators the matters put forth above. Very shortly, the Hicksville Water District will outline some of its own plans designed to help maintain the high quality of water supplied to our consumers.

Good News From LILCO

On July 5 Long Island Lighting Company announced that, despite recent oil price increases, the fuel cost adjustment (FCA) will be reflected on monthly electric bills for July as a credit, rather than a charge, for the fourth consecutive month. The monthly bill, exclusive of taxes and service charges, for a typical household that uses 600 kilowatt hours of electricity during July will be \$6.38, or 8.9 percent lower than the bill for equivalent electric consumption in July of last year. The credit for a

600 kilowatt hour bill this July will be \$2.02. Economy measures taken in June by LILCO not only offset recent price increases for the oil that the utility uses to generate electricity, but also saved customers more than \$5 million. By purchasing less expensive nuclear, coal, and water power from upstate utilities, and burning excess natural gas to generate electricity, LILCO avoided burning 722,000 barrels of oil for a total savings of \$5.4 million. LILCO purchases

economy power from other utilities and substitutes natural gas for oil in its generators whenever either or both of these alternatives are available. In the first six months of this year, these alternatives have enabled the utility to displace 3,564,000 barrels of oil and save more than \$28 million. These savings have been passed along to LILCO's 900,000 electric customers through the FCA, a mechanism that enables a utility to reflect fuel cost changes in a timely fashion.

Landmark Hazardous Waste Legislation Passed By Senate

The problem of toxic waste and how to dispose of it will be directly addressed by legislation sponsored by Senator John R. Dunne and passed by both the Senate and Assembly. Dunne, Chairman of the Senate Conservation and Recreation Committee, said that the legislation would:

- establish a state superfund to investigate and clean up inactive hazardous waste sites.
- establish financial assurance requirements for closure and post-closure monitoring of hazardous waste facilities.

Another bill passed by the Senate would establish a mechanism to plan and site hazardous waste facilities on a regional basis.

The "superfund" legislation would place a surcharge on generators of hazardous waste. A per-ton charge on the generation of such waste would be scaled to discourage landburial and to encourage other methods of disposal such as incineration and recycling. The fund, known as the Hazardous Waste Remediation Fund, is designed to raise ten million dollars annually for use in investigating and prioritizing inactive sites, remediation of high priority abandoned sites, and response to emergency spills.

At the end of 18 months, the Department of Environmental Conservation is to submit to the Legislature a prescription for the clean up of the worst inactive hazardous waste sites, the cost and timetable for such a pro-

gram and recommendations as to future funding. A State Superfund Management Board is constituted to oversee the Department's report and recommendations and it is contemplated that the Legislature will adjust the funding mechanism to meet the projected needs for such a program.

The other bill directs the Department of Environmental Conservation to promulgate regulations establishing adequate financial assurances and guarantees so that sufficient funds will be available to fully pay for the costs of closure and post-closure monitoring of hazardous waste facilities and to ensure against failures during the operational life. Among the methods and instruments available to satisfy these requirements are trust funds, bonds, letters of credit, corporate guarantees and insurance.

The Senate also passed a bill that would have established a nine member state Hazardous Waste Management and Planning Commission. The commissioner would prepare and adopt a state hazardous waste management plan within 18 months. The plan would also include an analysis of the contemporary hazardous waste generation stream and result in the designation of areas suitable for the establishment of regional hazardous waste disposal facilities.

"This package of bills establishes the framework for a comprehensive

hazardous waste program designed to clean up our mistakes of the past and to prevent them in the future," said Senator Dunne.

"It is our intention to thoroughly examine the abandoned site problem in this state through record searches, field investigations and testing and to establish a remedial program to clean up high priority sites identified. In addition, the fund will allow us the flexibility to respond immediately to hazardous waste related emergencies.

"Just as important is the establishment of a system to provide adequate and safe hazardous waste disposal capacity in the future. By requiring financial guarantees of owners and operators of hazardous waste facilities and by structuring our disposal capacity in a manner to meet regional needs, we can be assured of never again leaving buried in the ground a legacy of wastes to jeopardize the health and well being of future generations.

"These bills reflect a willingness on the part of New York State government to commit itself to the revitalization of areas plagued by abandoned hazardous waste sites and to the prevention of such problems in the future. Honest disagreements about how best to achieve these goals still remain, but our actions today lay the foundation for a comprehensive long-term solution," Senator Dunne said.

Gas Rate Revision Proposed By LILCO

On July 12, the Long Island Lighting Company filed a revision to its current gas rates with the Public Service Commission. The revision is designed to reflect wage and property tax increases that became effective after the current gas rates went into effect in November 1981. At that time, the PSC directed

the utility to file for a rate adjustment once wage and property tax changes were known to the company.

Should the Commission approve the rate revision as filed by LILCO, monthly bills for customers who use gas for cooking would increase 13c to \$9.88. Customers using

approximately 2,600 cubic feet of gas for water heating would see a monthly bill of \$19.58, a 21 c increase. For residential space heating customers, who use approximately 30,000 cubic feet of gas in a winter month, bills would increase by \$1.58 to \$176.03.

At The Town Board Meeting

At its regular meeting held on Tuesday, July 13, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay acted on the following local matters:

They approved a resolution relating to approval of the site plan of Hess Realty Corp Gas Station on Jericho Tpke., in Jericho. This hearing was held on June 15.

They set an August 31 hearing for Twin County Recycling Corp. for a special use permit to manufacture asphalt on West John Street, west of Lombardy Street in Hicksville.

They approved a special use permit permitting the Maine Maid Inn in Jericho to seat 236 people.

They approved a resolution relating to the petition of Samuel Goldstein for a special use permit to operate a deli in an existing building on Robbins Lane in Syosset.

They approved a resolution relating to the Map of Hunters Run in Woodbury recommending that the Town accept cash in lieu of parkland from the owner of this property.

They approved a resolution increasing fees for engineering services by consultants on repairs to the Plainview-Old Bethpage Community Park Pool.

The approved a resolution relating to the final acceptance of a contract for the hearing system renovation at the DPW Office in Syosset.

They approved a resolution authorizing "no parking, no stopping" signs to be placed along the northern curb line of the LIRR Station in Syosset for 52 feet.

They approved a resolution relating to the modification of restrictive covenants which state that there can be no more parking, and that no variances can be requested for either side or rear yards extensions, on the petition of Salvatore J. Presti and J. Marc Sugarman, d/b/a Baysep Associates in Hicksville.

They approved a resolution relating to parking restrictions on Second St. in Hicksville, which will permit more parking for the Hicksville Library. This is a temporary measure.

They approved a resolution relating to quantity increases on work being done in the Blueberry Lane area of Hicksville, a Nassau County Sewer Contract.

They set an August 31 hearing date and directed the Town Clerk to advertise the hearing on a petition of Mark Lazarovic and Helen

J. Walsh for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O Residence Office District on the southwest corner of Old Country Rd and Margaret Dr. in Plainview.

At the request of the petitioners they postponed until the Tues., Sept 14 meeting, hearings.

(1) the petition of the Midhampton Asphalt Co., Inc. for a special use permit to install and maintain a portable asphalt plant in an Ind. H District on the north side of Duffy's Lane and the east side of Charlotte St., in Hicksville, and

(2) the petition of Parkland Plaza Associates, for a special use permit to erect and maintain in an Ind. H District, two office buildings and a warehouse as to Parcel "A" and for permission to rescind and remove restrictive covenants 1,2 and 3, requiring erection and maintenance of a fence as to Parcel "B" north of the intersection of Charlotte St. and Duffy's Lane and east of Charlotte St. in Hicksville.

Both of these hearings are scheduled for a day and an evening hearing on Tuesday, Sept 14 at the Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay.

They reserved decision on the petition of Ren Marv Realty, Inc. for a special use permit to maintain an office use in an Ind. H District for an existing building located

in a cul-de-sac on Ames Court on the southwest corner of Terminal Drive South in Plainview. The petition was represented by Attorney Wayne Edwards. Five people spoke in opposition to this petition. The Town has already taken this landlord into court on present violations of this building. Those who spoke in opposition were residents. They spoke of this landlord's lack of good faith in providing the required buffer zone. They also said that the landlord had put windows in the second floor of this building which look down upon their nearby gardens and backyards and that he had also provided lights on his building which light up their properties at all times.

They approved a resolution relating to the Map of Rustic Acres in Plainview, recommending that the Town accept cash in lieu of parkland from the owner of this property.

They approved a resolution granting permission to the Plainview Fire Dept to use roll-off containers in connection with the 9th Battalion Parade and Drill on August 6-9.

The next regular meeting of the Town Board is set for Tuesday, July 27, starting at 10 am at Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay.

The United States Congress has, by Joint Resolution, designated July 9, 1982, as National P.O.W. - M.I.A. Recognition, reported Congressman Norman Lent, our elected representative.

It may come as a shock to some readers to learn that more than two thousand American servicemen who were taken prisoner or listed as Missing in action during the Vietnam War have never been accounted for. More than nine years ago, when the U.S. signed the peace treaty which ended U.S. participation in the Vietnam War, the communist rulers of North Vietnam promised to return all Prisoners of War, as well as the remains of those Americans who died in communist - controlled areas of Southeast Asia.

Congressman Lent said that promise was never kept. Today, nearly a decade later, the families of hundreds of missing Americans still do not know

the fate of their servicemen. Their anguish continues. The Vietnamese communists claim they have no knowledge of any prisoners still being held. But many reliable eyewitness accounts of American prisoners still come out of Vietnam.

The Vietnamese communists claim they have no knowledge of the whereabouts of the bodies of any American servicemen. Yet, within the past year, American intelligence officials discovered that bodies of several hundred Americans were being held by the Vietnamese, said Lent.

The cruel and inhuman attitude of the Vietnamese communist regime violates every concept of international standards of humane conduct regarding prisoners of war. They must be made to give a full accounting of every missing American. We must not rest until that accounting is delivered.
