Newbridge Road Trees Uprooted!

To everyone's surprise and amazement, early this week crews came onto Newbridge Road and, from Old Country Road right down to the Town Line, uprooted many of the beautiful, mature trees which have been such an addition to this neighborhood for many years. One by one the trees were toppled and soon the area began to look like a disaster scene!

On Tuesday neighbors began calling Town, County and State officials to discover how this could be accomplished without a public notice or a warning of any sort. Most of these elected officials knew nothing about it. Slowly the facts began to emerge ... but, as they emerged more and more trees were uprooted, in fact, it seemed that because of the investigations now going on, the project was speeded up ... but that, of course, could not be proved.

State Assemblyman Fred Parola said, "I was really appalled at the callous action taken here ... it amounts to bureaucratic legislation ... it certainly is as final as any legislation could be!"

Mr. Parola explained that, as he researched the problem, he was told by County officials that the New York State Dept of Transportation (DOT) required the median to be opened for emergency vehicles and normal traffic flow while the Nassau County sewer work was being done in the other lanes of Newbridge Road.

Mrs. Jean Flood of the West Green Civic Association said, "Never has such wholesale destruction of our historical environment been accomplished so swiftly and WITHOUT PUBLIC NOTICE. Most of the trees on the Newbridge Rd. median have been uprooted and are gone

now from us forever. Six remain now (Thursday am) at the West Green median, and we are at the mercy of our planners for a concrete jungle. We demand no further defoliation, and immediate planning for the restoration of trees and grass already removed."

Mrs. Phyllis T. Garvin of Albatross Rd., Levittown, said, "It was a shock to see that the trees were suddenly gone from the center of Newbridge Road from Old Country Road all the way south to Fordham Ave in Hicksville. Other trees have also been removed in the Levittown area, apparently needlessly since in the Town of Hempstead the sewer lines have been in for years. I have phoned Assemblyman Fred Parola and his aides who themselves have not been able to receive answers to questions regarding this disaster. I also phoned Mr. Purcell's office and at present (Thursday am) we are awaiting two officials who the county are sending over to discuss this problem. As yet they haven't arrived. We need the help of other concerned community people to prevent the loss of the remaining six trees at the West Village Green, and I will personally do all I can to prevent their loss. We feel that the State Environmental Protection Agency should also move quickly to stop this. Remember ... only God can make a tree."

Mrs. William Bennett, 4-H leader and Hicksville Library Trustee said, "I was really shocked at this horrendous act. I thought that there was a law that trees cannot be removed without a permit, even by a homeowner ... how can the State take such powers upon itself? There was no public notice

whatsoever regarding this matter. However, at this point, I ask this question ... What will replace these beautiful trees and when? We do not want an asphalt jungle in Hicksville."

Assemblyman Parola also pledged to do all that he can to see that nothing like this ever happens again. I'm going to propose legislation that will require a public hearing where people will have the right to be heard and to require that alterna-

tive approaches be implemented if possible," he promised.

"It was discouraging to hear," he continued, that the State Environmental Agency contends that, pursuant to Federal guidelines, large trees are not to be replaced once they are removed from narrow medians. However, I will look into what can be replanted to restore the natural environment and greenery to the Newbridge Road medians," he concluded.

THE WAY IT USED TO BE... in 1955. It was in that year the Town of Oyster Bay began a full-scale recreation program utilizing more than 80 playgrounds. These 80 parcels of land were set aside by developers of homes built during the preceding few years. With a great deal of foresight, our elected officials succeeded in getting developers to set aside three percent of their land for play areas.

The first step in the playground plan was the appointment of an advisory committee which included many Hicksville residents: Mrs. William Orton; Chester Jaworski, athletic director for Hicksville Schools; Louis Millevolte; and Thomas Murray, active in Little League work.

Following the advisory group's findings and recommendations, the then Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay, Lewis N. Waters, appointed a five-man Recreation Commission, headed by

a full-time Commissioner, to supervise operation of the play areas.

Peter S. Hussey was appointed the first Park Commissioner. Hussey envisioned swimming pools, ice skating rinks, band stands, and outdoor dance platforms, as well as the usual athletic equipment, handball courts, and ball fields for utilization by TOB residents. His visions became realities.

Current Park Commissioner is Tom Gallahue, Hicksville. Tom is responsible for the maintenance and operation of 8 beaches, 4 community park pools, three outdoor ice rinks, two Town marinas, one boat basin, three boat launching ramps, three Town Park complexes, eleven meeting rooms, two showmobiles, ten picnic areas available for reservations, fifty ballfields, twenty-one athletic fields, thirty tennis courts, two parcourse trails, two paddle ball courts, numerous handball and basketball courts, 168

neighborhood parklets, all for our use.

Throughout 12 months, pool or rink machinery, field maintenance or beach and marina maintenance is done by members of the TOB Department of Parks and Recreation. It's a tremendous amount of work - but also a tremendous amount of enjoyment for our residents.

During each summer, an intense recreational program is available for children at six locations throughout the Town. Additionally, there are various recreational leagues for men and women to join; a smokers' withdrawal workshop, lessons in self-defense and many more programs available.

They felt that the trees would interfere with the workmen and make traffic jams... so, without a word to anyone, CUT THEM DOWN..... beautiful healthy trees, that, even if they are replaced, the new ones will take generations to grow to the size of the ones that have been ripped up! At The Town Board Meeting

Ten residents appeared in opposition to the petition of Gordon and Joyce Goldsmith for a change of zone from Res. E to Bus F of a house, 93 Duffy Avenue, on the south side of Duffy Ave west from the west side of Newbridge Road in Hicksville. A signed affidavit in favor of this proposed change of zone was presented by the owner of 89 Duffy Avenue. The petition wishes to use this house as a sales office. He is a job printer, but, it was stated that no printing was to be done on the premises. However, the petitioners do not live in this house.

Residents in opposition stated that they feared the domino effect on permitting even one business to start in a residential area. They also said that delivery trucks are dropping off packages and materials to this house regularly. The residents do not want their area to change into a business area.

Sup. Colby stated that throughout the entire Township the Board attempts at all times to keep residential areas intact, if at all possible. The Board reserved decision on this petition.

had complained regarding the suitability of their streets being used for this purpose, officials of the Fire Dept., of the Supervisor's office and the Supt. of Highways worked together to find a more suitable site for this year's tournament. Parola Explains Senior Citizen Benefits

Significant headway was made this session in relieving the senior citizen tax burden according to Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C Watahg).

Parola said, "The elderly living on fixed incomes find it difficult to meet the financial demands of our economy. Various pieces of legislation would enable the qualifying elderly to maintain their own homes while receiving real property tax relief.

"Of note are several bills, some which have been signed into law and others which have passed the two houses of the Legislature and now await action by Governor Carey.

"Under terms of a new law, greater numbers of senior citizens living on low and fixed incomes now qualify for a partial real property tax exemption. Recently signed legislation raises the maximum income eligibility

restriction for the seniors real property tax relief program from \$9,200 to \$10,500 annually. The program operates on the local level and municipal participation is optional. However, presiding Supervisor Gullota has recently announced he has taken the step necessary for seniors in our area to take advantage of the tax break.

"By increasing the maximum income eligibility provisions of the law, the impact of inflation is lessened for these individuals.

"In addition, persons on Social Security annually receive a cost-of-living increase. For some seniors this increase raises their income high enough to make them ineligible for the real property tax exemption they had been receiving.

"The hike in the eligibility level will insure that a senior's eligibility for this

program will be continued after the Social Security cost-of-living increases.

"Another new law enables homeowners aged 65 and over to apply for a second mortgage in order to pay their property taxes. It should be noted that these loans do not have to be paid until the property has been sold.

"Unfortunately, Governor Carey vetoed legislation which would have provided a sliding scale tax relief for persons 65 years of age or older whose income exceeds the ceiling set down by the locality.

"I fully supported this measure which provides seniors whose income exceeds the local limit with relief from the property tax burden. These seniors face the same inflationary pressures that those in a lower income bracket face and therefore should be granted

relief in proportion to their income.

"As a result of legislation passed last year the 'circuit breaker' program has been extended through 1984 and raises the household income eligibility level to \$16,000 per year.

"Also effective this year persons 5 1/2 years of age or older can exempt the first \$20,000 of private pension from their state income taxes.

"The passage of these bills represents a positive step for our senior population especially for those who have had difficulty retaining their residences as a result of skyrocketing inflation and the dramatic increase in real property taxes.

"Although this legislation indicates an active session," Parola concluded, "much more needs to be done in the future to improve our quality of life for all of Nassau County's senior citizens."

Mail-Order Complaints Solved By Inspectors

Complaints about unsatisfactory mail-order transactions are continuing to be resolved at a very high rate by the Postal Inspection Service's Consumer Complaint Program, according to Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Anthony M. Murello.

"Mail-order complaints were resolved 93 percent of the time at the same time the number of complaints increased in Fiscal Year 1981," Postmaster Murello said.

The Inspection Service resolved 38,860 of the 45,030

complaints received last year, according to the postmaster. It was the fifth year in a row that postal inspectors were able to resolve mail-order complaints more than 86 percent of the time.

The Consumer Complaint Program was begun in July of 1974 to separate fraud and misrepresentation complaints from those involving inefficient business practices on the part of mail-order companies or a simple lack of communication between the consumer and the business.

"When an inquiry to my office indicates some basic lack of communication between the business and a customer," Postmaster Murello said, "the Inspection Service contacts a firm on behalf of the consumer and asks for an appropriate adjustment."

Details of any unsatisfactory mail-order transaction will be forwarded to Postal Inspectors, according to the postmaster.

ARE CHRISTIANS AN ENDANGERED SPECIES?

Are Christians an endangered species? This is really not the most pleasant question to consider. But at some time or another I would imagine we have all thought about it somewhat. Perhaps not in the same words, but the same concern.

Disappointment is often the breeding ground of

questions of doubt about the future. More than this we live in a world that some have referred to as the post-Christian era. Several years ago a man survived an air crash and said later, "In the hour when death was upon me, I did not think to ask, 'Am I right with God?' but, 'Is my insurance paid up?'"

Before we go any further, let us find comfort and assurance in God's Word.

Speaking of Jesus, in John 1, it says, "His life is the light that shines through the darkness - and the darkness can never extinguish it." Never, it says. The power of God's light can never be extinguished. The good news about Jesus will always be good news. Sin will have its triumphs, but it never will completely prevail. Even though atheistic communism

has consumed more than half of the world, its success will always be limited. Torture is visited upon some of our Christian brothers and sisters who share their faith under the flag of the hammer and sickle. But the light has gone out. Children are ripped from Christian families never to be returned because their parents are soldiers of the Cross. But the light has not gone out.

Unfortunately, danger to Christianity does not only come from the outside but also from within. I would like to consider with you three of the dangers from within. We will call them Christianity's

sin from within.

For the 8 of sin from within, there is the endangering problem of self-centeredness. Often we get so caught up with our own church or our own denomination that our world view of Christianity doesn't go much beyond our congregation's front door. In our quest to preserve our peculiar understandings of Scripture, we often fail to bask in the good

news of a Christ who stands at the center of Scripture. The New Testament abounds with encouragement for us to be one with each other - to rejoice in that which unites us in the Body of Christ rather than to dwell upon our theological idiosyncrasies. It is incongruous with Christianity for us to separate ourselves from other Christians

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,447,200 SERIAL BONDS AND \$128,800 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE RESURFACING AND RECONSTRUCTION OF VARIOUS ROADS LOCATED THROUGHOUT AND IN AND FOR SAID TOWN.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The class of objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the resurfacing and reconstruction of vari-

ous roads located throughout and in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, including road stripping thereon and the purchase and installation of traffic signs and devices necessary in connection therewith.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such class of objects or purposes is \$2,576,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$2,447,200 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law;

b) By the issuance of \$128,800 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and use thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivisions 20(c) and 20(d) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such

notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

LEGAL NOTICE

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said Town a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, bond anticipation notes and capital notes may be contested only if:

1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or

2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in Massapequa Post, Plainview Herald, Bethpage Tribune and Oyster Bay Guardian, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law.

of the lot, except that parking structures may cover an additional twenty-five (25) percent of the lot.

SECTION MFO-5.4. LOT AREA

The lot area delineated by lot lines shall not be less than the total area of the premises described in a lease agreement adopted by the Nassau County Board of Supervisors, but in no case less than six (6) acres.

SECTION MFO-5.5. FLOOR AREA RATIO

The maximum floor area ratio shall be .5.

SECTION MFO-5.6. SETBACKS

No building or structure shall be located closer to a front lot line than one hundred (100) feet or less than fifty (50) feet from any other lot line.

SECTION MFO-5.7. ACCESSORY PARKING

Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 14, Section G-19.0 thereof, of the Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Hempstead, off-street parking shall be provided as follows:

SECTION MFO-5.7.1. Parking shall be provided on premises or within three hundred (300) feet thereof.

SECTION MFO-5.7.2. Parking shall not be located within fifty (50) feet of an existing or proposed roadway, street, highway or parkway, nor within twenty-five (25) feet of a lot line, including that portion of a parking space used for back-up.

SECTION MFO-5.7.3. Parking spaces shall be substantially screened from public view by walls and/or planting.

SECTION MFO-5.7.4. Off-street parking shall be provided at a ratio of one (1) space for every two hundred fifty (250) square feet of total floor area.

SECTION MFO-5.8. OFF-STREET LOADING

Off-street loading spaces with a minimum size of twelve (12) feet by thirty-five (35) feet, and a vertical clearance of fourteen (14) feet, shall be provided based on the gross floor area of the building as follows:

SECTION MFO-5.9. LANDSCAPING AND UTILITIES

All areas not used for structures, parking and loading areas or accessways shall be planted and maintained in grass, shrubs and trees in conformance with a landscape plan approved by the Town of Hempstead. All wiring, feed lines, energy sources (except solar) and all equipment accessory to all utilities shall be placed underground.

SECTION MFO-5.10. APPLICATION PROCEDURE

A. Any application made pursuant to the provisions of this Section shall originate by an application to the Town Board.

B. In the event that the Town Board approves said application, it may attach certain conditions to said approval, which conditions shall become an integral part thereof. The Town Board may, by resolution, dispense in part with conformity with the provisions applicable to the Mitchell Field Office District II (MFO-II), and may impose safeguards and conditions as it may deem appropriate, necessary or desirable to promote the spirit and objectives of Section 5, including but not limited to restrictive covenants pertaining to the area defined in the petition for rezoning, including the site plan submitted on behalf of the application, together with other agreements, if any, in recordable form and running with the land.

There is no virtue in loving someone who is lovable. Anyone can do that - even non-believers. There is no virtue in loving someone with whom we agree, that is almost like loving oneself. Anyone can do that - even

non-believers. Jesus said, "If you love only those who love you, what good is that? Even scoundrels do that much. If you are friendly only to your friends, how are you different from anyone else? Even the heathens do

that." But there is virtue in uninhibited, unconditioned love. We are called by Jesus to embrace with forgiving love a brother or sister who has disappointed or even offended us. Forgiveness flows in a church when the Spirit of God resides in its members. Love that knows no conditions, love that flows freely, uninhibited love is the love that Jesus spoke about when he said, "Love your enemies! Pray for those who persecute you. In that way you will be acting as true sons of your Father in heaven." Inhibited love, part of the sin from within, must be replaced with uninhibited love, love that reaches out with unconditional forgiveness.

The final sin from within, represented by the N is sin, is nonchalance. Too many of us take our Christianity too casually - with nonchalance. Saint Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians, encourages us to put on God's armor so that we will be able to stand safe against all the strategies and tricks of Satan. We are encouraged to use every piece of God's armor available to us.

Self-centeredness, inhibited love, and nonchalance - three sins from within that endanger Christianity.

And so we return to our question, "Are Christians an endangered species?" Some are and some are not. Although we have the promise of God that the light will never go completely out, our task together with the total Church, is to make sure we shine brightly. We continue to do battle with the forces of evil from both without and from within.

To plan to do less is to risk joining the rest of endangered species.

A Good Suggestion

Edward J. Jewhurst of North Babylon and Theodore Schuck Jr., of Hicksville, relay technicians at Long Island Lighting Company's Brentwood office, split a \$3,325 award for a suggestion that will save the utility and its customers over \$22,000 annually.

Messrs. Jewhurst and Schuck suggested a new type of testing technique which eliminated the need for two men to do a routine testing job, enabling it to be done by only one man, eliminating almost a thousand man-hours annually. Each man received a check for \$1,662.50.

LILCO's Suggestion System, now over 30 years old, saved the utility more than \$3.5 million over the last ten years. Each year, LILCO employees make about 1,000 suggestions on how to save money, largely through improvements in procedures or equipment. Employees who have suggestions accepted receive a cash award based on the amount of money the suggest improvement will save annually.
