## Community Effort Protects Trees

By Wednesday, the County had removed perhaps eight of the stately Norwegian Maple trees that have lined North Newbridge Road in Hicksville and Levittown for decades.

Jeon Flood of the West Village Green Civic Association, Clara Bennett of the Mid-Island 4-H Council and Phyllis Garvin of the Levittown Community Council as well as Sheila Noeth, editor of the Mid-Island Herald contacted Assemblyman Parola's office.

Parola and his office worked to save the remaining trees. Newbridge Road is a State thoroughfare and the County was required during its sewer project to maintain two lanes for traffic during the work. Parola's office spoke with six State officials and five County officials in the attempt to protect the

trees from Tuesday to Thursday. It seemed everyone was either "in the field" or at a meeting. The situation was extremely frustrating because Parola was told by both State and County heads that no one wanted to see the trees torn down. On Wednesday, the County agreed to destroy no more trees until Parola could get a final answer from the State Department of Transportation.

Parola then negotiated directly with Sam Ippolito of the Department of Transportation that led to the survival of the six trees near the Village Green by providing an alternate route around them during construction.

Parola is now working to ensure that the grass and greenery will be replaced where the other trees were lost.

Films were shown by representatives of the Nassau County Police Dept. And initial steps for forming Neighborhood Crime Watches in some

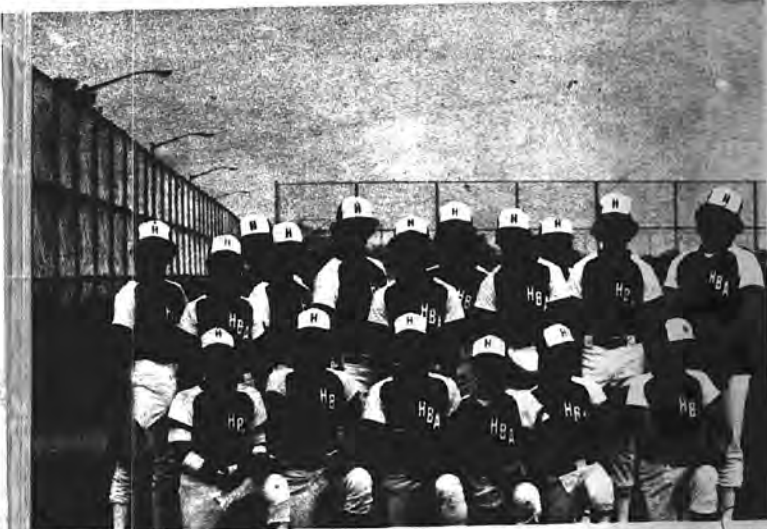

## Sons Of Italy Overseas

The National Commission for the Italian Earthquake Relief Fund, Sons of Italy in America has just returned from a week's tour in Italy. The purpose of the trip was to inspect the facilities built and restored in Solofra and Montella and to join in the dedication services. The facilities were built with one and a half million dollars

raised by the Sons of Italy. In addition, two million dollars was raised for medical supplies and clothing and one million dollars was raised with matching funds from the Catholic Relief Services. An orphanage, senior citizens home and fifty private dwellings were built with the funds raised.

Joseph A. Montemarano, Grand Venerable/State President of New York was accompanied by Cardinal Krol of Philadelphia; Frank J. Montemuro, Jr. and Peter B. ## LILCO Reports On Shoreham

The primary containment of LILCO's Shoreham nuclear plant can withstand at least 115 percent above design limits, according to the results of a major structural test mandated and observed by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

The evaluation, one of the final tests needed before fuel load, verified that the containment's thick concrete walls will not crack or leak under pressures that would greatly exceed even severe abnormal conditions, the Long Island Lighting Company announced today.

According to a LILCO spokesperson, the successful test illustrates the quality of Shoreham's engineering, construction and quality control. Construction on the primary containment began in 1974.

The primary containment surrounds the reactor and is one of the plant's five barriers to the release of radioactive fission products. It is a 135 foot - tall, air tight shell of steel - lined reinforced concrete that is four feet throughout and seven feet thick in the area around the nuclear fuel.

In addition to NRC inspectors, the test was observed by engineers of Torrey Pines Technology of San Diego, California. Torrey Pines is an independent consulting company which is presently engaged in an in - depth inspection of the Shoreham plant.

During the structural test, pressure in the primary containment was increased in increments to 55 pounds per square inch, then decreased

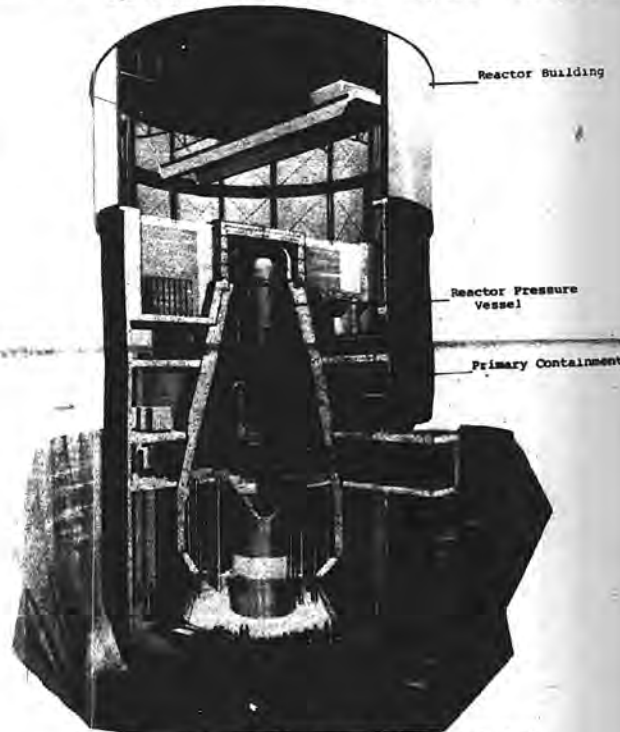
in increments to allow measurements of the pressure's effects on the containment structure at each change. The containment is designed for pressures up to 48 pounds per square inch. Under normal operating conditions the reactor will automatically shut down if pressure exceeds 1.6 pounds per square inch.

The effects of the pressure on the expansion of the containment were measured by deflection and strain gauges located at 161 points around the containment. In addition, visual inspections were made of the entire outer concrete surface. In both evaluations no cracks or unexpected movement of the containment were detected.

In addition to the primary containment walls, the floor, which separates the

containment into two chambers, and floor seals were put through a rigorous test, and demonstrated that they could successfully withstand the pressure differential following a design basis accident. This is a hypothetical accident simulating a major pipe break where steam in the upper chamber (drywell) is blown down into the suppression pool of water located in the lower chamber below the floor.

During the test, the floor and seals were pressurized to 35 pounds per square inch while the suppression pool's pressure was maintained at atmospheric pressure. This created a downward pressure differential of 35 pounds on the floor and seals. All seals and the floor exceeded their design requirements.

# Town Reschedules Hearings On 2 Hicksville Applications

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced that the Town Board has rescheduled to September 14, public hearings on two applications for special use permits on property located near the intersection of Charlotte Street and Duffy Avenue in Hicksville.

"The public hearings on applications by Parkland Plaza Associates and J Midhampton Asphalt Co., Inc. were postponed because the attorney for the applicants did not properly notify area residents about the hearing," Clark explained.

The Parkland Plaza Associates application is for a special use permit to erect and operate two multi-story office buildings and a warehouse on 8.9 acres of property located on the north side of Duffy Avenue, 216 feet north of the intersection of Charlotte Street, in an industrial "H" zone. Parking for more than 1,000 cars would be built on two decks over the proposed warehouse. This hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, September 14, beginning at 10 AM in the Hearing Room at Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

The application by Midhampton Asphalt Co., Inc. seeks a continuation of a special use permit to maintain a portable asphalt plant in an industrial "H" zone (light industry) along the north side of Duffy Avenue approximately 695 feet east of the intersection of Charlotte Street.

Clark added that a night hearing on this application has been scheduled in response to expressions of considerable interest from residents of the Hicksville area.

The hearing will open on September 14 at 10 AM, and the proceedings will continue at 8 PM that evening at Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

## TOB To Add Compact Car Parking At Hicksville LIRR Station

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced Town Board approval of an amendment to the Town's ordinances which will establish a metered compact car parking area at the Hicksville LIRR station.

Clark indicated that "this amendment will create a metered parking area for compact cars only, along the south side of the Long Island Railroad tracks in Hicksville, along Station Plaza South, in an area that was previously designated for taxis only. Diagonal parking will now be provided along the south side of Station Plaza South for approximately 200 feet between Newbridge Road and Jerusalem Avenue, allowing space for 18 compact cars."

In addition, Clark noted that because of the increased use of sub-compact cars by resident commuters, the Town's Public Parking Division will be converting previously unusable corners in the Town's public parking fields for use by sub-compact cars only. "We anticipate adding at least another 15 parking slots in this manner," Clark added. "Resident commuters are warned, however, that the Nassau County Police will strictly enforce the width and length requirements of the compact parking slots and cars that extend over the striped lines will be ticketed."

It is anticipated that the installation of these new metered spaces will be completed by the end of the summer.

Dear Editor,  
Much attention has been given to varying estimates of civilian casualties in Lebanon, but there has been no mention of the attempts of American Jewish Organizations to alleviate the sufferings of the civilians caused by the PLO's use of civilian institutions to shield their military activities.

In June, an ad hoc task force of Jewish Organizations was formed to offer relief services in the affected parts of Lebanon. The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee allocated an immediate commitment of \$100,000 for Lebanon to be coordinated through the governments of the United States and Israel. All involved and pertinent departments and organizations were kept informed. On June 2, the Catholic Relief Services, Church World Service and Joint Distribution Committee sponsored an appeal for Lebanese relief through the Interfaith Hunger Appeal, July 7, mattresses and cooking kits consisting of stoves, pots, dishes etc. was sent to

Lebanese authorities as requested by Lebanese government officials. The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee with the Swiss agency Terre des Hommes, delivered ten tons of powdered milk, baby food, bottles and blankets. JDC has also assessed the needs of institutional rebuilding so as to supply furniture and supplies to the schools in Sidon and Tyre. The assessment is ongoing.

Our role in our community, our nation and our world is primarily for aid and service. We would like the facts known.

Director of Special Education and Pupil Personnel Services; Assistant Director of Special Education and Pupil Personnel; and Supervisor of Physical Education, Health, and Recreation). The Board deleted job descriptions for Director of Pupil Personnel and Supervisor of Special Education and Support Services.

Textbook approval - The Board approved the use of Holt School Mathematics - grades 4 - 6 for use in the elementary math program.

The Board approved the increase in the Senior Citizen Tax Exemption from \$9,200 per year to \$10,500. This follows the signing of a bill by the governor and the adoption of the increase by other local school boards to allow senior citizens a partial exemption from school district taxes, up to 50% of the assessed valuation when

the combined income is \$10,500 or less. This applies to real property owned by persons 65 years of age where at least one owner has so owned for 24 consecutive months prior to applying for the exemption.

ECIA (Education Consolidation and Improvement Act) Chapter 1 allocation for fiscal year 1983 - Board approved application and proposal for the remedial reading program. The total grant of \$83,203.00 is federally funded through the State Education Department and is distributed between the Hicksville School District public and nonpublic schools.

ECIA Chapter 2 allocation - Board approved Chapter 2 libraries and learning resources distribution for FY 1983. The total grant of \$23,163.00 is federally funded through the State Education

Department and distributed between Hicksville School District and various parochial schools in the district.

Bids were awarded to A. Wegner Co. for an electronic keyboard for the teaching of piano lessons in the amount of \$28,293 and to Tomfor Transportation, We Transport, and Acme Bus Corp. for transportation to special and nonpublic schools outside the district in the total amount of \$11,539.90.

Charles M. Wayne was appointed as Guidance Chair at the JHS replacing Stuart Royce who retired. Robert Budnick was appointed regular substitute at the senior high in industrial arts. Karen Frances was appointed to a probationary position in Music at Lee Avenue to replace Mignon McLain, who is retiring. (Karen was, herself, a student at Lee Avenue and was Mrs. McLain's student during her elementary school days.)

# Hicksville's Gregory Museum Plans "Gold-Beating" Exhibit

The "gold-beating" industry of old-time Hicksville will be the theme of a Fall exhibit at the Hicksville Gregory Museum, it was announced this week.

An industry dating at least to the time of King Solomon, gold-beating was an important craft activity in this community for over ninety years, from the arrival of German immigrant craftsmen about 1850 until the beginning of World War II when local workmen were lured off to the war factories by the prospects of better pay.

The gold-beating craft was carried on in shops and private homes, providing work for men and women not occupied on family farms. Among the families long

associated with gold and silver beating in Hicksville were the C. Shopfisch, the Weickmanns, and the Muenchs. Gold-beating involved the beating or hammering of gold into thin sheets of gold leaf which were separated by a type of fine vellum paper and glued into books to be sold to artists, decorators or sign painters. No professional man worth his salt, it once seemed did not have his name lettered in gold on his office door.

To recreate the era when this fascinating and profitable craft was practiced in Hicksville will require research, which is already under way and the display of actual tools and equipment used by gold and silver beaters of yesterday. The program

planning and historical committees of the Hicksville Gregory Museum invite the help of the community in preparing this exhibition. Needed for donation or three months loan are such items as: photographs or drawings of our gold-beaters; sketches or maps one might prepare showing the location of gold beating shops in the village; actual tools used in hammering or cutting of gold; samples of the vellum paper separating the gold leaf; books of gold or silver leaf blocks on which the metals were hammered and any materials once used in this craft.
