# Loud Noises and Fumes Disturb Residents Near Hicksville Sears are completely illegal. Petitions have been turned over to the TOB Code Compliance Dept. in

For over a month now, residents of the Bay Ave., Prospect St., Franklin St., Waters Ave., Lenox Ave., Grove St. and surrounding areas in Hicksville, whose homes are located in the vicinity of the rear parking lot of the Hicksville Sears store. have been subjected to loud, disturbing noises not only during the day, but way into the early morning hours, plus obnoxious fumes that plus obnoxious rumes that come from the immense tractor trailers who are using a new truck terminal in the Sears parking lot.

Residents have contracted many agencies in a concerted effort to stop these disturbing actions which they have discovered

Sears management stating that an inspection has been made of this Sears premises and a violation of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay has been found to exist. With this notice Sears has been given two weeks to remove these violations. If this is not done the Town will then have to institute 'legal action, according to William J. Bernezy, Assistant to the Commissioner of the Town Dept. of Planning and Development. Community Council Meeting

The investigation which the residents' petitions requested is underway. But requested is underway. But those in closest proximity to the noise and fumes these violations are causing are keeping strict hour-by-hour records of what has already

wrecked the peace and quiet of their suburban homes. They are determined to see these matters through to successful conclusion.

In the meantime, Sears is certainly not making friends in the area. A certified letter to Sears

headquarters in Chicago has not been answered. The per-sonnel of the local Sears have, so far, done nothing to correct the disturbing condi-tions or to stop breaking the law in this manner.

In fact, one close neighbor was told, by a Sears secre-tary, when she phoned to say how overpowering the fumes from the immense tractor trailers were, "close

your doors and close your windows!"

FOITOR'S NOTE: This is only chapter one of a ser-ies in these disturbing, illegal conditions in Hicksville. There will be more to come.



Tax Rate For School District Set At \$18.614 Per \$100 AV

Unlike their counterparts in neighboring communi-ties, Hicksville homeowners will find a pleasant surprise when they receive their tax bills in October. The resi-dential tax rate for the Hicksville Union Free School District has been set at \$18.614 per \$100 assessed valuation for the 1982-83 school year compared with \$19.698 for the previous year. This represents a decrease of \$1.084 instead of the original \$ .224 reduction submitted by the Hicksville Board of Education to the Nassau County Board of Assessors. The decrease was made possible by the

responsible management and spending policies fol-lowed by the district, and the additional reduction has come about through changes in the New York State Real Property Law enacted in Chapter 1057 of the Laws of 1981. While neighboring communities will enjoy smaller increases, Hicksville residents will benefit from a larger decease than originally estimated.

During the past few years, homeowners have had to bear an increasing tax burden to compensate for loss of revenues from property removed from the tax rolls and the devaluation of commercial properties. Attempts to offset this reduction in the tax base have resulted in the enactment of Chapter 1057, which breaks down the assessed valuation of property into four categories: residential 1-, 2-, and 3-family dwellings, hotels and condominiums, public utili-ties, and industrial and commercial property. This breakdown into categories means that although the dis-trict will receive the same total tax revenue, the rates for individual categories might differ. A base rate for each category is established by the Board of Assessors

which is adjusted based on new construction and the removal of property from the rolls. The Board of Supervisors may then further adjust the rate up to 5% in each category to arrive at the final tax rate.

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For Hicksville homeowners (class one), the rate will be reduced by \$1.084. Class two properties (hotels and condominiums) will pay an increase of \$ .692, class three (public utilities) will pay an increase of \$1.465, and class four (industrial and commercial property owners) will pay an increase of \$.959 over last year's rate of \$19.698 per\$100 assessed

#### Attend Water Works Association Meeting

The Hicksville Water District was represented at the New York Section Meeting of the American Water Works Association held in Works Association held in Queensbury/Glens Falls, New York, September 21-24, by Gilbert E. Cusick and Stanford Weiss, Commis-sioners, and Louis G. Det-tloff, Superintendent. The theme of the meeting was Water Source and Distribution Management.

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Hicksville's representa-tives attended all sessions scheduled and expressed their own great concerns regarding Watershed Man-agement, Legal and Regula-tory aspects thereof. They were also vitally concerned with technical conferences relating to Groundwater relating to Groundwater Systems (such as we have in Hicksville) and a constant improvement in the moni-toring systems for safe-guarding against ground-water contamination. There is a strong movement; to which the local men subscribe, and that is the sanc-tity of watershed properties not only to protect the area adjacent to such land but to keep the waterheed free of all other encumberance.

Chairman Cusick engaged in conversations with a representative of the New York State Bureau of Public York State Bureau of Public Water Supply, Albany, N.Y., and was advised that if necessary all local regulations to be amended to give proper recognition to restricting admission and to and the regulated use of water district properties, institute the come for water. limiting the same for water




