Complaints And Criticism At School Board Meeting

Complaints from parents regarding the "atrocious attitude" of teachers and principals at the Dutch Lane School prompted Trustee Daniel Arena to comment "We need a cram course in Public Relations at the elementary level." At the Board meeting on September 23 he asked "How does the Board plan on responding to the indictment that has been presented?" President Charlene Anci agreed the situation must be looked into.

Rosemary Lawlor, who is taking her children out of the Hicksville schools, spoke of the fears of elementary school parents, saying that many are not willing to come before the Board of Education. She questioned the purpose of Iowa testing. Trustee John Ayres also criticized the way the tests are reported and explained to the parents. Dr. Catherine Fenton, Assistant Superintendent/Elementary Education said "It is a way to inform parents there is an open access to records and they will be explained at the Parent Teachers meetings."

Mr. Ayres repeatedly appealed to the chair to "enforce the educational policies of the district." He stressed that since the meeting was changed to Thursday it was a special meeting, and could not be conducted as a regular meeting. He received no support each time he objected to continuing with the agenda.

The Board received policies for consideration and discussion, one dealing with regular board meetings and much discussion was held as to when and how to terminate a meeting after midnight.

Copies of an outline of the new Administrative Organization were distributed for discussion. Former trustee, Frank Grimmer asked "What's the difference in cost between this reorganization and the last one?"

"The only cost difference would possibly be another salary," Ms. Anci replied.

Arlene Rudin questioned the structure of the chart organization and staff responsibility.

In answer to questions regarding the Dutch Lane

Sump, Ms. Anci was not hopeful the District could stop construction because of the time element. "They will certainly go on because there is no injunction and we can't get one," she said.

Neil McCormick asked the Board to make a petition in writing to the Town Board for a traffic light on Beech Lane and Levittown Parkway. The Board was also asked to consider providing a late bus to students attending Queen of the Holy Rosary Academy in Amityville.

There was no Superintendent's Report as Dr. Wilber Hawkins did not attend the meeting. A Job Description of Administrative Assistant - Educational Services was submitted to the Board for information only.

The Board approved textbooks, awarded bids and approved claims and warrants. It approved Educational Personnel appointments and civil service personnel appointments and resignations.

Mr. William Bennett was designated Voting Delegate for the Annual Meeting of

the N.Y. State School Boards Association at Kiamesha Lake on October 16, 1982.

The Board voted to accept the annual audit report as of June 30, 1982. William Bennett and Larry Wolfson both said the audit report would be helpful in preparing the 83-84 budget. Mr. Wolfson asked all Board Members to attend the first meeting of the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee on Oct. 4 at 8 p.m. in the conference room of the Administration Bldg.

Mrs. Singer plans to hold Community Relations Committee meetings the first Wednesday of each month in the Conference Room. The first meeting will be Oct. 6.

The First Meeting of the Continuing Education Committee will be Oct. 19 at 8 p.m. in the Conference Room.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Education is October 13 at 8:15 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Bldg.

Loud Noises and Fumes Disturb Residents Near Hicksville Sears

For over a month now, residents of the Bay Ave., Prospect St., Franklin St., Waters Ave., Lenox Ave., Grove St. and surrounding areas in Hicksville, whose homes are located in the vicinity of the rear parking lot of the Hicksville Sears store, have been subjected to loud, disturbing noises not only during the day, but way into the early morning hours, plus obnoxious fumes that come from the immense tractor trailers who are using a new truck terminal in the Sears parking lot.

Residents have contracted many agencies in a concerted effort to stop these disturbing actions which they have discovered

are completely illegal.

Petitions have been turned over to the TOB Code Compliance Dept. in Oyster Bay from whom they have received letters stating that as of Sept. 22 this agency has sent a letter to Sears management stating that an inspection has been made of this Sears premises and a violation of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay has been found to exist. With this notice Sears has been given two weeks to remove these violations. If this is not done the Town will then have to institute legal action, according to William J. Berney, Assistant to the Commissioner of the Town Dept. of Planning and Development.

The Nassau County Police Dept. has been notified of these late-night "disturbances of peace" and are taking whatever course they are permitted to do in such instances.

The investigation which the residents' petitions requested is underway. But those in closest proximity to the noise and fumes these violations are causing are keeping strict hour-by-hour records of what has already wrecked the peace and quiet of their suburban homes.

They are determined to see these matters through to successful conclusion.

In the meantime, Sears is certainly not making friends in the area.

A certified letter to Sears headquarters in Chicago has not been answered. The personnel of the local Sears have, so far, done nothing to correct the disturbing conditions or to stop breaking the law in this manner.


In fact, one close neighbor was told, by a Sears secretary, when she phoned to say how overpowering the fumes from the immense tractor trailers were, "close

your doors and close your windows!"

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is only chapter one of a series in these disturbing, illegal conditions in Hicksville. There will be more to come.

The Long Island Lighting Company today announced that the preliminary results of its most recent review of the schedule for fuel load of its Shoreham Nuclear Power Station indicate that the plant will be physically ready for fuel loading during the first quarter of 1983. The main causes of the schedule revision are: 1. The necessity of completing certain analysis required by current engineering practice and 2. the necessity of completing modifications resulting from information provided to date from the Company's preoperational testing program and analysis.

The cost of the plant would be expected to be approximately 2.8 billion dollars based on this most recent review.

Tax Rate For School District Set At \$18.614 Per \$100 AV

Unlike their counterparts in neighboring communities, Hicksville homeowners will find a pleasant surprise when they receive their tax bills in October. The residential tax rate for the Hicksville Union Free School District has been set at \$18.614 per \$100 assessed valuation for the 1982-83 school year compared with \$19.698 for the previous year. This represents a decrease of \$1.084 instead of the original \$2.224 reduction submitted by the Hicksville Board of Education to the Nassau County Board of Assessors. The decrease was made possible by the responsible management and spending policies followed by the district, and the additional reduction has come about through changes in the New York State Real Property Law enacted in Chapter 1057 of the Laws of 1981. While neighboring communities will enjoy smaller increases, Hicksville residents will benefit from a larger decrease than originally estimated.

During the past few years, homeowners have had to bear an increasing tax burden to compensate for loss of revenues from property removed from the tax rolls and the devaluation of

commercial properties. Attempts to offset this reduction in the tax base have resulted in the enactment of Chapter 1057, which breaks down the assessed valuation of property into four categories: residential 1-, 2-, and 3-family dwellings, hotels and condominiums, public utilities, and industrial and commercial property. This breakdown into categories means that although the district will receive the same total tax revenue, the rates for individual categories might differ. A base rate for each category is established by the Board of Assessors

which is adjusted based on new construction and the removal of property from the rolls. The Board of Supervisors may then further adjust the rate up to 5% in each category to arrive at the final tax rate.

For Hicksville homeowners (class one), the rate will be reduced by \$1.084. Class two properties (hotels and condominiums) will pay an increase of \$.692, class three (public utilities) will pay an increase of \$1.465, and class four (industrial and commercial property owners) will pay an increase of \$.959 over last year's rate of \$19.698 per \$100 assessed valuation.

For and about Seniors Did you know that the Department of Housing and Urban Development is providing funding to build new Senior Citizens housing projects in Farmingdale and Freeport. Congressman Greg Carman and Norman Lent made a special appeal to HUD Secretary Samuel Pierce and other HUD officials to act on this request for low-interest loans of more than \$9½ million for the two projects. The freeport project will contain 97 units and the Farmingdale project will contain 80 units. When these two buildings are completed, HUD will provide federal grants under Section 8 of the Federal Housing Act to assist the senior citizens in paying rent.

Here's a message from our Club chairperson of senior citizen news, Frank Jopp: "Seniors, as we all advance in age, we must

think about the possibility of retirement. The subject of retirement is the theme of a news release that I recently received from the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs. I'd like to quote part of it for your information:

"With proper planning, retirement can be a welcome change — an opportunity to try a new and different way of life. To help prospective retirees arrive at important decisions, a series of pre-retirement counseling workshops will be held in eight Nassau County communities. Originated and coordinated by the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs, the award-winning series is offered in cooperation with libraries, Adult/Continuing Education Departments of

local school districts and universities. The theme, Plan Today for a Better Tomorrow, is geared towards persons who may be ten or more years from retirement. Challenges, opportunities and pitfalls during the retirement years are discussed in a series of six two-hour evening sessions. Discussions are led by professionals on topics including: housing, physical and mental health, leisure time activities, social security, and estate and financial planning. Volunteer coordinators from each community serve as moderators during open discussion periods following each session.

"This fall, for the first time, an innovative program on retirement for county employees 50 years of age and older will be offered.

Seven sessions beginning in October will be held in the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs auditorium at 222 Willis Avenue, Mineola, from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Experts in the field of health, civil service entitlements, pensions, estate and financial planning, and social security benefits will lead workshops. County employees are registering through their departments.

"Early registration is advised and attendance at each workshop is limited. In most communities there is no fee; in some locations there is a registration fee of \$2.00 or \$3.00. For information contact the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs at Mineola or call 535-5861."

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Attend Water Works Association Meeting

The Hicksville Water District was represented at the New York Section Meeting of the American Water Works Association held in Queensbury/Glens Falls, New York, September 21-24, by Gilbert E. Cusick and Stanford Weiss, Commissioners, and Louis G. Detloff, Superintendent. The theme of the meeting was Water Source and Distribution Management.

Hicksville's representatives attended all sessions scheduled and expressed their own great concerns regarding Watershed Management, Legal and Regulatory aspects thereof. They were also vitally concerned with technical conferences relating to Groundwater Systems (such as we have in Hicksville) and a constant improvement in the monitoring systems for safeguarding against groundwater contamination. There is a strong movement to which the local men subscribe, and that is the sanctity of watershed properties not only to protect the area adjacent to such land but to keep the watershed free of all other encumbrance.

Chairman Cusick engaged in conversations with a representative of the New York State Bureau of Public Water Supply, Albany, N.Y., and was advised that if necessary all local regulations to be amended to give proper recognition to restricting admission and to and the regulated use of water district properties, limiting the same for water supply purposes only.

At the concluding banquet on Thursday evening, September 23rd, the New York Section endorsed for the first time a Water Operator Award, the title for the award was the "Local Water Works Conference Operator of the Year Award". New York State is divided into ten separate conferences which includes the Long Island Water Conference; this embraces all public and private suppliers in Nassau, Suffolk and parts of Queens Counties. The first Certificate of Appreciation was presented to Louis G. Detloff, Superintendent of the Hicksville Water District as the Long Island Water Conference Nominee for Water Works Operator of the Year Award.

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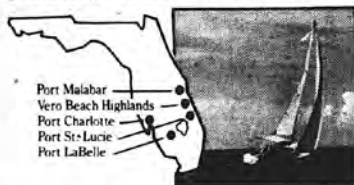

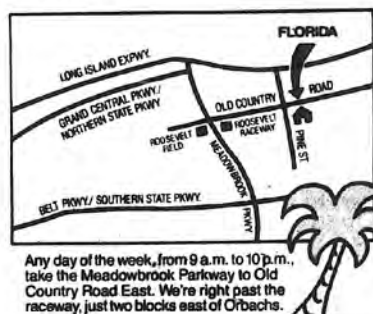
