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Town Rejects One Application --- Grants Another

MIDHAMPTON ASPHALT

At Tuesday's regular Town Board Meeting the Board voted unanimously to reject the application of Midhampton Asphalt Co., Inc. for a special use permit to operate their plant on Duffy Avenue in Hicksville legally. They have been in business since 1971. However, since 1978 they had not renewed their operating

permit, although town officials had issued them several summons during this period.

Finally, on Sept. 14, 1982 they reapplied and a public hearing was held. Many neighbors appeared in opposition to this application, stating that they were plagued constantly with dust and filth and much noise by this operation.

TWIN COUNTY RECYCLING CORP.

The Town Board, last Tuesday, granted the petition of the Twin County Recycling Corp. asking for a special use permit to operate a new, portable machine in the manufacture and refining of asphalt using cement. This permission was granted subject to NINETEEN covenants and restrictions, chief among them are:

- (1) at no time shall the pile of concrete, stone or dirt exceed 25'.
- (2) hours of the operation are restricted to 7 am to 6 pm only with no operation approved on Sundays.
- (3) OSHA standard must be upheld regarding noise, dust or pollution at all times.
- (4) all driveways must be paved and maintained at all times.

LILCO Survey

Ninety percent of Long Island families own at least one color television set, even out of every 10 Long Islanders have some kind of air conditioning, and many consumers have switched from oil to natural gas heating in the bi-county area over the past decade.

These are some of the facts reported in a recent "home appliance saturation survey" conducted by Long Island Lighting Company of its residential gas and electric customers. Home appliance use is one of the major factors contributing

to a 30 percent rise in the peak electrical demand on LILCO's system since 1971. These appliance surveys are part of the utility's long-range planning for Long Island's future energy needs.

The survey, taken in 1981 and analyzed this year, polled a representative cross-section of customers in LILCO's service area. With a reasonable degree of accuracy, the more than 3,000 survey group responses indicate the distribution of home appliances island-wide.

Among the more significant findings of the recent survey is a sharp increase in the use of natural gas for water and space heating. Twenty-one percent of the test group use natural gas as the primary home heating fuel, up from 17 percent in 1971. An additional five percent use natural gas in separate water heating systems.

In the past two years alone, a total of 23,566 customers have converted to natural gas for water and

space heating. Natural gas for heating currently enjoys a 44 percent price advantage over home heating oil.

Air conditioners are among the most commonly owned appliances on Long Island. Survey results indicate that 56 percent of Long Islanders own two air conditioners on average, which works out to more than one air conditioner for every LILCO customer, or about 920,000 air conditioners. An additional 13 percent of those surveyed had central air conditioning systems.

Reflecting heightened consumer awareness of energy conservation, the survey found that 40 percent of Long Island home owners have added some kind of insulation to their homes in the past two years. LILCO has been a leader in promoting energy conservation for well over a decade, saving customers millions of dollars in heating costs with numerous consumer information seminars, publications, and most recently, free home energy audits.

Dear Friends . . .

This past Tuesday the Town of Oyster Bay held its day and night hearings on our proposed 1983 Town budget. For the first time in several years, the tax rate has risen. The town fathers have proposed a 1983 budget of \$30,400,574. This will mean a tax rate of 87.1 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The proposed highway budget is \$11,478,254 with a tax rate of \$1.31 and the proposed part-town budget is \$2,239,109 with a 21.4 cents tax rate. Well, the line has been held for several years, but it is not surprising to hear that raises, even though slight, had to occur.

On the other hand, it is sad to hear that copies of the full budget (244 pages) were not printed in enough numbers to satisfy those who wanted to go over this budget line by line. We would like to suggest that in the future all such individuals and organizations send in their requests to the Town Board, at least three months in advance of the budget's availability. Then, the Town could get a figure to print the total number requested, determine how much each copy would cost, and bill the individuals or groups accordingly. Then, all paid for in advance, these 244 page documents, could be picked up by those who have paid for them, at no cost to the taxpayer. We mean this seriously. However, we do feel that they should be available for study at all our Town public libraries, as before. And we also think that Supervisor Colby's idea of issuing a budget pamphlet explaining the full, 244-page budget, is an excellent one. tors, how much can they push to get a contract? The Board can move as slowly as it wants because it has the administrators right where it wants them. They're not going to strike. They'll probably continue doing what they're doing-waiting less and less patiently (understandably so) until the Board wears them down and they accept what the Board wants to give them. Is that negotiating? No, Mr. Clark. That is "arrogance of power."

As far as your other statements, I believe you're way off base. From what I've seen most of them are well-educated, but talking down to people? I don't know what experiences you've had, but I've always been treated courteously, perhaps even when I shouldn't have been, and not at all with the pomposity you alluded to. You said they have a "you can't touch me attitude" and therefore they "perform at a bare minimum." Obviously you haven't been to the schools lately. Have you been to the high school football games, the Homecoming fireworks display, the high school counseling center or the junior high? Dr. Rieck brought back the school spirit that in my opinion had been lacking, took the seniors to Florida, and raised the educational standards by suggesting graduation credits be increased. Mr. Rosner, guidance chairperson, has taken a department that received a lot of criticism and, with the eagerness of the counselors, transformed it into an integral part of the high school. At the junior high Mr. Klein has turned the "700" into an excellent place to receive an education. You don't accomplish these things by performing at a bare minimum. Of course, they didn't do it alone. The rest of the staff worked very hard to achieve this, but I mention these three men because they're all relatively new in the district. Why are they going to want to stay if they have to be resigned to the fact there is no contract? Why are the veterans of our school system going to want to stay? I'd feel betrayed and exasperated. And what makes you think anyone is going to want to apply for a job in Hicksville once they see what goes on?

The Hicksville School Administrators don't need new leadership. They need a Board of Education that isn't concentrating so hard on giving everyone a hard time. Either we're talking about two different school districts, Mr. Clark, or one of us is extremely mistaken. And I don't think it's me.
