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## Water Board Initiates A Pilot Study For The Removal Of Trace Organic Contaminates

In order to be prepared to meet the potential future problems associated with trace organic contamination of public water supplies, the Board of Commissioners, Gilbert E. Cusick, Stanford Weiss, and Nicholas J. Brigandi of the Hicksville Water District authorized their engineers, Holzmacher, McLendon & Murrell, P.C., to investigate the alternatives available to the District. Among the options presented to the Board was the potential for treating groundwater to meet applicable State standards.

valuable and cost-effective method for removing trace organics, the Board of Commissioners authorized the construction of a pilot plant to determine the effectiveness of this method of treatment. The pilot facilities have been constructed at the Bethpage Road plant site (Plant No. 1). The research and development project is now in progress with positive preliminary findings.

The Hicksville Water District will keep its customers and the community-at-large up-to-date on the progress and conclusions of the study. This is a most advanced step and represents the type of commitment the Board has made to its public.

Based upon the recommendations of their engineers that super aeration (air stripping) could be a

## Veterans Day — A Time Of Remembrance

Next Thursday is Veterans Day. There will be parades between now and then. On that day, there will be ceremonies in our village and communities. Veterans groups will fire volleys and clergy and public officials will speak. The colors will be lowered in tribute. For some of us, it will be a time of remembrance for the buddies with whom we served who didn't make it home. It is the same, but more painful, for the parents, wives and children of those who fell.

Memories remain bright and tragic for the widow who raised children alone; the boy who had to seek others to teach him how to throw a ball, or for the parents whose dreams for their son came only to what-might-have-been. For other, fortunate Americans, whose husbands, fathers

and sons and daughters came home, memory flickers and fades. The veterans themselves recall the fun days of their service—the barracks jokes, the training camps triumphs, the beer hall bull sessions, the great shore leaves or passes in far-away places.

The veterans, myself included, also block out the memories of the crashing boredom; the sense of time wasted; the painful yearning for home and family, and for many, the total terror of being in combat. Romantic writers can speak of the glory of war. Motion pictures can recreate battle scenes. Neither words nor pictures, however, can give reader or viewer the true feeling of fear and horror experienced in actual combat.

As this Veterans Day approaches, there are mil-

lions of young Americans who, happily, have no knowledge of war beyond books and films. Of course, our young people know Pop was in the Army in WW II or flew in Korea, or an older brother went to Vietnam in the Marines. The history books, however, give less and less space to the wars of the past.

There are few Spanish-American war vets around. The ranks of World War I veterans grow thinner, while the Second War's veterans get heavier and a step slower. They, and the old howitzer at Veterans Square, are antiques in youngsters' eyes.

I wish young people could gain more insight about war, could understand what those rows of crosses and stars at Pinelawn mean in human terms so they would

understand the sacrifices made. I wish they could understand about men who have lived lifetimes in veterans hospitals, some motionless, some limbleless and some mindless.

Perhaps this Veterans Day, every war veteran will be able to take a few minutes to tell some young person what the day is all about. I suggest we forget the funny stories and mention the tough things about both the living and the dead. It won't be easy, maybe not possible at all, but it could raise the consciousness of the young.

It may be the only way to assure that those who died for their country and those who served will be remembered. With good fortune and God's help, one future day there will be no American war veterans.

## County Legion Sets Priorities

On Sunday, October 24, Robert Welch chaired the American Legion of Nassau County's Annual Legislative Breakfast in Massapequa.

Several hundred Legionnaires, Auxiliary members and interested persons attended.

Among the distinguished speakers attending were: Congressman Raymond McGrath and John Le Boutillier, Nassau County Executive Francis Purcell, Town of Hempstead President Supervisor Tom Gulotta, Assemblyman Phil Healy, State Senator Carol Berman, NC Comptroller Peter King, County Assessor Abe Seldin and Dean Skelos. Assemblymen George Madison and Kemp Hannon.

Following is a list of priorities which the Nassau County American Legion Legislative Committee will actively pursue this year:

1. To seek passage of legislation that will amend Section 458 of the Real Property Tax Law in order to preserve assessment changes.
2. To seek passage of legislation that will establish a permanent standing committee on Veterans Affairs in both houses of the New York State Legislature.
3. To seek passage of legislation for the establishment of a home for veterans on Long Island.
4. To seek passage of legislation providing for payment of a bonus to Korean and Vietnam veterans.
5. To oppose any attempt to delete or amend Art. 17, Sect. 357 which relates to County Veterans Service Agencies.
6. Require the State of New York to use the date established by the Federal Government with respect to the closing date of the Vietnam War.
7. To seek passage of legislation which will require a course on American History and Government be a mandated requirement for graduation from any public or

private high school under the jurisdiction of New York State Board of Regents.

8. To seek passage of legislation that will obtain prior service pension credit for war and conflict service to all war veterans in all retirement systems in New York State.

9. To seek passage of Legislation that will restore Civil Service Preference to veterans in reduction or abolition of jobs (Amend. Article 6, Section 85).

10. To seek passage of Legislation mandating that the death penalty be administered upon those person(s) found guilty of committing felonious crimes previously covered by the death penalty statute.

There will be an improvement to our Legion property shortly when a ramp will be installed at the east front entrance for the convenience of the many handicapped persons who have occasion to be present in our building ... more on this project at a later date.

The week of November 7th has been by joint congressional resolution, designated as National Disabled Veterans Week and President Ronald Reagan has signed this resolution ... Happy to report that President Reagan has signed into law an exemption to the Copyright Act of 1976 permitting veterans organizations and other nonprofit fraternal groups to use live

music performances at their social fund raising events without paying royalties ... The only restriction is that they not be public events and that should not be any problem because post fund raisers of this type are for members and their guests ... They're not supposed to be public events ... At least after 6 years the fight has been successful and our national organization must receive a major credit for all its efforts on behalf of all concerned, and particularly the Legion's 17,000 posts.

Once in a great while something the government does turns out real well, in fact, better than wonderful ... As follows: USGLI, the government's first venture into the life insurance business, was based on a mortality table published in 1868. It underestimated the actual life expectancy of veterans who served between 1917 and 1921 ... It also assumed the premiums would earn interest at 3 1/2% annual rate, far less than what the fund has earned ... The result is that USGLI has more money than it will ever need to pay off the face value of about \$300,000 on existing policies so the Veterans Administration has declared the United States Government Life insurance policies of 83,000 World War I veterans fully paid up, although it says it will continue to pay dividends.

## Science Scholarship

Long Island Lighting Company encourages graduating high school seniors from Long Island to compete in a national science scholarship competition. First place winners will receive a \$5,000 scholarship and a trip to New Zealand in time for the Edison Day celebration next year.

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

## Do You Know These People?

Internal Revenue has \$2,696,247 in unclaimed tax refund checks that belong to 5,089 individual taxpayers in lower New York State, and it would like to get the money to them as soon as possible.

The checks, primarily for 1981 refunds but including some from years prior to that, were returned to Internal Revenue by the Post Office as undeliverable because of errors in addressing or names, or because the taxpayers moved without leaving a forwarding address.

IRS urges taxpayers who did not receive an anticipated refund to contact their local IRS office as soon as possible. To verify a claim for a check, IRS needs the taxpayer's name and address on the return and present name and address, social security number, type of return and the tax year, and the amount of the refund. In Brooklyn and Queens, the IRS number to call is 212 596-3770, in Nassau, 516 294-3600, and in Suffolk, 516 724-5000.



(c) Immediately after the Effective Date (as defined in Section 10.4 of the Limited Partnership Agreement) of Assignment, neither the assignee nor the assignor, if the assignor has retained any part of his interest, shall hold an interest in the Partnership that represents less than one Unit;

(d) Such sale, transfer, or assignment, in the opinion of counsel to the Partnership, will not result in the
