The following article was written by Flo (Caruso) Gries, and continues to show the warm memories of former alumni and parents.

Do I remember St. Ignatius? I certainly do. If it wasn't for all the children's and the Sister's prayers in St. Ignatius, maybe my son wouldn't be alive today.

In November of 1964, my son Jimmy became ill. He was first diagnosed as having Hepatitis but it turned out that he had a malignant brain tumor called an Astrocytoma.

At the time Jimmy was in Sister Vianney's 2nd grade class and was preparing for his First Holy Communion for the following May.

Throughout the next seven months, while Jimmy was at home and in the hospital, his classmates wrote

him letters to keep him occupied; but most of all his classmates and all the children in the entire school prayed for him every day, and on the day of his operation they all went to Mass to pray for him.

The doctors had told us that Jimmy would only have two months to live after the operation and that they were not going to remove the tumor - they were just going to make a bypass to relieve the pressure in his head. So the children prayed and prayed ... the Sisters prayed and prayed ... the Priests prayed and prayed ... and we all prayed and prayed.

Father Ballweg, Father Goggin, Father Shanahan and Father Vitale all went to the hospital before Jimmy was operated on and wanted

him to receive his First Holy Communion. Jimmy would not take it. He kept telling them that he was going to make his communion with his class!! They decided that they could not force him to receive and decided to put it in God's hands. Jimmy was operated on and the doctors were amazed that they were able to remove the part of the tumor that was not embedded in the brain. They said to us: "We don't know what channel your prayers are tuned into - but whatever it is - kept tuned to that channel. It's working." We told the doctors then that all the children in St. Ignatius plus children in Catholic schools all over the United States were praying for Jimmy and that is what brought him through his operation.

Sister Vanard was the principal of St. Ignatius at that time and when she went to visit Jimmy in the hospital she brought him a beautiful Nativity scene music box. He loved it. When they took him into the Recovery Room after the operation, the first thing that he asked for was his music box that Sister had given him. Mrs. Billie Schiffmacher, Sister Vanard's secretary, (who had lost a son), brought Jimmy her son's statue of St. Ignatius. Everyone was so wonderful during this terrible period in our lives.

It was still "touch and go" as Jimmy had to have 35 cobalt treatments. After he took 8 he became so very ill

and had to stop them. After he got a bit stronger he had 27 more treatments. All during this time the children, Sisters and Priests were praying for him every day. He was almost finished with his treatments when it was time to make his First Holy Communion in May. We still didn't know if he would be well enough to walk down the aisle with his class like he told us he would do. The Monday before his communion day, he went back into the hospital, supposedly for another operation. When he got there the doctor could find no reason to operate and on Saturday morning the sun was shining brightly ... Jimmy woke up feeling well ... we dressed him in his suit ... and brought him to the church. He walked down the aisle with his class - Praise God - and made his First Holy Communion. Needless to say, that was the happiest day of my life.

Remember St. Ignatius? ... How could I ever forget!

Smoking Restrictions In Nassau County

The action of the Board of Health in adopting a smoking restriction ordinance for Nassau County was "just what the doctor ordered". Not only is there mounting evidence of the harmful effects of smoking on the smoker and on those around him, but passage of anti-smoking laws throughout the country indicates that society wants to be protected and, to a significant degree, is prepared to obey a law.

In our own country, since December 1, 1980 when the local smoking restriction ordinance took effect, the Department of Health has acted in various ways to enforce the law and has observed that compliance has been incomplete. Efforts by owners, operators, and managers are being made to obtain cooperation from patrons in supermarkets,

banks, theaters, lobbies, elevators, health care facilities, and other public places where restrictions apply. Most people do comply. Those who do not are handed a small yellow card—a message from the Commissioner of Health—asking for their cooperation. As with all laws, some continue to disobey. However, polite peer pressure and the good example set by management and employees are almost always sufficient to secure compliance. In time, we may expect that most public places will be essentially smoke-free, even as libraries have been for years by tradition and common consent. The Nassau County Public Health Ordinance has helped promote this important

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The Healthy Way To Lose Weight

A television interview involving a professor of nutrition on the subject of weight loss through diet displayed a stack of best seller books, all published within the last several years, promoting diets which promise to produce weight loss. Each book was based on a supposed dietary discovery or secret which the author suggests makes weight loss easy. Those who have attempted to lose weight through dieting and have failed repeatedly are understandably tempted to try a "new and foolproof method". No wonder the stack of diet best sellers is so high.

Losing weight can be accomplished through the use of a wide variety of diets. The basic problem in weight control, however, is to maintain the weight loss over long periods of time and, ideally, for life. To accomplish this, self control is required until new dietary habits have been firmly established, replacing those which led to overweight. The popular dietary approaches in the best sellers often do not address this problem but emphasize only the rapid weight loss which the dieter seeks. In addition, many of these crash diets depart from the

traditional dietary principles which have been demonstrated to be sound and which have not changed materially over the years. Caution must be exercised, therefore, when crash diets are used since they may not provide all the basic nutrients in proper balance and would be unsatisfactory if employed for any length of time.

The body requires about 40 different nutrients for optimum health. These include vitamins, minerals, amino acids, essential fatty acids and sources of energy (calories). The foods we normally eat contain these

nutrients but no one food item supplies all of them in the specific amounts required each day. Therefore, a variety of foods is necessary to assure an adequate diet. An easy way to achieve a varied and well-balanced diet is to choose foods every day from each of the several major food groups. Fruits and vegetables; cereals, breads and grains; meat, poultry, eggs and fish; legumes (dried peas, beans, etc); and milk, cheese and yogurt. This

Notice the hitching posts in foreground. Trees have grown tall and sturdy in photo #2, taken recently, revealing the office building which still stands (Rains Building-210 Old Country Rd.) The road has been widened and a bank stands where hotel used to be. The Courthouse, which was dedicated in 1900 by President Teddy Roosevelt, is now a national landmark.

TOBIDA Opens New Negotiations For Energy/Resource Program

The Town of Oyster Bay Industrial Development Agency directed its negotiating team to undertake formal negotiations with the firm of Blount/Blount-Fichtner, an international engineering and construction corporation, which utilizes a proven Swiss technology to recover electricity from an environmentally sound refuse disposal system.

"The Widmer & Ernst system was one of the two top choices of the Town, after an

examination of responses to the original Request For Proposals," according to Karl Leupold, TOBIDA chairman. "We first attempted to achieve a contract with the other corporation and when negotiations demonstrated that agreement could not be reached with Waste Management Inc., we immediately initiated preliminary talks with principles of Blount/Blount-Fichtner of Montgomery, Alabama. Both companies use similar mass burning

technology that will be able to dispose of all the Town refuse in an environmentally sound manner while providing electricity to be sold to LILCO.

Leupold noted that during preliminary discussions some of the obstacles that led to a discontinuance of negotiations with Waste Management were addressed and examined by Blount/Blount-Fichtner. "The officers of that corporation have indicated that

they initially believe they will be willing to negotiate a finance system that was rejected by Waste Management," Leupold said.

"After two positive meetings with BBF, we felt negotiations could prove fruitful," Leupold explained, "and TOBIDA members have assured Town Supervisor Joseph Colby that new negotiations would begin immediately, if it appeared a contract is possible." According to Leupold negotiating teams from TOBIDA and BBF will conduct their first formal session within two weeks.

change in public smoking habits.

What is the explanation for the change? Perhaps a message is finally getting across. Each year there are about 700 lung cancer deaths in Nassau County, largely the result of smoking. Many more suffer lung and heart disorders for which smoking is a prime causative or complicating factor. Infants are born, their health impaired by the smoking of their mothers during pregnancy. Non-smokers with heart, lung, and other disorders are adversely affected by breathing smoke-contaminated air. Careless smoking results in burn injuries and loss of life. Our society pays

dearly for the smoking habit.

In response, the following actions would be helpful:

- Stop smoking and encourage others to do so. Seek help from cessation programs as necessary.
- Obey the smoking restriction law. Ask others to do so.

- Obey the smoking restriction law. Ask others to do so.

- Observe for the proper posting of signs in public facilities and advise the Department of Health when signs are absent.

- Advise the Department of Health when compliance levels are low or when the operator of a regulated facility is not cooperative in enforcing the law among customers or employees.

- Request a supply of "Commissioner's Message" cards for use when there is smoking in a restricted public place.
