A television interview involving a professor of nutrition on the subject of weight loss through diet disweight loss through diet dis-played a stack of best seller books, all published within the last several years, prom-oting diets which promise to produce weight loss. Each book was based on a sup-posed dietary discovery or secret which the author sug-corts maker unight loss easy. gests makes weight loss easy. Those who have attempted to lose weight through diet-ing and have failed repeat-edly are understandably tempted to try a "new and foolproof method". No vonder the stack of diet best sellers is so high

Losing weight can be accomplished through the use of a wide variety of diets. The basic problem in weight control, however, is to maincontrol, however, is to main-tain the weight loss over long periods of time and, ideally, for life. To accomp-lish this, self control is required until new dietary habits have been firmly established, replacing those which led to overweight. The popular dietary approaches in the best sellers often do not address this problem but emphasize only the rapid weight loss which the dieter seeks. In addition, many of these crash diets depart from the

traditional dietary principles which have been dem-onstrated to be sound and which have not changed materially over the years. materially over the years. Caution must be exercised, therefore, when crash diets are used since they may not provide all the basic nut-rients in proper balance and would be unsatisfactory if employed for any length of time.

The body requires about 40 different nutrients for optimum health. These include vitamins, minerals, amino acids, essential fatty acids and sources of energy (calories). The foods we normally eat contain these

nutrients but no one food item supplies all of them in the specific amounts required each day. There-fore, a variety of foods is necessary to assure an ade-quate diet. An easy way to achieve a varied and well-balanced diet is to choose foods every day from each of toods every day from each of the several major food groups. Fruits and vegeta-bles; cereals, breads and grains; meat, poultry, eggs and fish; legumes (dried peas, beans, etc); and milk, cheese and yogurt. This

Smoking Restrictions In Nassau County

The action of the Board of The action of the Board of Health in adopting a smoking restriction ordi-nance for Nassau County was "just what the doctor ordered". Not only is there mounting evidence of the harmful effects of smoking on the smokar and on those on the smoker and on those around him, but passage of anti-smoking laws throughout the country indicates out the country indicates that society wants to be protected and, to a significant degree, is prepared to obey a law.

prepared to obey a law. In our own country, since December 1, 1980 when the local smoking restriction ordinance took effect, the Department of Health has acted in various ways to enforce the law and has observed that compliance observed that compliance has been incomplete. Efforts by owners, operators, and managers are being made to obtain cooperation from patrons in supermarkets,

banks, theaters, lobbies, elevators, health care facilities, and other public places where restrictions apply. Most people do comply. Those who do not are handed a small yellow card-a message from the Commissioner of Health-asking for their cooperation. As with all laws, some continue to disobey. However, polite peer pressure and the good example set by management and employees are almost always sufficient to secure compliance. In time, we may expect that most public places will be essentially smoke-free, even as tibraries have been for years by tradition and common County Public Health Ordinance has helped promote this important banks, theaters, lobbies, promote this important

The Town of Oyster Bay Industrial Development Agency directed its negotiating team to undertake for-mal negotiations with the firm of Blount/Blount-Fichtner, an international engineering and construc-tion corporation, which util-izes a proven Swiss technol-ogy to recover electricity from an environmentally sound refuse disposal system.

"The Widmer & Ernst sys-tem was one of the two top choices of the Town, after an

examination of responses to the original Request For Proposals," according to Karl Leupold, TOBIDA chairman. "We first attempted to achieve a contract with the other corporation with the other corporation and when negotiations demonstrated that agree-ment could not be reached with Waste Management Inc., we immediately initiated preliminary talks with principles of Blount/Blount-Fichtner of Montgomery, Alabama. Both companies use similar mass burning use similar mass burning technology that will be able to dispose of all the Town refuse in an environmentally sound manner while providing electricity to be sold to LII.CO.

Leupold noted that dur-ing preliminary discussions some of the obstacles that led to a discontinuance of negotiations with Waste Management were addressed and examined by Blount/Blount-Fichtner. "The officers of that corpo-ration have indicated that

they initially believe they will be willing to negotiate a finance system that was rejected by Waste Management," Leupold said

"After two positive meet-ings with BBF, we felt nego-tiations could prove fruit-ful," Leupold explained, "and TOBIDA members have assured Town Supervi-sor Joseph Colby that new negotiations would begin immediately, if it appeared a contract is possible." According to Leupold

change in public smoking habits.

habits. What is the explanation for the change? Perhaps a message is finally getting across. Each year there are about 700 lung cancer deaths in Nassau County, largely the result of smoking. Many more suffer lung and heart disorders for which smoking is a prime causative or complicatingfactor. Infants are born, their health impaired by the smoking of their mothers during pregnancy. Nonsmokers with heart, lung, and other disorders are adversely affected by breathing smoke-contaminated air. Careless smoking results in burn injuries and loss of life. Our society pays

dearly for the smoking habit.

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
