The Greening Of Newbridge Road????

Alter more than a year of community opposition to the removal of the beautiful healthy trees lining Newbridge Road and the demands of the communities of Hicksville and Levittown that they be replaced, matters are still undecided.

These communities, lead by NY State Assemblyman Fred Parola who has never backed down in giving of his help to solve this problem, are still firing off letters to the State Dept of Public Works and the County Commissioner Ludwig C. Hasl, inasmuch as Newbridge Road is a State road.

The State has refused to replace trees with trees, on the grounds that this is an "unsafe measure". However, initially they agreed to permit low shrubs, but they now want someone else to be responsible for their maintenance.

Both the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce and the Hicksville Community Council have expressed interest in helping in such a project. However a meeting has not as yet been set to discuss details.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

While I do not usually respond to printed criticisms of myself, I feel compelled to reply to Mr. Gietschier's letter to the editor (Herald, Dec. 23, 1983) because it criticized members of the New Image staff and the organization itself. The subject letter states that the New Image "...organizing committee did not think to invite nor mention any of the former staff members or instructors... from... the non-championship years" in its silver anniversary ceremony. It then goes on to list six people whom Mr. Gietschier places in this category.

Far be it from us to forsake the contributions of those who served the corps before us, as is evidenced in an excerpt from PAGE ONE of our manual (required reading for all members, parents, instructors, and staff): "Many people before you worked long and hard to make today's corps possible... you must do the same for the benefit of the corps' success in the immediate and the distant future." And again in our "Going Co-ed" press release which stated: "Never will we forget or disgrace their arduous and selfless efforts

through the years." That press release was published in these pages as well as in Drum Corps periodicals throughout the U.S., Canada, and Europe.

The fact is that mention was made at the ceremony of the "long and proud chain" of individuals, and the "proud history and tradition" of the corps; but it must be emphasized that this event was primarily a "kick-off" ceremony for New Image. In fact, a letter went out to the invitees telling that in order "to keep this affair manageable and economically feasible," they must confine attendance to only those specified, and it emphasized that this "is not a reunion" although the ex-drum corps majors, and selected ex-staffers would be invited to represent their contingencies.

Our first invitee list draft started out with everyone in the corps history we could find, and after several revisions, we still had far more people than we could handle. I then had to do some "bone cutting" to get the thing within our quantitative and financial parameters. So, you see, the "organizing committee" did their job just fine, and should not have been publicly faulted. It was

I who had to make the eliminations; not they. We hardly had the capacity to invite all the people who are actively in, or supporting, New Image now; let alone those from pre-1973 (the "non-championship years").

Actually, some of the people in Mr. Gietschier's list were indeed invited. Others-not necessarily on or off the list-were eliminated due to regrettably imposed other considerations, and the absence of some was no oversight, I assure you. So, again you see, it isn't that we "did not think" about this. In fact, I can think of several people whom Mr. Gietschier did not include in his list. Perhaps I will soon be reading a letter from them, too. However, I am sure that almost everyone who has had to compile a wedding invitation list, for example, will understand what happened here.

As for the St. Ignatius all-girl format being "unique and special": of course it was - and we would have preserved that tradition forever if we could have. And hopefully, New Image will not be an "also ran" (although that will be good enough if the kids are taking their best shot, for we teach them "It's

not just the winning...it's the striving"), but it will be far better than the painfully obvious alternative position of "didn't run at all."

I regret if there are any negative feelings about the invitee list among any of those who "contributed so much of themselves" in the long past, but these people must understand that we did what we felt was in the best interest of the kids. The name of the game right now is survival. With all new uniforms and equipment to buy, and so much to do, I would hope that everyone reading this will offer only positive feelings and encouragement to the fledgling New Image; trying desperately to emerge from the proud tradition of St. Ignatius Girls.

I must also thank Mr. Gietschier for wishing us "luck and success" in the future, and say that Phil has always had the corps' best interest at heart. This is why I found his sentiments to be a bit lacking in expected understanding, yet still understandable.

Plaza 230 Professional Condos Became Joint Venture Property

Paul Fitzpatrick, President of the Union Savings Bank, with Ron and Harry Johansen, principals of Johansen Realty, announced their joint venture partnership in Plaza 230, a 60,000 sq. ft., 3 level professional condominium on Hilton Avenue in Hempstead which is already 43% committed. Phase II, Co-op and Condominium Specialists, exclusive sales agent.

Union Savings Bank, with headquarters in Patchogue and six branches throughout L.I., is broadening its services to include the business community.

The 60-unit office condo, located at 230 Hilton Avenue on the Hempstead-Garden City line, is within walking distance of the site for the new Nassau County Courthouse in Hempstead and within 2 miles of the County Courts-Complex in Garden City. The location and carrying costs of less than \$5 a sq. ft. compared with rents of \$18-

\$25 for similar space for professionals, has led to quick acceptance although office condominiums are new to Long Island.

There is a new wave of commercial condo fever sweeping across the Island. "now there are 10 commercial condo properties on the Island; last time we checked a few months ago, there were five or six," said Barbara Dietz, Sales Manager of Phase II.

IRS Outlines Requirements

Knowing the proper reporting and record-keeping requirements is essential for those taxpayers who claim business-related travel, transportation, entertainment, and gifts. Internal Revenue Service emphasizes.

The primary proof for most business expenses starts with keeping timely entries of what was spent in a diary, appointment book, or similar record. These entries must also include the date and location of the business travel or entertainment, along with who was seen, and the business purpose for incurring the expense. A receipt or similar supporting evidence is required for all lodging expenses and any other expense of \$25 or more.

According to IRS guidelines, to be deductible all business expenses must be ordinary and necessary in the taxpayer's line of work. Reasonable local transportation expenses,

such as the cost of driving and maintaining an automobile while on business, excluding any commuting and personal mileage, can be deducted.

For a business-related trip outside the area of their main place of business, a taxpayer may deduct expenses such as food and lodging. Allowable entertainment deductions must either be directly related to, or associated with, the active pursuit of the taxpayer's business. Business gifts that the taxpayer may deduct are generally limited to \$25 to any one individual for the year. The burden of proof for all business expenses lies with the taxpayer, who must show that a bona fide business purpose exists.

Complete information on deducting these business expenses can be found in the free IRS Publication 464, Travel, Entertainment, and Gift Expenses.

Don't Shovel Or Plow Snow Onto A County Road

With the snows of the season a daily possibility, Nassau Public Works Commissioner Ludwig Hasl offers a reminder today to property owners: Don't shovel or plow snow onto a county road.

County law prohibits heaving excess snow from walks or driveways onto the right-of-way. Doing so is a misdemeanor with a fine and/or a jail term involved. "It might seem the thing to do when trying to clear a

path in front of your house or driveway, but it is illegal," Hasl said. "There are dangers involved in such practice. That shovelful of snow could freeze and become a danger to a motorist. Or it might melt, freeze

and become an ice slick, dangerous for cars and pedestrians."

Hasl agrees that it is a temptation to shovel snow onto the plowed road bed, but urges property owners to resist.

A Comforting Hand

The authors conclude that the funeral directors' experience with grief reactions makes them skilled in offering solace to grieving families.

This role as counselor/comforter may be more important than ever before. The increasing isolation of people in our society and the fractionalization of the family often make the needs of the bereaved very acute. The modern funeral director is aware of and sensitive to these needs. Often, because of his experience with grief, the funeral director can make an invaluable contribution to meeting these needs.

Induction Ceremonies Held At Town Hall

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby, Councilmen Salvatore R. Mosca, Thomas L. Clark and John Venditto, Town Clerk Ann R. Ocker, who were returned to office by the voters last November and newly-elected Receiver of Taxes Gary F. Musiello were officially inducted into office by United States Senator Alfonse D'Amato at ceremonies held at Town Hall on January 3, 1984.

In his induction remarks, Supervisor Colby spoke of the many steps that had been taken by the Town during the course of his seven-year administration to preserve and protect the many attributes that have made Oyster Bay a most desirable place in which to live and raise a family. These steps have led to the development of efficient, cost effective methods for the delivery of municipal services and the maintenance of a stable tax rate. "I am especially proud," Colby said, "that the direction in which we have been moving has earned the confidence and support of the Town's electorate."

Colby pledged that the Town government would continue to take the steps necessary to preserve and protect the Town's environment. "Development of an environmentally sound method for the management

of the Town's 1,000 tons a day of solid waste has been a personal priority of mine since 1977," he said. "The agreement which has been successfully negotiated by the Town's Industrial Development Agency leading to the construction of a modern waste-to-energy facility is a major step in our long journey toward solving a problem which faces all of Long Island." Colby said that while we had "no illusions about the difficulties that lie ahead," he pledged to the residents of the Town that he would "not permit the obstructionists to play political games with the economic and environmental survival of this Town."

Oyster Bay WILL be successful in implementing a solution to the problem of refuse disposal that will benefit all Town residents—a solution that will become a model for all Long Island to follow."

Colby also noted that in another step to protect the Town's environment, the Town Board would be setting a hearing date to consider the adoption of a five-acre zone in order to protect the critical groundwater recharge areas in the northern section of the Town.

"In sum," Colby concluded, "the actions of your Town Board and the actions of each and every member of

your Town family will continue to reflect the confidence you have placed in us... Our goals, energies and enthusiasm will remain committed to making Oyster Bay Town government

even more efficient, even more responsive to your needs. Together we will continue to take steps to preserve and enhance a quality of life of which we can all be proud."
