Scholarship Resources

Nassau County Office of Women's Services has developed a current resource for scholarships in answer to many requests from women who are returning to work outside the home. Most of these women are in need of training or retraining. The big problem is getting sufficient financial assistance in order to accomplish this goal.

"As our career counselors have learned, it is one thing to help direct women back to the labor market; it is another to help secure financial aid. Often, where further training is needed, additional economic pressure becomes part of the picture" states Mr. George A.

Jones, Director of Affirmative Action and Nassau County Office of Women's Services.

Student Team Learning At Fork Lane School

Students in Mrs. Anne Hansen's fifth grade class at Fork Lane were studying the respiratory system as part of the Seattle-Berkeley health/science program. Meanwhile, in third grade, Mrs. Grib and Mrs. Hefferman's students studied body systems. How to bring the two together?

So that Fork Lane children could teach AND learn from each other, several of Mrs. Hansen's class visited the third graders. Visitors Raymond Gerry, Danny Maloney, Debra Lobmeier, Paul Rom and Michael Schneider came to the third graders with models - made of empty bleach bottles, wood, plastic bags and rubber. This represented a model of the human respiratory system. (Each student in Mrs. Hansen's class fashioned his/her own

model during Christmas vacation). Raymond practiced artificial respiration on his model and the third graders were amazed to see his breath filtering down from the model's mouth to his "plastic bag" lungs.

Then, Mrs. Hansen's students each went with their model to a third grader table and let each child practice breathing into the model's mouth, as Nurse Linda Fuchs supervised. Mrs. Hefferman and Mrs. Grib's classes were then given a rebus puzzle, conceived by the fifth graders, on the topic of "breathing."

The younger students thoroughly enjoyed the demonstration by their peers and left the Seattle-Berkeley room with a clearer understanding of the function of the human respiratory system.

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Annual Hospitality Award Goes To The Wine Gallery Bartender

The 1983 Long Island Hospitality Champion is Morey Berkley bartender at The Wine Gallery in East Meadow. Judges for the annual award report that 1983 brought "more entries than ever before - from more segments of the hospitality industry than had been represented in prior years."

According to Frank Mina, Vice-Pres. of Fire Island Ferries and Chairman of Long Island Tourism and Convention Commission, "This is the third year in which LITCC has selected an outstanding employee in a tourism-related activity who most ably demonstrates hospitality to Long Island visitors." The 1981 award went to an employee of the Island Inn Motor Hotel in Westbury and, in 1982, was won by an employee of the Smithtown Sheraton.

Nominees for the Hospitality Championship must be proposed by their employer. All employees who have direct contact with the public are eligible and candidates are judged both on the comments of the employer and on the hospitality skills which they demonstrate to the judges during an unannounced visit to their place of work.

Judges for the 1983 contest were: John Mawn, President, Mawn Transportation center; Jack Fitzgerald of Nassau County Dept. of Commerce & Industry; and Tom Hanlon of Suffolk County Office of Economic Development.

A plaque, noting the winner, is displayed for one year at the establishment where the champion is employed - and then moves on when a new winner is selected. The annual champion receives an engraved award in recognition of his or her personal achievement in hospitality. For 1983, Morey Berkley received a silver tray courtesy of Fortunoff's Wine Gallery owner, Tom Violagis, proudly accepted the championship plaque which is now displayed behind the bar at the popular East Meadow restaurant.

"Long Island attracts more and more visitors each year," observes LITCC President Eleanor Simpson, "but it isn't enough to merely be successful in gaining large numbers of tourists. We also need to increase the standard of hospitality which we express to these important guests who contribute significantly to our regional economy. It was with this in mind that LITCC established the annual Hospitality Championship." "The growing number of entries in the annual competition," says Mrs. Simpson, "gives a clear indication that the whole idea of 'hospitality' is spreading throughout Long Island."

Violagis and Berkley were honored at the recent annual meeting of the Commission and, again, during presentation ceremonies at the Wine Gallery.

Hempstead Officials Sworn In



Thomas S. Gulotta was inaugurated as Hempstead Presiding Supervisor on January 3rd during ceremonies held at the Town Hall Pavilion in Hempstead. Mr. Gulotta was returned to office with 77 per cent of the vote last Election Day. The margin of victory was the largest in Town history.

Also sworn in were Town Supervisor James D. Bennett, Councilman Joseph G. Cairo, Jr., Joseph N. Mondello and Gregory P. Peterson, Town Clerk Daniel M. Fisher, Jr. and Receiver of Taxes Robert D. Livingston, Jr. The officials were, likewise, elected by record breaking margins when Town voters went to the polls last November.

In his inaugural address, Presiding Supervisor Gulotta noted that, the Town of Hempstead is in the best fiscal and economic condition that it has ever been in in its 339 year history. "The signs of that healthy economy are clear for all to see," Gulotta said. "During the past two years we have created twenty thousand private sector jobs. We have been successful in maintaining one of the lowest unemployment rate in the nation. We have aided in initiating a quarter of a billion dollars in construction starts. The one single commodity that is most important to our residents, their own home, has continued to increase dramatically in value, even during difficult economic times."

Gulotta noted that the Town's strong economy has permitted the expansion of existing programs and creation of new beneficial plans, such as aid programs for the Auxiliary Police and Civilian Patrols, to serve as the "eyes and ears" of the Nassau County Police Department, creation of a Town Consumer Advocate Bureau to fight unjustified utility rate hike requests, expansion of senior citizen programs and tax exemptions, new tax exemptions for the disabled, and a proposal to provide disability and life insurance benefits for the Town's volunteer firemen.

The Presiding Supervisor explained that "the Town has been successful in bridging the gap between government and the people

that it is designed to serve by bringing our residents into the decision-making process of government itself. And, through the establishment of the Town of Hempstead Hotline, we have been successful in cutting through the bureaucracy and red tape to deliver cost effective, efficient services to our residents which are second to none in quality.

"I have been accused of devoting an excessive amount of my time to helping people with their problems. I have not denied it nor will I ever. In my opinion, that is what local government is about."

Gulotta pledged to redirect the focus of his next administration to the advanced planning necessary to tackle the broader issues facing the residents of the Town and County in the years ahead. "We shall ask the difficult questions. We shall ferret out the elusive answers to such difficult issues as solid waste disposal, the needs of a burgeoning senior citizen population, housing, transportation, the preservation of pure air and water resources, affordable power, and relief for our still overburdened middle income homeowner and taxpayer. We must take the necessary steps now to insure that the Town of Hempstead and the County of Nassau will retain for future generations the qualities that first attracted many of our citizens to make this their home."

Nassau Dems Endorse Mondale

Martin L. Mellman, Nassau Democratic County Chairman, recently announced his support of Walter Mondale for the Democratic Party's nomination for President.

Mellman also announced that almost the entire leadership of the Nassau Democratic Committee is supporting Mondale, "with only three or four leaders not yet committed to the former Vice-President."

Walter Lowenstein, Democratic leader of the Town of Oyster Bay, explained that "most of our leaders also wish to show solid unity behind the leadership of our county leader."

Sylvia Fishel, North Hempstead Democratic leader, also stressed the need for unity but then added, "The people of this country are deeply concerned over the gravity of the current international situation and desire the strong, sober hand of Walter Mondale in the White House."

At The School Board Meeting

Hicksville School District Superintendent Dr. Catherine Fenton, gave the Board of Education an overview of the 1984-85 district budget last night at its school board meeting.

The 1984-85 budget she proposed, would cost \$37,622,487 - an increase of 3.8 percent or \$1.4 million from last year's budget.

The increase represents salary increases, a cost of living increase for the district's Transportation Department, and funds for a census, demographic studies and other community research studies Superintendent Fenton's report explained.

Two important goals considered in making the budget said Dr. Fenton was to maintain a level of expenditure with the ability of the community to pay and to create a budget to make the children of Hicksville the winners they are.

The budget includes the continuation of all of last year's programs and services and additional services. Listed, they included:

- summer school for students who fail required courses
- a computer program for primary and intermediate grade students
- a computer lab for courses in the math and business departments
- a word processor to assist with office work at the junior high
- an after school program on computer literacy, beginning programming

and advanced programming • a program in the junior high to strengthen the study skills of students

• additional remedial help for junior high school students

• reference assistance for students and teachers at the junior high school media center

• safety and backstop fences

Commenting on the budget, Vice President William P. Bennett said that "this was the first year that he has had confidence in the budget. We are finally looking at a budget that is realistic. Actual needs were put into it."

Other board members were not as comfortable about hearing the budget report and said they were not fully informed of its contents. Board member John Ayres said that not enough information had been provided and asked that the presentation be delayed to a later date. The request was denied.

Before her presentation Dr. Fenton attempted to reassure the Board that it was only the preliminary budget not the final budget and said that the board would have two months to study it further.

A decision is expected to be made by the board on the budget March 14 and presented to the district's taxpayers in May.

In other school board business, Richard Evers, Director and historian of the Hicksville Gregory Museum and Long Island Earth Science Center gave a slide

presentation entitled Hicksville U.S.A.: An appreciation. It was a historical look at Hicksville and what Evers called, "an overview of the strengths and resources Hicksville has had over the years." It included photos and newspaper clips of Hicksville from its early beginnings as a shopping village surrounded by farms, to today. The show also included photos of Hicksville's growth as a school district. The slide presentation was requested by the board. It will hopefully be used by service organizations and fraternal organizations said Evers.

The board also granted approval on all of the board action proposals on agenda for the evening, some of which included an approval on three textbooks to be used in the elementary and high school grades, an award of bids, and a request by the Merrick School District for the board's support in nominating Richard L. Ornaier, of Merrick, for another term on the Board of Cooperative Educational Services of Nassau County (BOCES), a vocational education program.

■ When you need to meet friends at the Nassau Farmers Market in Bethpage, picking a place is simple: "Meet me at the merry-go-round."

At the center of more than 200 booths in the indoor market is a full-sized 36-foot merry-go-round, "one of the most beautiful machines of its kind," according to O. "Wimpy" Zorlenzan.

Wimpy should know. Since 1935, he has been restoring and repairing merry-go-rounds throughout the Long Island area, installing this one almost 20 years ago and taking care of it ever since.

Every Friday and Saturday, from 10 AM to 10 PM, the merry-go-round turns its 30 jumping horses for delighted children—and grateful shopping parents.

The price of admission is a consumer's dream: 25 cents (\$2 for a book of 10 tickets), and accompanying adults ride free.

What adds to the merry occasion is that the carousel is run by the merriest of men—a band of three grandpas, headed by Eddie Beckhans, a retired milkman, who has watched over his merry-go-round "grandchildren" for 17 years.

Beckhans, a winning, silver-haired 79-year-old, is as delighted with his kids as they are with his merry-go-round. In his ticket booth, he displays a wall filled with photographs of his little customers—a sampling of "Eddie's Angels," as he calls them.

Today, some of his long-time "Angels" are now bringing pictures of their own little angels to Beckhans's gallery.

The merry-go-round has never missed a weekend in 25 years, turning out more than 100 rides a day. It has been as reliable as the smiles, gentle pats, and joking of Eddie's band.

BRRR...it's cold outside, and it will get a lot colder before we see the sweet smile of Spring. If you're trying to conserve fuel by keeping your thermostat at a lower setting, here are a few hints you might wish to use to help you accomplish your purpose:

- A rolled towel or small scatter rug placed against the bottom of a door will help stop cold drafts from leaking into your home.

- If you do not have storm windows, staple or tape inexpensive plastic sheeting either inside or outside the stormless windows.

- If the cold air leaks in around your doors, a rubber latex molding can be attached to the interior lip of the frame where the door meets the structure, thereby sealing the opening to wind and breezes.

- If you have recessed, convactor-type radiators, line the back wall behind the radiator with tin foil. This helps reflect the heat back into the room.

Other energy-saving tips:

- Keep range top burners and reflector pans clean. They will reflect the heat better and save energy.

- Watch the clock or use a timer when baking in the oven. Opening the oven door continually to check food wastes an enormous amount of heat (and money).

- Wash your clothes in cold water. If they are very soiled, use warm water—not hot, water.
