Hicksville Fuel Oil Company Seeks Special Use Permit

A public hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, May 22nd, by the Oyster Bay Town Board to consider an application by Deuco Fuel Oil Inc., of Hicksville for a special use permit, according to Town Councilman Douglas J. Hynes.

"Deuco is seeking the special use permit to allow overnight parking of fuel oil

trucks on its premises, which are located in a G-1 zone at 25 Richard Street in Hicksville", Hynes stated. "According to the application, the company operates two fuel delivery trucks."

The hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, May 22, beginning at 10 AM, in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Chief Magee, a resident of Hicksville since 1952, has completed almost 27 years in the Hicksville Fire Dept., serving as Lt. and Capt. of the Rescue Squad, Lt. and Capt. of Engine Co. 7, Fire Inspector, public information officer and member of the Hazardous Material Response Team. The Chief

will command the 200 man Department equipped with 17 pieces of equipment which protects the Hicksville Fire District (7 sq. miles) — population 55,000 (tripled daytime.)

The Department—all volunteer—works out of three fire stations. Negotiations are underway for a fourth station for the southwest section of the district.

Board Approves Special Use Permit In Hicksville

The Oyster Bay Town Board has approved a special use permit application to store new cars in a "G" Business District in Hicksville, subject to 14 restrictive covenants.

Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca said that, "the special use permit was granted to Mid-Island Shopping Plaza and Old Country Toyota Corp. in order to store new cars on a parcel of land located on the north side of James Street, 1,555 feet west of the intersection of Newbridge Road. The cars will be held at this parcel until they are delivered to the Old Country Toyota Corp., which is located at 340 Old Country Road in Hicksville.

In response to concerns expressed by residents, the Board has imposed fourteen restrictions which include that the delivery of vehicles is prohibited after 9:00 P.M., and must be made

only at the northwest corner of the parcel, away from the residential area. Also, that the storage of cars off the premises in the Mid-Island shopping area or on residential streets is prohibited, and that no preparation or repairs or inspection of the cars be made at this location.

The Town Board also required that a six-foot high stockade fence be installed and properly maintained along the residential properties on the western and eastern border of the parcel and that a screen planting of six-foot high evergreens be placed six feet apart along that portion abutting James Street.

Mosca said that the applicants are required to submit a detailed site plan for Town Board approval before any building permits or a certification of occupancy can be issued.

Typical of the photographs in the Gregory Museum Exhibition of Edward Bady pictures of Hicksville railroad scenes over the years at the Hicksville Public Library starting April 9th is this view of the second railroad station facing eastward toward the Broadway crossing around 1904.

The elevation of the Long Island Railroad in Hicksville during 1962-64, a milestone event forever altering the physical image of the community - for better or for worse - is being recreated at the "Hicksville Public Library" starting Monday, April 9th.

The Hicksville Gregory Museum Historical Com-

mittee has recaptured the great railroad construction feat in an exhibition of over 50 large photographs crafted twenty years ago by the museum's superb social lensman, Edward Bady.

In addition to Bady's handsomely framed pictures showing workers, equipment and stages in the two

year monumental engineering job by Hendrickson Brothers, the library exhibition features "Hicksville Railroad Crossing Vistas 1942-1984." On display will be pictorial views of Hicksville streets and the railroad as they appeared in 1942, 1954, 1963 and at the present time. The public, particularly long-time residents, will find the exhibition a study in nostalgia and recollection.

The photographs have been collected and arranged by Gregory Museum Historian, Richard Evers. This exhibition is the latest contribution in the Museum's ongoing preservation and recreation of Hicksville and

Long Island History, a type of program made possible by the Gregory Museum's contract for educational and cultural services with the Hicksville Board of Education. Previous recent and notable Museum historical exhibitions of artifacts and photographs included: "Mike Caruso and the World of Midget Car Racing," "The Gold Beating Industry of Old Hicksville" and "Nassau County Cradle of Boy Scouting."

The Bady photographic exhibition may be viewed in the Community Room of the Hicksville Public Library Monday to Fridays 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.; Saturdays 10 to 5 p.m. and Sundays 1 to 5 p.m. throughout April.

CHANGING ATTITUDES TOWARD DEATH

In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, there was a great fearfulness about death, and a preoccupation with its more horrible and melancholy aspects. This attitude reversed itself sharply in the nineteenth century with the romanticization of death. To generalize about our own century, or the early part of it, one could say that the prevailing attitude was one of denial.

Increasingly, death has occurred among the elderly, and more often away in hospitals than at home. The circle has narrowed so that often only the immediate family attended. Death was not only kept from most of society, it was often kept from the dying person.

Recently, however, we have come to realize how such avoidance and denial can have negative effects -- on both the individual and the family. There is a new attitude spreading, to deal realistically and meaningfully with death, respecting each individual's dignity, sensible spending and realizing funerals have a purpose for the survivors.
