## Hicksville Coalition Supports The Budget

Hicksville Coalition To Maintain a Moment Of Silence supports the 1984 budget presented by the Board of Education at last Wednesday's meeting.

The Board had decreased the proposed budget 22¢, from \$1.71 to \$1.49 per hundred, by applying increased state aid and excess surplus.

Hicksville Coalition sup-

ports quality education, including a rounded curriculum of sports, music and art, while stressing the basics. We want to keep all activities, but we are aware of the burden on the taxpayers shoulders, for the Coalition consists of policemen, teachers, PTA members, representatives from both political parties, business people, and members of both fraternal and sports organizations.

## June 12 Hearing Set On Special Use Permit For U-Haul In Hicksville

A public hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 12, by the Oyster Bay Town Board on an application for a special use permit to operate a U-Haul in Hicksville, according to Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

"The applicants, U-Haul of Long Island and Brooklyn Avenue Associates, are seeking a special use permit to conduct a U-Haul business on a parcel of land located at the corner of Hicksville-Massauequa Road and Lauman Lane

which is located in an Industrial "H" (light industry) zone," Clark stated. "Along with the rental of U-Haul trucks, trailers and recreational vehicles, the business operation would include the rental and sale of related items such as parts and accessories, minor repairs and maintenance of the vehicles, underground storage and dispensing of petroleum products, and the open/outside display and storage of the rental vehicles.

The hearing is scheduled

for 10 AM on June 12 in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

## June 26 Hearing Set On Hicksville Zone Change

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca announced that the Town Board has set a June 26 public hearing on a request for a change of zone from a "D" residence district to an "F" business district (Neighborhood Business), on property located in Hicksville.

Mosca stated, "The petitioner, Rockwell Realty Co., is seeking the change of zone in order to construct a three-story office building to

be located on the north side of West John Street, east of Myers Avenue in Hicksville." Mosca noted that the hearing had originally been scheduled for April 24, but was postponed at the request of the applicant's attorney.

The hearing has now been scheduled for June 26, at 10 AM in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

- they approved Resolution No. 485-1984 relating to assessing the cost of repair of structure located at 12 Jersey St., HICKSVILLE. This will enable the Town to recover these expenses from the taxpayer through Nassau County.

- they approved Resolutions No. 495 and 496-1984 relating to change orders and engineering costs in capping and closure program at the OLD BETH-PAGE Solid Waste Disposal Complex.

- they approved Resolution No. 523-1984 relating to sidewalk conditions affecting property at Randy Lane and Knoll St., in PLAINVIEW.

- they denied Resolution No. 530-1984 relating to the petition of Suyeckichi and

Chitaye Sada, for modification of restrictive covenants on the Merit Oil property in Hicksville the hearing for which was held on March 27. This was denied on the grounds that the signs in question were inappropriate.

- they reserved decision on a day and night hearing of the petition of Frank Scappaticci, Shirley Stone, Blanche Perlmutter and Martin Stern for a change of zone from Res. B to B-1 (1/2 acre zoning) District at property on the east side of Washington Blvd., across from Pound Ridge Road and High Ridge Road in PLAINVIEW. A total of nine persons spoke in opposition to this petition on the grounds that this zone change would permit 6 houses on 3 1/2 acres, which would change the nature of the neighborhood as it presently exists. All who testified own property on two acres, as this area presently requires. Councilman Diamond suggested that both parties sit down and discuss whatever could be arranged that would be mutually acceptable.

- they reserved decision on the petition of Deuco

Fuel Oil, Inc. for a special use permit in a G-1 business district to maintain the overnight parking of 2(not more than 3) fuel oil trucks on property on the east side of Richard St., south of Carl St., in HICKSVILLE. Several persons appeared to oppose this petition on the grounds that these trucks would cause fumes and would be unsightly in the area. Through their lawyer, the petitioners agreed to a buffer zone of shrubs and agreed that the trucks would not leave before seven a.m. each morning.

- they approved, with Resolution No. 57, 1984, the petition of the Town of Oyster Bay Housing Authority, for a change of zone from Residence C District to S-1 Senior Citizens Zone at property east of Round Swamp Road and north of Claremont St. in OLD BETHPAGE. No one appeared in opposition to this petition.

- they approved Resolution No. 459-1984 directing the Town Clerk to advertise notice of a June 12 hearing on the petition of U-Haul of

Long Island, Inc. and Brooklyn Avenue Associates for a special use permit to utilize the rental of U-Haul trucks, trailers, recreational vehicles, part and accessories rental and sale of related items, minor repairs and maintenance of said trucks etc. and for underground storage and dispensing of petroleum products and the open/outside storage and display of trucks and related items on the southwest corner of the Hicksville-Massapequa Road, Route 107 - Broadway and Lauman Lane in Hicksville.

- they approved Resolution No. 460-1984 directing the town clerk to re-advertise notice of a June 26 hearing on the petition of Rockwell Realty Co. for a change of zone from Res. D to Bus. F District on the north side of West John St. distant 94-57 east of the intersection formed by Myers Ave and West John St in HICKSVILLE.

The next meeting of the Oyster Bay Town Board is scheduled for Tues., June 12 starting at 10 a.m. in Oyster Bay.

Mr. Schwartz also addressed his need to support the powerful voice of the people. Let's set the record straight!

Two years ago, when the teachers were without a contract and the community was enraged, a public meeting was held to hear the communities concerns. Several hundred residents came. During the very heated meeting Mr. Schwartz abruptly stood up, slammed his briefcase closed and stormed out of the meeting. He was brought back by a fellow Trustee. Are these actions of a man who claims to be responsive to the voices of the people?

During last years budget hearing several hundred residents spoke against the Board's fragmenting the budget and having elementary foreign language and elementary guidance as separate referenda items. Mr. Schwartz voted to eliminate both of these programs over the angry protests of the community. When these two propositions failed, the residents of Hicksville presented the Board with petitions from hundreds of community members. Their request for a referendum fell on deaf ears. Mr. Schwartz reminded the community that their petitions were only advisory and he voted against a motion for a referendum. Does this sound like a Trustee who will "defend the community's right to have their voices heard in our educational system?" I believe his actions disqualify his self-proclamations!

In the last ten-year period, three other years—1974-5, 1975-6 and 1983-4—had higher increases by percent—11.1%, 9.1% and 9.9% respectively. One year, 1983-84 had a higher increase by dollar amount—\$1.86.

How are we doing? The business and economic climate in Nassau and Suffolk County is by far superior to the national average. Nassau County jobless rate is the lowest in the State - down to 4.1%. This represents a full 1% drop in only one month.

Most island industries are expanding. The reason, our industries are not fully committed to national defense projects or ancillary projects related to defense.

Those industries still tied to defense spending - and

there are still many on Long Island - are busy supplying our armed forces with pertinent needs as voted by Congress.

Summer jobs are going begging. Cashiers, service positions in restaurants, etc. are just too numerous to fill. High school students for the first time are in demand for these positions. College students are simply too few. This bonus is not all accidental. Our local legislatures have worked diligently to raise the economy of our area.

What's your home worth? Well, its value jumped 1.7% in April and continues to rise. The median cost - mid point - of a single family home as of April was \$72,000, with homes in Nassau and parts of California well above that figure and homes in Alabama and Arkansas below this figure. Hazardous waste controls as we have mentioned in past issues has been a pet project of Congressman Norman Lent. His influence has been felt by our State representatives.

The Republican-controlled State Senate passed a bill to establish a Hazardous Waste Management Committee.
