Eighth Precinct Police Report

A 32 year old Connecticut man was arrested by Robbery Squad Detectives in Manhattan on May 31, charged with two counts of Robbery First Degree-Banks.

John Ryan, 32, unemployed, of 82 Maplewood Drive, Monroe, Connecticut, was arrested in the World Trade Center, with the assistance of the Port Authority Police, around 9:00 p.m., by Detectives Raymond Mayberry and Peter Blum. He had been visiting a friend.

Ryan allegedly robbed the Beacon Federal Savings Bank, at 169 Old Country Road, Hicksville, at gunpoint, of \$18,000 dollars in 1982 and again on May 11 of \$11,000 dollars.

Ryan was arraigned in First District Court, Mineola and the investigation is continuing by the Robbery Squad of past bank robberies committed in the New York, Connecticut and New Jersey areas, in which Ryan may have been involved.

School Budget
The 1984-85 school budget will go before the voters of Hicksville on Wednesday, June 13, after a long period of study, deliberation, and debate. The budget, which supports the maintenance of educational services at the high level demanded by community residents, was kept to a 3.8% increase for a total of \$37,622,487. After the publication of budget brochure sent to all Hicksville residents, the Board voted to increase the appropriation for services provided by the Gregory Museum from \$30,000 to \$40,000. The allocation for unemployment insurance was reduced by \$10,000.

The voters will also benefit from the action of the Board to apply an additional \$250,000 from the projected surplus, or a total of \$1,950,000, reducing the tax rate from \$1.71 to \$1.49 over the current year's rate. The current estimate of the tax rate is \$22.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation, but the actual figure which is set by the Town of Oyster Bay based on the total levy voted by the Board will not be known until August. The tax rate is further adjusted by Nassau County after assessments in the four property tax categories are studied. Increases in state aid and in the total real property valuation of the district also contributed to the reduction of the tax rate from previous estimates.

In urging public support for the schools through the approval of next year's budget, Board President Jay Schwartz and his fellow members cited the efforts of the Superintendent and district staff and the input from the Budget Advisory Committee and members of the community which resulted in the sound financial plan proposed and presented to the public. The continuation of Hicksville's outstanding programs at all levels, extracurricular activities, transportation, expanded computer education facilities, curriculum development, and support services in the coming school year depend on voter endorsement on June 13, and citizens are asked to visit their district election locations.

Proposition 2

Proposition 2 asks the voters whether or not the Board of Education should adopt the following policy:

1.) In each public school classroom the teacher in charge may, at the opening of school upon every school day, conduct a brief period of silent meditation with the participation of all the pupils therein assembled.

2.) The silent meditation shall not be conducted as a religious service or exercise, but may be construed as an opportunity of silent meditation on a religious theme by those who are so disposed, or a moment of silent reflection on the anticipated activities of the day. "Participation" shall be construed to permit seated participation and not to require any pupil to stand.

Candidates who filed petitions for the Board are: Jay Schwartz, incumbent, being opposed by Bernard Goldman and John Montalto; John Ayres, incumbent, being opposed by Lawrence Moor; Honey Singer, incumbent, being opposed by Daniel MacBride.

Almost every seat in the house was taken when Jay Schwartz, Larry Moor and Danny MacBride, candidates supported by the Hicksville Coalition to Maintain a Moment of Silence, were introduced at the May 30th Rally.

Faces, some familiar and some not, from all walks of life in Hicksville, came through the door at the VFW Hall that night to talk with the candidates and to discuss their mutual desire for success for Proposition 2.

Several nights later, on Monday, June 4th, Schwartz,

Moor and MacBride appeared at candidates' night, giving honest answers to the variety of questions asked of them. Mr. Moor said his campaign, "Attacks the issues, not other people."

All three candidates pledge to "make up their minds at the board table and not before, by consulting others on the phone."

In Assemblyman Fred Parola's 1984 Constituency Poll, 79% of those who responded "favor a moment of silence for meditation in our public schools." Now, in

the closing days of the campaign, the Coalition is anxiously awaiting the final vote tabulation.

"The Coalition urges everyone to vote in the June 13th election from 10 A.M. to 10 P.M. in your local schools," said a spokesperson. "And if you believe as we do, VOTE YES on Proposition 2, and cast a lever for the 'A' team, Schwartz, Moor and MacBride, who are sincere, dedicated, and have a high quality of character," the spokesperson concluded.

GRIEF AND GUILT

It is normal and healthy for people to grieve after the loss of a loved one. It has been said, in fact, that grief and love are two sides of the same coin. The more one cares about another, the more deeply the loss will be felt.

Feelings of guilt, on the other hand, are more likely to be unhealthy, though they are not at all uncommon. The closer the human relationship, the more chance there is for guilt to be at least part of the response. A child may have resisted the authority of a parent, even wished the parent dead. A parent may be haunted by thoughts of having failed to protect the child from illness or accident. A sibling may feel guilty simply for being alive.

There is no easy answer. Many people who are troubled by overwhelming feelings of guilt find it useful to work these out with a clergyman or counselor

moment to separate fantasy from fact in this week's letter.

Fantasy: I have been accused of having no commitment to Hicksville because I am seeking an elective office on the town board in 1984.

Fact: There are no seats on the town board up for election in 1984. My commitment is solely to service on the school board.

Fantasy: A board member needs experience and knowledge before representing the community.

Fact: Mr. Ayres himself voted only in one election prior to his running for office in 1975. Mr. Montalto, a resident all his life, never voted prior to 1981. Mr. Goldman, a long-time resident, never voted in an election before he ran for office in 1982.

Fantasy: Policy decisions were never discussed with the community prior to December 1983.

Fact: Most changes in policy were conducted at regular board meetings with the community in attendance to allow input from all sides. Special policy committee meetings were begun only when special interest groups wanted to set policy relevant to their own needs. Mr. Bennett, while acting as policy chairman, never initiated policy committee meetings separate from the board as a whole.

Fantasy: Mrs. Rudin claims I voted to reduce guidance support services in the district.

Fact: The record indicates that I abstained on the reduction of that service. The record also shows that Mr. Ayres voted no to adding these two propositions to the ballot when he was unable to have them restored to the budget. I voted yes on the propositions so the community could make their wishes known.

Fantasy: It has been suggested that the community had no involvement in the reorganization at the secondary level.

Fact: The truth of the matter is that the board, as the representative of the community, received a recommendation, asked many questions, and deliberated many hours. When all of us came to a decision, it was unanimous because it was based upon educational

reasons and not personal preferences.

Having attended the meeting of May 17 and May 30 on the subjects of capping the TOB Syosset landfill and building a 1500 car parking lot, and the construction of a new L.I.R.R. station, Landia, I feel I must speak out for the unpolluted majority involved.

The "unpolluted majority" includes thousands of commuters who are dropped off at the overused Hicksville station, homeowners who live in the surrounding streets who are beleaguered by the illegal parking; fire department personnel answering calls south of Old Country Road, delayed and hampered by the congestion; unbused students who must find their way across major roads (106 and 107) to the Junior and Senior High schools south of Old Country Road; elderly residents, pedestrians or drivers who must brave the hazardous traffic to shop, visit or keep medical appointments; businessmen whose revenues and potential suffer from the congestion and lack of parking for their customers; all of the residents who just can't get through the congestion or tolerate the everincreasing noise, visual and air pollution.

Parola Seeks 4th Term In State Assembly

Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) announced today that he will seek re-election in November to a fourth term from the 14th Assembly District.
