I. Wolfson, Lawrence Moor, and Daniel MacBride complete the rest of the seven-member board.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Education will take place on Wednesday, July 18, at 8:15 pm in the conference room of the Administration Building on Division Avenue.

Aug. 28 Hearing Set For Zone Change Request

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled an August 28th public hearing on an application for a change of zone in Hicksville.

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond said, "the application by G.B.D. construction Company requests that an irregular parcel of vacant land on the east side of Jerusalem Avenue, north of South Dean Street be changed to an "E" Residence District to allow for

the construction of three single family dwellings."

Diamond added, "the property is currently zoned both "D" Residence and "F" Neighborhood Business District. The "F" zone being at the northern end of the property and the "D" Residence at the southern end."

The hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, August 28, at 10 AM in the Hearing Room, Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

August 7 Hearing For Special-Use Permit

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark announced that the Town Board has scheduled a public hearing for August 7, 1984 on a request for a special use permit in Hicksville.

Clark stated that "the applicants Island Affiliates, Inc., are requesting the special use permit to use a one-story building, located in an 'H' Industrial zone, solely

for office use."

The property is located on the southeasterly side of Broadway (route 107), south of the intersection of Bloomingdale Avenue and Broadway in Hicksville.

The hearing has been scheduled for August 7, beginning at 10 AM in the hearing room, Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Hicksville Library Extension To Start Soon

Within the next few weeks construction will begin on an extension to the Hicksville Public Library. The extension will be located between the Biography Room and the library offices on the South side of the library. About 2,400 square feet will be added, providing for 40,000 volumes and a small room that will be used as a conference room and house the Local History Collection that the library has been gradually putting together.

More than 275,000 volumes are in the library collection which grows at the rate of 8,000 - 10,000 volumes each year. In 1965, when the last addition was built, the collection numbered less than 125,000 volumes. The Board of Trustees are proud of the collection believing it to be one of the quality book collections in Nassau County. They have been aware for some time that the library needed space to house this collection and for the past three years have been discussing alternatives and carefully saving and investing monies received from fines and fees that can fund almost the entire project which is expected to cost slightly more than \$200,000.00. Bids have been received and the lowest bidders have been recommended by the architect and accepted by the Board of Trustees. They are N.R.I. Construction, Commercial Instrumentation Services and Aragona electric. Construction is expected to begin very soon under the general supervision of Bentel & Bentel, Architects, of Locust Valley, an architectural firm that has been responsible for a number

of public libraries on Long Island and a firm that is very highly rated by Library Boards and Directors.

The Local History and Conference Room will house the fledgling collection of newspapers, documents, photographs and other printed memorabilia that comprise the history of Hicksville. We are again requesting the residents of the community to scour their attics for anything in printed form or any photos that you think will add to our knowledge of old Hicksville. They will be preserved, cataloged and made available to students and citizens interested in their community's past. Many local history courses are now being offered in our Junior High Schools, High Schools and Colleges throughout Long Island. The collection will be considerably augmented by the materials gathered by Richard Evers, Historian of the Hicksville Gregory Museum and former teacher in the school system of Hicksville, when he completes the **History of Hicksville** revision, a book that has been used by thousands of students in the Hicksville Schools since 1961. This project has been funded by the Hicksville Public Library. Mr. Evers will finish this project in 1984 and will then turn over his material to the Hicksville Public Library for cataloging and preservation.

The building program should be completed by the end of 1984. The Board of Trustees are happy to announce that this project will be funded by money currently available and without the necessity of a bond issue.

New Image Drum & Bugle Corps Hosts 20th Annual Pageantry In Brass

"Pageantry in Brass" makes its twentieth annual appearance in Hicksville on Saturday, July 14. This exciting Pageant will give spectators the opportunity to see and hear some of the finest drum and bugle corps from the metropolitan area and out of state.

In addition to the Hicksville-based New Image Drum and Bugle Corps, who is hosting the pageant, seven corps from as far away as Pennsylvania, and southern New Jersey, are scheduled to appear.

New Image, instituted in 1983 when the ranks were opened to male members, is an outgrowth of the award-winning St. Ignatius Girls Drum & Bugle Corps. In 1983 the St. Ignatius girls celebrated their 25th anniversary as a corps and their 19th anniversary as hosts of the Pageant.

For the past 26 years the members of the Corps have rehearsed many hours each week throughout the year to prepare for the full schedule of exhibitions and competitions in which they participate each year across the nation and in Canada. Young people, ages 9 through 21, devote a large

portion of their free time to learning the intricate movements and musical routines that have earned them so many awards.

This year the monies raised from Pageantry in Brass will enable the Corps to travel to Lynn, Massachusetts for the "World Open" contest, then on to Marion, Ohio for the "U.S. Open," and finally to Toledo, Ohio for the "Key to the Sea" annual Drum Corps contest.

Advance tickets cost \$4.00 for adults, \$2.00 for senior citizens, and \$2.00 for children under 12. They will be available from Corps members who will be canvassing the Hicksville community shortly. Also, tickets will be sold at the gate and will cost \$6.00 for adults, \$4.00 for senior citizens, and \$3.00 for children under 12.

Pageantry in Brass begins at 6:45 pm, rain or shine, on the Hicksville High School Field, Division Avenue, Hicksville. These young people are tough competitors and seasoned performers who really know how to put on an arousing show. We suggest you get there early for the best seats. You won't want to miss it.

A CHILD'S RESPONSE TO DEATH

Children's reactions to the death of a loved one can vary enormously. There is no single procedure and formula that will fit all youngsters either at the time of death or during the difficult period that follows. It depends, first of all, on the age and personality of the youngster. How mature is he? What is his basic physical and emotional health? What is his concept of death? How close was he to the deceased? Were the circumstances surrounding the death traumatic, or was the child well-prepared?

The variations are so great that it is difficult to judge what is normal from what is not. Psychologists generally advise talking to the child and encouraging him to express his feeling about the loss.

Also involvement with the fu-

neral even if just attending is important. At our funeral home we have special ways to meet the needs of children coming to a relative's death and encourage whole family participation in the final rite of farewell.

However sometimes even these efforts are insufficient and professional help is needed. An immediate response, whatever it is, is healthier than a belated one.

Instead, you have challenged the proposed plan and test in the courts and questioned our authority to try to help. We have not suggested that you change your opinions, only that you go along, in the spirit of cooperation, and allow us to join with FEMA to run a full-field exercise of a plan, jointly developed, and to then place it before the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for evaluation.

Needless to say, your refusal to even permit a test greatly disappoints and alarms us, as it does many Long Island residents, judging by the mail we've been receiving. We have made our offer and remain open to working with you to test an evacuation plan. Our position is clear. We do not favor the imposition of Federal Government authority over any State in matters such as this.

Our national security, our economic security and our energy security are each dependent upon the other. New York and this Nation must continue to reduce their reliance on oil. America's energy future affects us all, not just one county in one State, but all. Accordingly we would continue to seek to work together with you to seek appropriate answers to the critical issue facing us today.

This Administration wants to work with New York and all of the States to solve the problems facing America. Our joint efforts can accomplish much. I continue to offer to work with you toward this end. The people we serve deserve nothing less.

At The Town Board Meeting

At its regular meeting held on Tuesday, July 10 at the Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay, the Oyster Bay Town Board acted on the following local matters:

- they approved resolution No. 659-1984 relating to Town environmental quality review commissions findings on the petition of Island Affiliates, Inc. for a special use permit at premises on Blomington Avenue and Broadway in Hicksville.

- they approved resolution no. 660-1984 granting the request of Nassau County Board of Ancient Order of Hibernians to use a roll-off container for their 12th annual Irish Cultural Feis scheduled for Sept. 16th.

- they approved resolution no. 664-1984 granting the request of the contractor to use the Town Highway yard on Miller Place for stockpiling of material in conjunction with Nassau County Sewer Contract in Syosset. This agreement to be signed by the supervisor.

- they approved resolution no. 685-1984 relating to the Planning Advisory Board's recommendation and resolution No. 5-84, concerning the request of the New York Telephone Company to add a 9,000 sq. ft. second floor on their building on West Cherry and Jerusalem Avenues in Hicksville, for the purpose of storing telephone equipment...not for office space. This is in the G-1 central business district.

- they approved resolution no. 688-1984 setting an August 7 hearing on the petition of Island Affiliates, Inc. for a special use permit in an Ind. H District for use of a one-story building as an office building solely for office use at premises on the southeast side of Broadway south of the intersection of Bloomingdale Ave and Broadway in Hicksville.

- they approved resolution no. 690-1984 setting an August 28th hearing on the petition of G.B.D. Construction Corp. for a change of zone from Bus. F and Res. D Districts to Res. E District on the east side of Jerusalem Avenue north from the intersection of South Dean Street in Hicksville.

- they approved resolution no. 691-1984 setting a Sept 11 hearing on the petition of Remington Aluminum/subsidiary of Evans Products Co. for a special use permit in an Ind. H District for the storage of aluminum storm doors and windows in a maximum of 200 trailers on the east side of Andrews Road north of Bethpage Road in Hicksville. More on this before the hearing.

- they denied resolution no. 711-1984...the petition of Dueco Fuel Oil, Inc. for a special use permit to park empty oil trucks overnight on Broadway in Hicksville. Residents had objected on the grounds that fumes and possible fires would be the result of granting such a permit.

- they approved resolution no. 698-1984 relating to the Town Environmental Quality Review Commissions findings on the petition of Ric-Mac Equities corp. and White Castle System, Inc. for a special use permit in a Bus. G District in Hicksville. The public hearing on this matter has not as yet been set.

- they approved resolution no. 703-1984 relating to quantity increases on the construction of temporary-on-grade commuter parking facilities on West Barclay Street in Hicksville. This, along with resolution no. 704-1984 will be the last on-grade commuter parking in Hicksville, according to spokespersons for the Town.

- they approved resolution no. 705-1984 relating to engineering services on the final design phase of the relocation of temporary gas control facilities to a permanent location at Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex. The town is presently making plans to sell the methane gas that is collected.

- they approved resolution no. 687-1984 setting a July 31 hearing to consider proposed increase and improvement of facilities of the Town of Oyster Bay public parking district in Syosset. The Dept of Public Works is presently doing some redesigning of the parking fields that will permit more cars to park in the Syosset RR area. These additional spaces will be metered.

- they denied resolution no. 710-1984...the petition of Haypath Holding Co., for a change of zone on Haypath Road in Old Bethpage, on the grounds that the Town does not want a business in a residential area.

The next regular meeting of the Town Board is set for Tuesday, July 31 starting at 10 a.m. in the Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay.

"Taxpayers Will Pay More If Shoreham Never Opens" Hodel

In a recent letter to Gov. Mario Cuomo, U.S. Secretary of Energy Donald P. Hodel, in a continuing effort to test the Emergency Response Plan for the Shoreham nuclear power plant, urged cooperation toward this vital step in the following letter.

Dear Governor Cuomo:

The five nuclear power plants now in service in New York State have saved as estimated 315 million barrels of oil since they began operating. They are currently saving oil at the rate of 33 million barrels a year. This is a significant contribution to reducing our dependence on foreign oil to

meet our energy needs. In spite of this, New York State still burns more oil to produce electricity than any other State, and is, therefore, in greater jeopardy from a potential cutoff of supply of oil from the Persian Gulf. And while America is dependent on imported oil for about 30%

of our requirements, the Soviet Union is energy independent.

In my last letter to you, I pointed out that the Shoreham nuclear power plant could replace 7 to 9 million barrels of oil now used annually to produce electricity. Additionally, the Nine Mile Point #2 plant would roughly double that figure. These plants are vital to our national security because they can help reduce dependence on foreign oil.

There is also an economic incentive to these plants. Over the long term, nuclear power which replaces oil generation can potentially save the ratepayers money. We believe that ratepayers, especially on Long Island, will end up paying more -- not less -- if Shoreham never operates. These citizens have already suffered rate increases of over 100 percent since 1970 as a result of overdependence on foreign oil.

Decades of operation have shown that commercial nuclear power plants are safe. In fact, these plants have the finest record of safety of any form of power generation.

We share your concern for the health and safety of

people -- inside and outside the plant. We all value human life and will not condone nor support any action which jeopardizes the safety of any of our people.

We do not believe that the Shoreham Nuclear power plant is a hazard to the people of Long Island; nor do we believe that it will jeopardize the safety of those people. We do believe, however, that they are jeopardized in both supply and price by continued dependence on oil generation. Furthermore, continued use of high sulphur oil has a potential negative impact on their environment. We recognize, however, that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission requires that as an extra margin of safety there must be an effective, workable emergency evacuation plan for Shoreham.

Your statements indicate that you do not believe that an adequate evacuation plan can be developed for Shoreham. What is more, you have made it clear that you are unwilling even to test such a plan. We have indicated our willingness to participate in a test of an appropriate plan, but you have refused even that.
