Due to a technicality in U.S. immigration law, the Soporowski's were unable to secure an immigration visa for their daughter; as a result, Joanna was left in Warsaw, Poland, under the care of her grandmother.

When Joanna's grandmother's death made it imperative that the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service grant her an immigration visa immediately, the couple turned to Congressman Lent for assistance.

Basing his argument on humanitarian grounds, Lent was able to cut through miles of bureaucratic red-tape and secure for Joanna a 6 month parole to enter the United States.

We had not been notified of any cancellation.

Three of the seven turned away from that trip were eighty years old - who will apologize when they are no longer here.

We asked for our refund and were told we might get it on Monday five days later.

This was a cruel, unfeeling and inhuman way to treat Senior Citizens who looked forward so happily to a beautiful day out.

## At The Town Board Meeting

At its regular meeting held on Tuesday, July 31, the Oyster Bay Town Board acted as follows on the following matters up for their consideration:

- they reserved decision on the petition of Donald Monti and Dr. Ralph Parisi and the Plainview-Old Bethpage Central School District for a special use permit and a change of zone to rezone the Central Park Road School property to permit the present building to be converted into 100 senior citizen housing units and to erect a 3-story, 19,800 square foot office building on the property in this 5.3 acre tract which borders on Old Country Road. Over 100 local residents, business people and head of local organizations were in attendance, and, as well as presenting petitions carrying over 1,000 signatures in favor of the Board granting this petition, many of them testified. All were in favor of granting this petition and the change of zone. Prior to this hearing, the petitioner had met with many local groups and residents. After many conferences, the petitioner agreed to 21 restrictions and covenants which local residents had suggested. These were also turned in to Town authorities for their consideration.

If these plans are acceptable to the Town, the senior citizen residence planned for this property, will be owned by Donald Monti and Dr. Ralph Parisi. It is estimated that rental for these units will be between \$1,000 to \$1,200 a month. No health care facilities will be connected with this operation. However, it is located near to the Central General Hospital and the Central General Nursing Home.

During the questioning of the plans presented by the petitioner's attorney, Town authorities questioned the cooking units planned in each apartment, and asked whether the venting would be adequate. They also questioned parking available for visitors and finally brought up the fact that a signal light would be needed on the corner in question. They were informed that the Hospital is already attempting to have the County install such a signal. It was explained that the rentals would include at least the dinner, and that all meals would be available and that cooking would in all likelihood be extremely limited, but certainly needed occasionally. It was mentioned that residents would be over 75 years of age.

- they reserved decision and later passed in Res. 67 & 68, a proposal to increase and improve the facilities of the Town of Oyster Bay Public Parking District, consisting the reconstruction of various parking fields, the reconstruction of

various parking structures and the purchase and installation of parking meters at various parking fields and parking structures at a total maximum estimated expense of \$970,000.

**THIS INCLUDES WORK ON THE HICKSVILLE PARKING GARAGE** as far as sprinklers and drainage problems are concerned. **BUT, NO ADDITIONAL PARKING SPACES WILL BE ADDED TO THE HICKSVILLE PARKING FACILITIES.**

- they reserved decision amending local law on Town purchasing procedures. Prior to this all bids went directly to the General Services Dept. If this proposal is approved, the Dept of Public Works will receive their bids for any amounts over five thousand dollars and the Commissioner of Public Works will then submit his recommendations to the Town Board.

- they approved Resolution No. 714, of the Elite Construction Co. to add one story to their existing building on West Marie Street in Hicksville.

- they approved Resolution No. 715 granting an R-O (residence office) zone to the Sonia Lerner building on South Oyster Bay Road in Hicksville.

- they approved Resolution No. 728 giving the Town the entrance roads to the Rustic Acres, Rustic Court, in Plainview.

- they approved Resolution No. 731 relating to the Town Environmental Quality Review Commission's findings on the petition of Burger King for a special use permit for a drive-through at their facility on South Oyster Bay Road and Old Country Road in Plainview.

- they approved Resolution No. 734 relating to engineering services to be performed giving the right of the contractor to subcontract some of this work to be done, capping and closure program at Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex.

- they approved Resolution No. 742 for the final payment on the contract on the Old Bethpage Landfill Gas Control System, as this work is completed and approved.

- they approved Resolution No. 746 deleting both Nov. 27

### Photo I.D. Machines

Assemblyman Frederick E. Parola (R-C, Wantagh) today blasted the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles for failing to provide Nassau County with adequate means to implement the newly adopted photo licensing process.

At present, only the Westbury office has the capabilities to provide this long overdue service.

"After visiting the Westbury office," Parola stated, "I was appalled to see that the lines extended throughout the entire building.

"The most outrageous aspect of this intolerable situation," he continued, "is that both Queens and Suffolk counties have seven and eight processing machines respectively, to the three we in Nassau County have been allotted to service equally as many if not more individuals.

"I have taken the initiative by writing Governor Cuomo and D.M.V. Commissioner John A. Passidomo to demand an immediate investigation, as well as additional machines, to remedy this unconscionable neglect of Nassau County motorists," Parola concluded.

**PRIMITIVE PRACTICES**

It was the practice of many cultures to include material possessions and necessities in the burial place. In many cases this tradition was followed by one in which the wife and slaves of a rich man would also follow him in death and interment.

The sacrificial rite of self-immolation was common in India as late as the year 1829, when it was abolished. Prior to that time, the Hindu widow voluntarily perished in the flames of the funeral pyre at the death of her husband.

Afterward, the practice became more symbolic. The widow placed herself by the side of the corpse in order to demonstrate her willingness to offer herself as a victim. At

the last moment, a relative intervened, saying: "Rise up, woman, thou art lying by one whose life is gone, come down to the world of the living."

In many ways, this last symbolic act expresses our own feelings and values today, returning to the job at hand of getting back to the world of the living.
