## Landia Station/Syosset Landfill Final Environmental Impact Statement Time Extended Until Oct. 1, '84

Note: The BCA has obtained the following letter. This letter is being printed in order to keep the Jericho Community fully informed. Both the BCA and its counsel, Twomey, Latham and Shea believe the following letter is a direct result of their efforts and community opposition to the 1,500 car commuter parking facility LIRR right-of-way, Syosset (Landia).

### NOTICE OF EXTENSION OF TIME TO PREPARE F.E.I.S.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 7-1984

WHEREAS, the NASSAU COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, DIVISION OF HIGHWAYS AND GENERAL ENGINEERING, submitted to the NASSAU COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION a Preliminary Environmental Assessment Statement and application for the construction of a 1,500-car parking field along the Long Island Rail Road right-of-way at Syosset (Landia), Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York; and

WHEREAS, the Preliminary Environmental Assessment Statement and short environmental assessment form have been reviewed by the NASSAU COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION and its staff; and

WHEREAS, the review of such environmental assessment statement and short environmental assessment form by the Commission has indicated that the application herein may have a significant effect upon the environment and,

therefore, does constitute a Type I action, pursuant to Section 617.12 of Part 617 of Title 6 NYCRR and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County; and

WHEREAS, on May 3, 1984, the NASSAU COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION received an environmental impact report in the form of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (D.E.I.S.); and

WHEREAS, on May 10, 1984, the NASSAU COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION determined that said D.E.I.S. was complete and that a public hearing be scheduled for May 30, 1984 to solicit comments, pursuant to Part 617 of the implementing regulations pertaining to Article 8 (SEQR) of the Environmental Conservation Law and Section 1611 of the County Government Law; and

WHEREAS, said public hearing was duly held and a commenting period was established to June 11, 1984; and

WHEREAS, it is the determination of the NASSAU COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION that additional time is necessary to prepare the Final Environmental Impact Statement for good and sufficient cause;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the time for the NASSAU COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION to act, pursuant to Section 617.8(e) of the Environmental Conservation Law, is hereby extended to and including October 1, 1984.

## Family Med Practice To Sponsor Blood Drive

Family Med Practice, a community medical facility in the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza, is sponsoring its first blood drive on Monday, August 20, from 10 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. A busmobile, a self-contained mobile blood donor center from Long Island Blood Services, will

be parked in the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza in Hicksville on this date.

This blood drive will help boost blood supplies in the 41 hospitals on Long Island that depend on Long Island Blood Services for blood and components. Earlier this summer an appeal for donors was issued as blood supplies dropped during the Independence Day holiday.

Regular donations by eligible donors are the key to maintaining these supplies.

Donors must be between the ages of 17 and 66, in good health, and weigh at least 110 pounds. Donations can be made every 36 days, up to five times each year.

License fees have not increased this year. The "Sporting License Application" form is to be completed by the applicant and will then be validated by the clerk with a series of validation stamps for each license type. Don't forget, sportsmen, that party permits must be mailed to the State no later than Sept. 1.

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## Set August 28 Public Hearing On Proposed Amendment To Waterways Ordinance

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a public hearing for Tuesday, August 28, to consider proposed changes to the Town Waterways Ordinance according to Oyster Bay Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

Clark said, "the proposed changes would extend the

'DEAD SLOW - NO WAKE' zone to include the entrances and exits to areas used as boat basins, marinas, anchorages and moorings.

The proposed changes would also create a 12 mile-per-hour speed zone and prohibit excessive wake conditions in that portion of

the State boating channel which is within Town of Oyster Bay south shore waters."

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, August 28, beginning at 10 AM in the Town Hall East hearing room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

## At The Town Board Meeting

At a regular meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay at the Town Hall in Oyster Bay on Tuesday, August 7, the following matters were acted upon:

- the board reserved decision on the petition of Island Affiliates, Inc. for a special-use permit in an Ind. H District for use of a one-story building as an office building solely for office use on the southeast side of Broadway, south of the intersection of Bloomingdale Avenue in Hicksville. No one appeared in opposition to this petition.

- they reserved decision on the petition of Bencal Associates for a change of zone from Res. A to #2 General Residence District and for a waiver of the Town Board rule requiring a one-year waiting period for re-application for a change of zone on premises located on the north side of North Service Road of LIE, east of the major portion of the entrance ramp for west-bound traffic from the North Service Road to the LIE at Exit No. 30, west of the property of WERE Associates, in Jericho. The Board did waive the one year waiting period and a presentation was made by the petitioner's attorney, Mr. Jack Coffey. The petitioner wishes to build 93 condominium town houses on 19 1/2 acres at this location.

- They approved Resolution No. 779-1984 reducing the speed limit in the areas of the Willet Avenue and Burns Avenue Schools in Hicksville to 20 MPH.

- they approved Resolution No. 780-1984 amending the site plan of the Delco Development Co. for a change of zone at their building located on Hanover Pl. and Broadway, in Hicksville. These amendments permit changes in the size of parking stalls and signs and permit some warehouse facilities in the rear of the property to be used as retail stores. This is just approval of a site plan. No date has yet been set for the public hearing on this matter.

- They approved Resolution No. 786-1984 setting fees to be charged to filmmakers, photographers, or advertising agencies, who wish to use town facilities or equipment. In the past the Town had no policy regarding these often-requested uses. Now we do.

- they approved Resolution No. 790-1984 granting the petition of the U-Haul of Long Island, Inc. and Brooklyn Avenue Associates for a special use permit to park their two trucks and, if necessary, to do repairs on them. The Board imposed several restrictions and covenants on this approval.

- in an additional resolu-

tion the Board set a hearing on Tuesday, Aug. 28, for a petition of Grumman Data Systems and Industrial and Research Associates for a special use permit in an Ind. H District for the use of a one-story brick building as a technical school, at Crossways Park in Woodbury.

The next regular meeting of the Town Board is scheduled for Tuesday, August 28 starting at 10 a.m.



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## Buon Giorno... Visitors From Italy

Buon giorno! This Italian greeting will become a familiar one in Hicksville when 15 high school students from Rome and a teacher or headmaster from their school arrive on September

17 to begin a three-week stay under the auspices of the American Field Service student exchange program. The process began when the Mayor of Rome felt that students would benefit from living and learning in an American community where the Italian language and culture are part of the school curriculum and community.

Hicksville, a new member of the AFS family of local chapters, was selected because of the fine language program in the district as well as the presence of a large segment of the local population of Italian descent.

The students will attend Hicksville High School, taking classes in English, American History, science and math. Their teacher will serve as a guest lecturer for our Hicksville students. The group will also visit the Junior High and the elementary schools to talk about their country and customs and inspire interest in the study of foreign language. They will leave Hicksville on October 6 to begin their return trip to Rome. On the other side of the exchange, fifteen students from Hicksville will have the opportunity to travel to Rome during the winter or spring to live with Italian families and attend a Roman high school.

The district is now seeking host families for the students and their teacher for the period beginning September 17 and ending on October 6. The meetings will be held at the Hicksville Youth Council Center, 181 W. Old Country Road, beginning at 7:30 PM. They are open to all separated, divorced and widowed parents.

The current television show, "The Peoples' Court" is attracting many viewers, and for good reason. Courtroom proceedings - whether an epic murder trial or the petty claims actions of human beings in dispute - are a type of drama most people find captivating or entertaining. Hicksville's Old Heitz Place Courthouse, the home of the Gregory Museum, is no longer the setting for "The Peoples' Court" hereabouts, but in its colorful judicial history it experienced much that we see on T.V.

Built in 1895, on land donated to the Town of Oyster Bay as the site for a meeting hall by Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Heitz, the building was a courthouse through much of its service. Here, from 1900-1935, Town justices of the peace held court with juries, when needed, recruited by the constables from available local folk. Some day we'll relate the stories of those days, we've gathered in some detail, but for now, we may mention that among the versatile and appealing "J.P.'s" were: the late Joseph Steiner (1900-1919); Judge Charles Stoll, the well-known big game hunter, attorney and water supply authority; the late Judge Andrew Heberer, businessman-turned-judge who coped humanely with the social problems of the Great Depression; and Judge Joseph Lebkuecher, the farmer's son and attorney-realtor, who continues to spend himself in his later years trying to create something of the West Broadway-down-town mess, in the village of his youth, education and long court service.

Judge Lebkuecher was a transitional justice at Heitz Place, continuing on the bench when the courthouse, in 1935, became the site of the Nassau County Fourth District Court. In that same year, the 1915 brick jail house was shut down as a "lock-up," when a despondent man, briefly detained in a marital disturbance of the peace, hanged himself.

Yes, the walls, corridors and the remaining stark cell of the Heitz Place Courthouse, today's Hicksville Gregory Museum, still speak of human grief of broken contracts and promises, of petty thefts and property line disputes, of Jericho auto speeders complaining of hidden motor cycle cop-zealots and of hapless youths waiting for fine money.

One sees and hears again the old-time rural tax col-

lecting sessions when merchant Fred Herzog paid his taxes from a 25 pound flour bag of silver dollars; one attends in the imagination the meetings on public issues and election night gatherings when the courthouse served as the "town hall." Hicksville's men signed for the Draft in World War I at this site, and 25 years later, their sons gathered on the courthouse lawn to march to the railroad station and far-flung battlefields and seas behind the late John Harbes of Plainview in his Legionnaire's cap - carrying the flag.

Hicksville's best known landmark building was part of the County court system until 1966, when the building was no longer adequate for the case load resulting from this transportation hub's commercial development and population growth. By 1969, when the late Councilman Carl Gruenwald of Hicksville led an effort to make the closed, boarded-up building available to the Trustees of the Gregory Museum, the courthouse was much vandalized.

In one of our time's most visionary actions, the Town Board of Oyster Bay made the courthouse available to the museum's leaders in a 25 year gratis lease with an option to renew. The lease stipulated that the museum insure the courthouse annually and that the structure be renovated and maintained without cost to the Town. This lease was later extended for a period of ten years. By this farsighted agreement, the landmark building was protected from vandalism and destruction by fire while, at the same time, the Museum Board was able to relocate and, ultimately, expand the

splendid mineralogy collection gathered by Gardiner and Anna Gregory.

Over the years, the Museum Board has struggled earnestly and imaginatively to live up to their responsibility for the Heitz Place Courthouse maintenance. From the very first efforts to undo the work of young vandals, history-minded museum leaders have sought to retain the authentic exterior architecture of the building and to

preserve on cell of the old-time brick jailhouse. These efforts of Museum Historical Co-chairman Richard Evans and Kenneth Barnes and Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Conover and others, such as Town Historian, Dorothy Horton McGee, were successful in 1974 in having the Heitz Place Courthouse listed in the National Register of Historic Buildings a distinction, indeed, for Hicksville.

## Our Town Could Be More Beautiful

But summer is not without some minor nuisances. One that I find particularly annoying is "eye pollution." When we spend so much more time outside, the evidence of litter becomes highly visible.

The New York State Bottle Bill has made a major impact on removing the bottles and cans from our roads and recreation areas. Often I have seen young children, with plastic garbage bags in hand, picking up discarded

soda and beer containers. And while they are making some pocket money for themselves they are also doing a service for all of us.

Of course we might wonder who left those containers for the enterprising youngsters to collect.

Every day work crews at our Town parks and beaches scour the areas picking up the refuse that people left in

their wake. Some may think that one sandwich wrapper or potato chip bag isn't much, but at the end of the day, when that wrapper joins the one discarded wrapper of everyone else who was on the beach or in the park that day, the sight is appalling.

We all have to be conscientious about putting our refuse in the receptacles that

are prominently placed throughout the Town recreation areas.

For homeowners, sanitation regulations remain unchanged during the summer. Containers should not be placed at the curb before 5 PM on the day prior to a scheduled pick up. This regulation, we have found, helps to keep garbage from being scattered over streets and sidewalks - the result of animals being let loose.

All refuse containers must have handles or handgrips and tight fitting covers, another preventive measure.

Newspapers left for sanitation pickup must be securely tied and measure no more than 12 inches in height.

By working together, at home and when using the Town's recreation facilities, we can put an end to "eye pollution."

As a result, without it costing one additional cent, our town would be more beautiful.
