# Fire Duty Tapers Off HAZ - MAT Incidents Increase

Since the last Fire Report serious fires causing heavy damage has fallen off. But hazardous materials incidents have continued to increase.

On July 11 an electrical fire in a bedroom caused \$500.00 damage. The alarm, at 1 Regent St. was reported at 8:28 PM and 9 units, 55 men under Chief Magee responded. The fire was under control in 15 minutes. Damage in the home would have been less, but a smoke detector did not work due to lack of a battery.

On July 12 fire broke out in a 2nd floor bedroom at 47 Flower St., Hicksville. The 2:12 PM alarm caused \$40,000.00 damage. 39 members responded under Asst. Chief William Schuckmann.

Since June the Hicksville F.D. HAZ MAT Response Team has responded to fifteen incidents.

6-7-84 - The HAZ MAT Team assisted Westbury F.D. at the scene of an unknown chemical spill.

6-13-84 - HAZ MAT incident in Hicksville involving chlorine was stabilized.

7-16-84 - 8:15 pm - The Dept. handled a propane tank leak in the Sears parking lot. A customer, returning a propane tank emptied it in the parking lot. Vamps dispersed the vapor cloud and shut off the tank averting a serious incident.

7-19-84 - The HAZ MAT Team assisted the Bethpage F.D. at a running gasoline leak.

8-3-84 - 4:02 pm - The HAZ MAT Team assisted

the Bethpage F.D. with a chlorine gas leak at the Bethpage Community Park.

8-6-84 - 9:03 am - The HAZ MAT Team, using 200 lb. of lime neutralized a nitric acid spill at Ampex Co., 230 Dully Ave., Hicksville, after a chemical reaction occurred when an employee was transferring the acid from a 55 gal. drum to a small container. A small explosion injured one employee. He was transported to the hospital via F.D. ambulance.

8-15-84 - 12:25 am - The HAZ MAT Team assisted the Jericho F.D. at the scene of a chemical spill after a tractor trailer truck strayed onto the N.S. Parkway and struck the Route 107 overpass, spilling sodium hydroxide and an

arsenic compound - Phenylarsene Oxide. Team members contained the chemicals. Decontamination of several people at the scene was done by Jericho Firefighters. They also treated seven people for inhalation problems at the scene. A pollution control firm cleaned up the spill. (The remaining incidents were incidents involving propane BBQ units. (Leaks & Fires)

## Gregory Museum Doings

Although the Hicksville Gregory Museum and its activities are known well enough to readers of this newspaper because of the fine exposure provided by the editor, the Museum's governing and policy-making body deserves to be better known. The museum's Board of Trustees and its Board of Advisors are notable for their stability, teamwork and, in many cases, for their long service on the boards.

The Gregory Museum is a state-chartered non-profit educational institution governed by a volunteer Board of Trustees whose members hold their seats through nomination and election by the existing Board for terms of two or three years. The present Board consists of 12 members, the majority of whom are Hicksville residents of long service to the community in various organizations.

Douglas J. Uzakewicz, the current Museum President, is a radiographic technologist with business experience, and many years of activity with the Boy Scouts. The Vice-President of the Board is Mrs. Elizabeth W. Pearce, a retired East Street teacher and a lady who continues to assist her erstwhile school colleagues each week at East Street, and who often serves the Museum as a most enthusiastic school tour guide.

Irwin M. Botto is the Museum Treasurer, he is a life-long resident of Hicksville, a graduate of our public schools and a mechanical engineer who is President of the Botto Mechanical Corp. of Hicksville. Irwin is active in a large way with the popular annual Octoberfest planning which raises funds for that enterprising leader, Father John Seidenschwang, and his Holy Trinity Diocesan High School.

Mrs. Joan Nold of Stewart Manor serves as Recording and Corresponding Secretary. She is a businesswoman, and is joined on the Museum board by her

husband, Carl Nold, Sr., a production supervisory for Sperry Gyroscope.

Other Trustees include Dr. Richard W. Smith, a well known Hicksville chiropractor who has served the museum as its President. Richard has long been a leader in Kiwanis Club fund raising and served the Hicksville club as President. Two well known educators on the Gregory Museum Board of Trustees are Mrs. Rosemary Barrow and Mrs. Marjorie Giannelli.

Mrs. Barrow is the longest serving of the present trustees, having been continuously in the Museum's council of leadership since the early seventies. An innovative, dynamic teacher who serves as the Willet Avenue School media specialist and librarian, Rosemary provides the museum with perceptive and relevant ideas.

Marge Giannelli is a newer museum trustee, but her many talents and her outgoing, candid judgment, her long residence in Hicksville, and her many years of varied community leadership make her a most valuable board member. Marge is a retired and excellent teacher (Woodland Avenue School), an administrator (Principal of the Hicksville Evening High School in the late 'seventies), and an organization leader in the Parent-Teacher Association and the St. Ignatius Loyola Parish Council. She is presently conducting her third Summer nature-oriented program for children at the Hicksville Public Library with the cooperation of the Gregory Museum.

A museum trustee who is also in her first term but who has proven a great asset to the Museum's effort at self-support is Mrs. Rose Morabito. Rose's forte is management of the museum Gift Shop. Since early 1982, when she took a hand as a new volunteer in reorganizing and building up our museum store inventory,

Mrs. Morabito has succeeded beyond our hopes. The variety and quantity of the inexpensive and educational souvenirs the Museum Gift Shop offers visiting school classes is remarkable. Teachers and parents appreciate souvenirs which may lead to worthwhile hobbies for youngsters. Rose Morabito's Gift Shop profits insure a varied inventory but they also make available funds for special museum needs which keep occurring: a new typewriter; an insurance premium to be paid or repayment of loans made by trustees for the purchase of specimens to improve our collections.

John Kean is also serving his first term as trustee, and brings wit and savoir faire to our board meetings, his comments reflecting many interests. Mr. Kean has been President of the Atlantic Bottle Gas Company of Hicksville for 31 years. He is skilled in wood working, a stone cutter and lapidary craftsman, and for ten years taught jewelry making in Hicksville's Adult Education Program.

Two highly respected, long-service trustees who have recently left the Museum Board for reasons of health or to voluntarily make way for other talents are Elery H. Bean and Kenneth Barnes. Well known and admired for years of community service and executive leadership, Mr. Bean is a retired executive from the Human Resources Center Abilities Inc. He brought to his six years on the Museum Board much experience, also, as Director for many years of the Hicksville Adult Education Program and as a trustee and the current President of the Public Library Board. Kenneth Barnes leaves our board, also, after equally long service. Director for over thirty years of the large Hicksville Public Library, Ken brought to us his considerable experience and contacts as one of the lead-

ers of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce. In leaving the Museum Board, Mr. Barnes has expressed his firm desire to continue the Public Library's close collaboration with the Gregory Museum in their mutual effort to collect, preserve and organize the documentary and pictorial historical records of Hicksville.

Last, but still quite important to the Gregory Museum's existence and future progress, are two trustees who live in Maine retirement but attend one board meeting each year, Dr. Gardner and Mrs. Anne Gregory, the museum's founders. For over 15 years, this indefatigable, inspired team created, financially sustained and led the museum. Although no longer powerful voices in current museum operations, the Gregorys follow our progress with keen and experienced insights. When in town, they

## "Delinquent Debts A Scandal," D'Amato

By a vote of 96 to 1, the U.S. Senate has proposed by Senator Alfonse D'Amato (R-C-NY) that will allow the Justice Department to contract with private law firms in an effort to collect over \$16,000,000,000 in delinquent government loans.

Senator D'Amato said that it is an "absolute scandal" that over \$16 BILLION in money owed the federal government has not been collected and that there is virtually nothing being done about more than 124,000 cases of delinquent debts.

"If we're serious about cutting the deficit, we must act now to see to it that the \$16 BILLION owed the federal government is collected," D'Amato said, noting that "the taxpayers of this nation are being robbed by those who would borrow money and then skip out on their responsibility to repay."

The Justice Department now bears the responsibility of litigating delinquent loan cases referred to it by federal agencies. (ie: student, economic development, hous-

ing, agriculture loans). Senator D'Amato said that the department lacks the resources, manpower, and computers that private law firms specializing in collections have.

"U.S. attorneys are crime fighters - not bill collectors," D'Amato said, noting that uncollected loans are adding up. "There are over 21,000 student loan cases alone waiting for action. I spoke with one Assistant U.S. Attorney who has over 2,500 such cases she is responsible for backed up. This cannot continue."

"Delinquent government loans must be collected, but not by sacrificing the time and effectiveness of the U.S. Attorneys who are needed to combat drug rings and organized crime," D'Amato asserted. "We must contract with private attorneys who can devote the time to adequately pursue these cases and collect the money owed the government."

"When people borrow money from the government and shirk their responsibil-

ity to repay, they must know, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that the U.S. government is going to pursue them and collect," he said.

Senator D'Amato credited Senator Charles Percy (R-III), Chairman of the Subcommittee on Energy, Nuclear Proliferation and Government Processes, as being "instrumental" in the effort to pass S. 1668. Last year, it was Senator Percy's subcommittee that held hearings on S. 1668 and cleared the way for passage by the full Committee on Government Affairs.

The corresponding bill in the House is H.R. 5196 (Rep. Moody).
