Hicksville Schools Open Sept. 5

A little more than 5200 Hicksville youngsters will head back to school as the Hicksville Public Schools open the doors on Wednesday, September 5, for the beginning of the 1984-85 school year. Joining them will be an American Field Service exchange student from Portugal who will be attending Hicksville High School for the year and 15 students from Rome who will spend three weeks in Hicksville on a short-term exchange.

Staff members representing all areas of district operations have been busy throughout the summer preparing for the new year. Repairs and maintenance of the buildings have continued at a hectic pace and members of the teaching staff have been rivolved in writing new curriculum for all levels of instruction to be used in the coming year. Many teachers also took nart in inservice workshops to learn and sharpen also took part in in-service workshops to learn and sharpen skills in a number of subject areas, and district administra-tors met for three days this week to address instructional and budget issues and to discuss goals for the year set by the Board of Education. Those goals are:

1. Increase student enrollment and improve the program

in foreign language in grades 7-12 for students of all ability

2. Improve student performance and grade-level articu-

3. Improve guidance department services in the secondary

4. Develop and implement a comprehensive Career/Vo-

cational Program.

5. Develop school programs stressing tolerance.

6. Continue and refine procedures for surveying

7. Refine Board of Education bylaws and increase oppor-tunities for Board members to enhance the effectiveness of their roles

The foundation has been laid for a productive 1984-85 school year, and community members are urged to participate in the process by joining and working with Board of Education committees and attending Board meetings and school-sponsored events. 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Hicksville Woman In Non-Traditional Role

Greasy hands and long hours working under trucks didn't discourage Jeanne Boccarossa. And climbing poles and ladders outside in any kind of weather was another satisfying challenge.

"Those types of jobs are great," said Boccarossa, an installation technician with the New York Telephone Company. "I've always held jobs that were traditionally held by men. It hasn't created problems because I have the training and experience to perform as well as anybody else."

Boccarossa is among a growing number of women who hold non-traditional jobs at New York Telephone. 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

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GOES BACK.....

It's back to school again. For some young people it's the time to greet old friends and compare notes on the Summer.

Some students will be going to new schools... meeting new teachers... new friends. Some little ones will be going to school for the very first time.

The health and safety of our young people is important to all of us. With countless school children on the streets, drivers must be extremely careful. Children do not think and act as adults.

Motorists approaching school buses must exercise caution whether they see children or not. Section 1174 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of our State requires motorists whose vehicles meet or overtake a school bus, which is stopped to receive or discharge students, to stop their vehicles while the bus's flashing red signals are in operation. This same section of law mandates that school bus drivers instruct their passengers who cross the street to do so in front of the bus. The driver, meantime, is required to keep the bus stopped and the red lights flashing until all children have reached the other side of the street.

The law now requires that motorists must observe the lower school area speed limits during the entire school day, not just at the beginning and end of each school session.

Finally, watch out for bicyclists - not all of them seem to know the "rules of the road," which they are supposed to observe. Parents, these are important rules for you to teach those of your children who use bicycles.
