Hicksville Schools Open Sept. 5

A little more than 5200 Hicksville youngsters will head back to school as the Hicksville Public Schools open the doors on Wednesday, September 5, for the beginning of the 1984-85 school year. Joining them will be an American Field Service exchange student from Portugal who will be attending Hicksville High School for the year and 15 students from Rome who will spend three weeks in Hicksville on a short-term exchange.

Staff members representing all areas of district operations have been busy throughout the summer preparing for the new year. Repairs and maintenance of the buildings have continued at a hectic pace and members of the teaching staff have been involved in writing new curriculum for all levels of instruction to be used in the coming year. Many teachers also took part in in-service workshops to learn and sharpen skills in a number of subject areas, and district administrators met for three days this week to address instructional and budget issues and to discuss goals for the year set by the Board of Education. Those goals are:

1. Increase student enrollment and improve the program

in foreign language in grades 7-12 for students of all ability levels.

2. Improve student performance and grade-level articulation in mathematics.

3. Improve guidance department services in the secondary schools.

4. Develop and implement a comprehensive Career/Vocational Program.

5. Develop school programs stressing tolerance.

6. Continue and refine procedures for surveying graduates.

7. Refine Board of Education bylaws and increase opportunities for Board members to enhance the effectiveness of their roles.

The foundation has been laid for a productive 1984-85 school year, and community members are urged to participate in the process by joining and working with Board of Education committees and attending Board meetings and school-sponsored events. Board committee and regular meeting dates are listed on this year's school calendar.

Labor Day Parade and Drill - 1984

The Hicksville Fire Department's 56th Annual Firemen's Parade and Drill will be held this coming Labor Day weekend.

The parade will be held on Sunday, Sept. 2nd at 5 p.m. sharp (one hour earlier than last year). The parade route will be the same as last year. Departments will march south on Jerusalem Ave. from Herzog Place, picking up six divisions as they pass. Then the parade will march east on Old Country Rd. to Broadway (Route 107), proceed north to W. John St., then west on John St. to Newbridge Rd. to West Barclay St.; west on Barclay St. to the arch and grandstand area where officials will review the parade. Music and refreshments will be available.

The drill, featuring eight events will be held on Monday, Sept. 3 at 9 a.m. at the West Barclay St. site alongside the railroad station.

"Militia Muster"

Farmers and shopkeepers will don their uniforms and oil their muskets for a reenactment of the "Militia Muster," 1840's style, at Old Bethpage Village Restoration, Sat. and Sun., Sept. 22 and 23, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Visitors to the restoration can witness company drills by the ragtag "common militia" and perfor-

mances of military field music on Sat. On Sun., troops will gather at the parade field near the Kirby house for the annual muster. Nassau Recreation and Parks Commissioner Abram C. Williams said that activities will include casting musket balls, drills with flintlock muskets, a target shoot and company elections. The

day's events will culminate with a "regimental review" at 3 p.m., complete with the village brass band and the museum's volunteer militia unit, the Hempstead Light Guards.

In the mid-nineteenth century, the muster was more holiday than military drill, with men throughout the town excused from work to gather for a day of socializing and good-natured fun. Visitors to Old Bethpage's muster should keep this in mind if the troops are, perhaps, not as military as they might be. After all, they drilled only once a year!

Time For Children's Dental Checkups

With New York State's 3.2 million school children about to begin the new school year, parents should be sure their youngsters' teeth are up to grade. The Dental Society of the State

of New York (DSSNY) recommends that a dental checkup be included on the list of back-to-school essentials.

"Vacation time can play havoc with children's teeth," according to Samuel J. Coppola, D.D.S., president of the DSSNY. "In the hot weather boys and girls eat too many sweets and consume lots of sugared drinks. And with the heightened activity," Dr. Coppola continued, "they often skip regular brushing. In that case, children's teeth need attention now."

In addition to returning to a regular home care routine, a thorough dental examination can uncover problems which may have developed during the summer. Dr. Coppola advises that these problems be detected and treated before they become serious.

To keep children's teeth in shape, the DSSNY offers the following back-to-school tips:

*Eat well-balanced meals. In preparing school lunches, add sugarless snacks such as fresh fruit.

*Keep up a regular oral health care routine at home that includes daily brushing with a fluoride toothpaste and flossing.

*If children participate in teeth-jarring sports, provide them with a suitable mouth-guard. Your family dentist can help you find an appropriate one for your child.

*If a tooth is knocked out, to increase the odds of saving it, rinse it off gently and place back in position. If it cannot be repositioned, put the tooth in water or a wet cloth. In either case, get to the dentist immediately - within 30 minutes if at all possible.

*Protect even the primary teeth: they are the foundation teeth. Primary teeth maintain space for their successors and are basic to good speech and facial development.

"Teeth were meant to last a lifetime. With parents' help and guidance," Dr. Coppola concluded, "children can form good dental habits at an early age."

PSYCHOLOGICAL IMPLICATIONS

Psychologists tell us that there are two important, and related factors, in coping with personal loss. One is the encouragement and facilitation of the normal mourning process. The other is the prevention of delayed and/or distorted grief responses.

Though there is no definitive scientific study which proves this, there is every indication that the funeral service is important in this area. For one thing, the funeral possesses the potential to compel the individual to acknowledge his loss. The ritual of the funeral can also, if it is fitting with the beliefs and attitudes of the family, do a great deal to normalize grief.

This is important for the adult, and especially for the child. The presence of a child at a funeral permits the child to recognize that death has occurred. He sees that there are others who are experiencing the loss. While there, he can receive comfort, support, and expressions of love which he might otherwise miss.

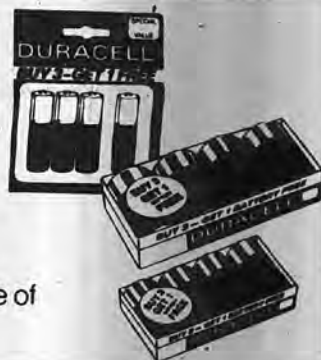

Hicksville Woman In Non-Traditional Role



Greasy hands and long hours working under trucks didn't discourage Jeanne Boccarossa. And climbing poles and ladders outside in any kind of weather was another satisfying challenge.

"Those types of jobs are great," said Boccarossa, an installation technician with the New York Telephone Company. "I've always held jobs that were traditionally held by men. It hasn't created problems because I have the training and experience to perform as well as anybody else."

Boccarossa is among a growing number of women who hold non-traditional jobs at New York Telephone. As a result of New York Telephone's commitment to provide equal employment opportunities, there are now more than 200 women in non-traditional telephone jobs in Nassau and Suffolk counties. There are two other women in her district who also work as installers.

In the early 1970's, auto repair was just becoming a career option for women. Boccarossa pursued it and started her first job as a Sears auto mechanic.

Her repair experience helped her earn a job as a New York Telephone garage mechanic. Boccarossa said that she sought employment with the phone company in 1978 because of its reputation as an equal opportunity

employer. "I wanted to get ahead in business," she said, "and I knew that New York Telephone was committed to giving everyone a fair chance for advancement."

As a mechanic in Woodbury, she and fellow employee Bridget Murphy ran the company garage for nine months. Boccarossa worked in several other Long Island garages until 1982, when she became an installer through the New York Telephone's Upgrade and Transfer Plan. The program was introduced in 1973 to give all employees maxi-


mum opportunity to progress career-wise regardless of sex, race, age or disabilities.

Boccarossa says that women who work as installers are usually confronted by a lot of questions from customers about their roles.

Some students will be going to new schools... meeting new teachers... new friends. Some little ones will be going to school for the very first time.

The health and safety of our young people is important to all of us. With countless school children on the streets, drivers must be extremely careful. Children do not think and act as adults.

Motorists approaching school buses must exercise caution whether they see children or not. Section 1174 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of our State requires motorists whose vehicles meet or overtake a school bus, which is stopped to receive or discharge students, to stop their vehicles while the bus's flashing red signals are in operation. This same section of law mandates that school bus drivers instruct their passengers who cross the street to do so in front of the bus. The driver, meantime, is required to keep the bus stopped and the red lights flashing until all children have reached the other side of the street.

The law now requires that motorists must observe the lower school area speed limits during the entire school day, not just at the beginning and end of each school session.

Finally, watch out for bicyclists — not all of them seem to know the "rules of the road," which they are supposed to observe. Parents, these are important rules for you to teach those of your children who use bicycles.
