The article stated that substantial changes were made in the Teacher Aide duties and responsibilities. This statement is false, the Teacher Aides have the same responsibilities and duties that they have always

In the past 7 years Teacher Aides in the Hicks-ville School District have reinforced, tutored, drilled and taught, Special Education Students. We have worked on a one to one basis, and in groups, under the direct supervision of cer-tified teachers. Teacher Aides have been left alone to supervise these students and have been responsible for all the clerical duties that are necessary to help the stu-dents in the learning

These are the duties that we were responsible for in the past and these are the duties that we are responsible for today Hicksville has always had

an exemplary Special Edu-cation Program, and we, the Teacher Aides, are a very important part of this program.

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
