## Hicksville Teachers Protest Lack Of Contract

The Clan--a concept introduced by Hicksville School District Superintendent Catherine Fenton 2 years ago--stressing unity and harmony of purpose, is no more.

At 7 A.M. on Election Day, the mournful sound of Scottish pipes could be heard in the streets of Hicksville. 375 teachers accompanied by a Police escort marched in funeral procession down Old Country Road to protest the lack of a contract.

At the head of the procession, Scottish pipers and a drummer were followed by teachers acting as pall bearers carrying a casket which

symbolized the demise of the spirit of cooperation which has existed during the last 2 years between the Hicksville Congress of Teachers, Central Administration and the Hicksville School Board.

Signs and banners followed, proclaiming that the teachers who marched in the procession wanted a just and swift settlement to the contract negotiations. The Hicksville teachers have been working without a contract since June 30th and are now at impasse in negotiations with the Hicksville Board of Education.

The settlement of the past two contracts (1978 and 1981) were completed only



after many months of bitter confrontations and job actions.

"The demonstration illustrated that the time for labor peace is long past. Hicks-

ville's goal of quality education can only be achieved when harmony exists within the entire education community," an HCT spokesperson explained.

## Hearing Adjourned On Hicksville White Castle

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Howard T. Hogan, Jr. announced that the Town Board has adjourned a public hearing, set for November 13, on a special use request to build, use and

maintain a White Castle fast food restaurant in Hicksville.

Hogan said that "at the request of the attorneys for the applicants, Rimac Equities Corporation and White

Castle System, Inc., the hearing has been adjourned because of discrepancies with respect to the property description."

The property is located at

the intersection of the east side of Bethpage Road, and the northerly side of Willett Avenue in Hicksville.

No new hearing date has been set at this time.

## Board Denies Special Use Permit For Aluminum Company

The Oyster Bay Town Board has denied a request by Remington Aluminum in Hicksville for a special use permit to store storm doors and windows in trailers according to Town Councilman Thomas L. Clark.

"The applicant was seeking permission to store storm doors and windows on the premises in a maximum of 200 trailers," Clark explained. "The Board

determined that the requested relief would be an overintensive use of property and would create safety and pollution hazards as well as interfere with the flow of traffic on Andrews

Road, which were some of the concerns expressed by residents at a public hearing held on September 11."

The 11,580-acre parcel is located at 100 Andrews Road, Hicksville.

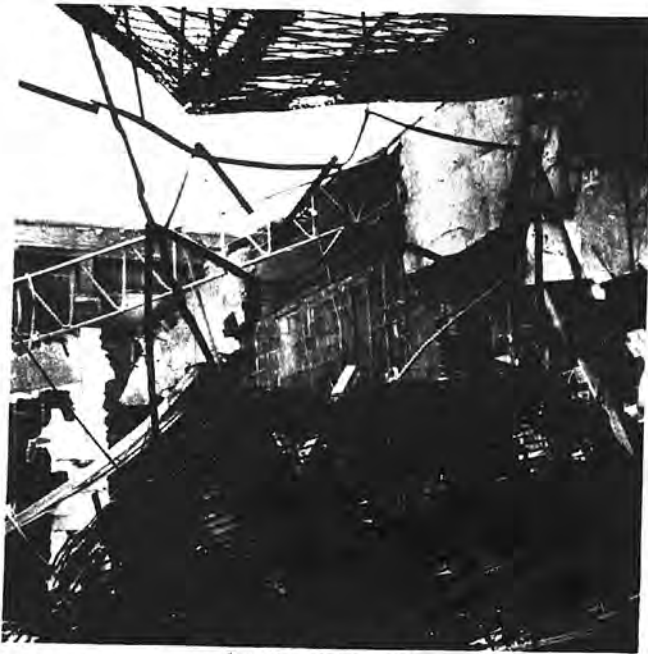

### ROLE OF THE MEDICAL EXAMINER

Many people misunderstand the role of the medical examiner (coroner) and believe it is necessary to call him no matter what the cause or circumstance of death. It seems worthwhile, therefore, to clarify this issue.

The fact is that there are only a few instances in which the presence of the medical examiner is required by law. In most jurisdictions, for instance, the medical examiner must act ONLY in case of accidental death, death from other than natural causes, or the sudden death of a person not recently under a physician's care. The purpose of this is to determine the cause of death in cases where that is not otherwise evident.

The examiner's office responds fairly well and makes their determination on whether a post-mortem examination (autopsy) is necessary. Even if the medical examiner has already been called by someone outside the family, you are still entitled to call the funeral director of your own choosing. The medical examiner will discuss his determination with you and your family.

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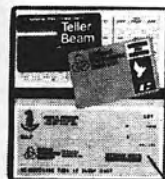
