





An open letter to the community.

At 7:20 on Election Day morning, while driving home from the R.R. station, I witnessed the funereal pro-cession of Hicksville teachers: led by kilted pipers, carrying a coffin and a large plaid-draped sign pro-claiming, "The Clan Is Dead". The "Clan" referred to was a concept of the school tamily introduced by the Superintendent of Schools at the opening of the 1983-84 school year.

. My immediate reaction to the sight of almost every teacher in our community arching in this somber bri gade was one of shock, sadness and frustration; for once again our teaching stall is working without a contract, long past the expiracome but familiar cycle of unrests fowered morale and conflict has been reactivated in our schools.

During the years I served as President of the Lee Avenue PTA, the PTA Council and later as a school board trustee. I was not able to publicly voice my per-sonal views during negotia-tions, but now I feel obliged to speak up, as the parent of a 9th grader and as an inde-

pendent resident who cares deeply about our educa-tional community.

The quality of education in any school district is only as good as its teaching staff. In Hicksville we have hired consultants and administrators, introduced new programs, updated curriculum, increased diploma requirements and have talked at countless meetings about "quality education"; but all of these efforts are under-, mined when our teachers are not dealt with fairly in nego-tiations. 1 am not talking about contract demands o negotiable items. I am talking about the "policy" of this district to drag out negotiations with its bargaining units long past contract expiration (from custodians to the council of administrators), until the units become demoralized and hostile and perceive that the school board and central administration care nothing for their cliorts.

In the particular situation of the teaching staff, the board has the added advantage of the Taylor Law; but that same Taylor Law that penalizes teachers' salaries if they strike, also behooves a school district to enter into
