October 3rd found Hicksville assisting Westbury at a 4 AM

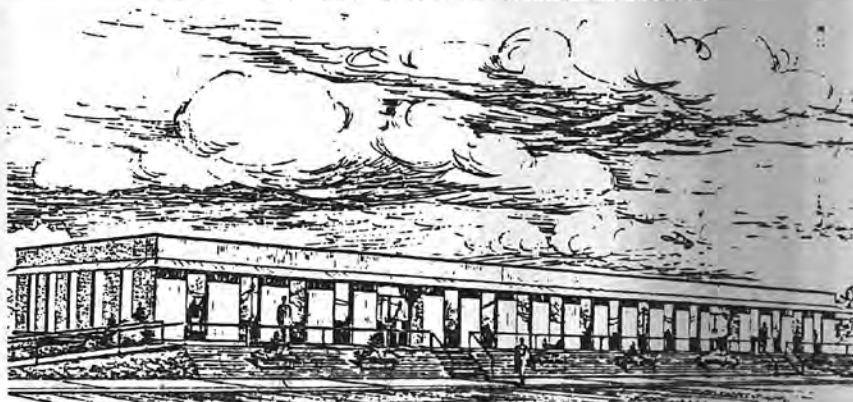

One Story Building Proposed For Down Town Hicksville

A proposal for a one-story building with underground and on site parking has been scheduled for a hearing by the Town of Oyster Bay Zoning Board of Appeals on November 29, (Thursday), starting at 7 p.m. in the Town Board Hearing Room.

This proposal has the full endorsement of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, which is sensitive to residents' and business people's concerns in the development of this area on the west side of Broadway, Hicksville.

"After thirteen years of neglected development, this will be a great improvement in downtown Hicksville. We must all become part of a community endorsement of this project," a Chamber spokesperson urged. He suggested that a letter similar to this sample be sent by residents of Hicksville in an all out effort to transform this area from its present condition to one that will not only improve the area but will also encourage further such improvements, thereby contributing both to Hicksville's appearance and its tax base:

With reference to the application of Ivan E. Czipott for the construction of an office building on the northwesterly corner of the intersection of Broadway and West Marie Street in Hicksville, New York, I would like to go on record as being highly in favor of such a building as proposed.

All previous objections on building heretofore have been eliminated in this proposal, and this building represents a positive approach in design, type and height.

I am a resident of Hicksville and would urge the approval of the Town Board for such a building permit, as being a constructive move toward the rehabilitation and renewal of this area.

About the Speaker...

William J. Catacosinos was elected Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of LILCO by the Company's

Board of Directors on January 30, 1984. Catacosinos, 53, has been a member of LILCO's Board since February 1978.

From August 1969 to November 1983, Catacosinos was Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Applied Digital Data systems, Inc. of Hauppauge, Long Island, a company he founded. In 1980, the NCR Corporation of Dayton, Ohio bought this manufacturing company of terminals and computers for \$60.5 million.

Dr. Catacosinos was a founder of Corometrics.

Medical Systems, Inc., a Connecticut-based electronics firm which pioneered the manufacture of fetal heart monitoring equipment. In 1974, American Home Products acquired the company for \$20 million.

At Brookhaven National Laboratory, Dr. Catacosinos worked consecutively as administrative officer, business manager and Assistant Director of Business Administration from 1956 to 1969.

Dr. Catacosinos has been a management consultant to the Atomic Energy Com-

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Mail Early Season Opens

The Postal Service is cooperating with the business community of Hicksville in urging customers to shop early and mail early for the holidays.

Postmaster Anthony M. Murello asks holiday shoppers to mail early this year and to make certain that mail is addressed correctly (including ZIP Codes) and packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parcels reach their destinations in plenty of time for the holidays.

"Normally, we handle about 3.2 million pieces of mail a day—including cards, letters and packages, but during the holiday season, volume goes up to about 5 million pieces," the Postmaster says. "We in the Postal Service take pride in carrying your messages of love and joy. Mailing early helps us deliver the messages on time."

The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly. Postmaster Murello says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas mailing dates—including those for the armed forces stationed overseas—occur this month. Mailers can get specific information on the international dates by calling us here at 933-2474," Murello said.

"Customers should also take care to write legible ZIP Coded addresses for both the address and the return address. And remember that the use of ZIP Codes following the name of the particular city and state will aid us in processing the mail."

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season."

Real Estate Still Booming Spiegel Reports Long Island

Three months of fast paced deal making has produced lease agreements covering a total of 178,000 square feet for Long Island's leading property owner. The Spiegel Associates Leasing Summary for the third quarter, 1984, covering Nassau County properties in Hicksville, Jericho, Roslyn, Syosset, Westbury, Massapequa, Mineola and Garden City reported a substantial increase in activity from the previous quarters.

Spiegel Associates reported that the quarter produced leases with an aggregate rental of more than \$5.5 million, exclusive of cost of living and other miscellaneous escalations. The company reported that rents during the three month period ranged, on a per square foot basis, from \$4.00 to \$6.25, net, for industrial space, \$11.25 to \$17.00 for retail space and \$7.50 to \$18.00 for office space. Average rents for all commercial properties were up approximately five percent from those of the first half of the year.

Arthur D. Sanders, President of Spiegel, stated that the company's excellent quarter was further evidence of the current boom Long Island is experiencing, and that the number of companies looking to move from New York City to the more affordable central Long Island market appeared to be increasing. In addition, Sanders claimed that Spiegel Associates' ability to renovate a large inventory of existing properties provided the company with a competitive edge over newer entrants into the market

who are experiencing high financing and construction costs.

Letter To The Editor

An open letter to the community.

At 7:20 on Election Day morning, while driving home from the R.R. station, I witnessed the funeral procession of Hicksville teachers: led by kilted pipers, carrying a coffin and a large plaid-draped sign proclaiming, "The Clan Is Dead." The "Clan" referred to was a concept of the school family introduced by the Superintendent of Schools at the opening of the 1983-84 school year.

My immediate reaction to the sight of almost every teacher in our community marching in this somber brigade was one of shock, sadness and frustration: for once again our teaching staff is working without a contract, long past the expiration date and the unwelcome, but familiar cycle of unrest, lowered morale and conflict has been re-activated in our schools.

During the years I served as President of the Lee Avenue PTA, the PTA Council and later as a school board trustee, I was not able to publicly voice my personal views during negotiations, but now I feel obliged to speak up, as the parent of a 9th grader and as an inde-

pendent resident who cares deeply about our educational community.

The quality of education in any school district is only as good as its teaching staff. In Hicksville we have hired consultants and administrators, introduced new programs, updated curriculum, increased diploma requirements and have talked at countless meetings about "quality education"; but all of these efforts are undermined when our teachers are not dealt with fairly in negotiations. I am not talking about contract demands or negotiable items. I am talking about the "policy" of this district to drag out negotiations with its bargaining units long past contract expiration from custodians to the council of administrators, until the units become demoralized and hostile and perceive that the school board and central administration care nothing for their efforts.

In the particular situation of the teaching staff, the board has the added advantage of the Taylor Law; but that same Taylor Law that penalizes teachers' salaries if they strike, also behooves a school district to enter into

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regular meeting on Nov. 13. The Town Board at this meeting adjourned a hearing on the petition of Ric-Mac Equities Corp. and White Castle System, Inc. for a special use permit to erect a White Castle Fast Food Restaurant at Hicksville at the intersection of Bethpage Rd. and Willett Ave. The petition was withdrawn because of the uncertainties of the property lines. The concerned parties must now begin again before any action can be taken.

A finance hearing was held to consider proposed increase and improvement of facilities of the Plainview-Old Bethpage Park District at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,750,000.00 for the construction of swimming

pools. No one came to the hearing to speak for or against this issue. Resolution No. 1082A-1984 gave authorization for the issuance of serial bonds and capital notes to pay the cost of the increase and improvement of the swimming pools.

Resolution No. 1047-1984 related to the reapportionment of Daniel Casey and Augustus McDonough as members of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Resolution No. 1051-1984 related to amending resolution No. 780-1984 in connection with the petition of Delco Development Co., of Hicksville for a special use permit. Originally the two warehouses behind the property were to remain

vacant. The plan has been changed so that one warehouse will remain vacant while the other may be used for storage. Some of the parking at the site will also be removed so that the developer can add curbs and landscaping in order to buffer the surrounding properties.

Resolution No. 1052-1984 accepted the Town Environmental Quality Review Commissions findings on a petition of Green Hill Holding Co. and Melvin Decker for a change of zone in Woodbury. The change would be from a B-1 to E-2 zone for the building of apartments on the South side of Jericho Turnpike. No hearing date was set.

Resolution No. 1053-1984 accepted the Town Environmental Quality Review Commissions findings on the petition of Saverio P. and Ralph J. Potente for a change of zone from a Business G to Industrial H at a site in Hicksville in the vicinity of Marie St. and Jerusalem Ave. in order to erect four one-story buildings of 6,452 sq. ft. at the site.

Resolution No. 1056-1984 related to amending resolution No. 909-84, in connection with the reallocation of engineering fees on contract #DR72-4275B, for

the construction of a storm water recharge basin at Winding Rd., Old Bethpage.

Resolution No. 1057-1094 related to the consultant performing preliminary design under contract #DPW84-352-Phase II-for further testing of the ground water quality requested by New York State.

Resolution No. 1060-1984 directed the town clerk to advertise notice of a hearing on the petition of Wulffken Assoc. for a change of zone from Res. D to Bus. F at Sunnyside Blvd. and Summit St. in Plainview. The petitioners would like to erect a two-story retail office complex.

Resolution No. 1062-1984 granted the request for a waiver of building code requirements on property at Park Ave., Hicksville. The petitioner was granted permission to place a dormer on a wood frame structure after complying with all the fire safety codes.

Resolution No. 1063-1984 accepted the Town Environmental Quality Review Commissions findings on a petition of Hess (Continued on Page 13)

collective bargaining in good faith, not as an adversary, and to come to a fair contract agreement with its employees within the contractual time frame.

We are not dealing here with a material, impersonal product, produced in a factory. We are dealing with our children's educations and with their teachers. As parents of students we have witnessed too many job actions, picket lines and demoralized staff members in the past seven years. Our children and our teachers deserve better.

Perhaps the Clan may yet come to life at the bargaining table, for members of a clan may differ and fight among themselves, but in the end they compromise and put aside their differences so that the clan may survive and prosper.

Oyster Bay Sanitation Collection Modified For Thanksgiving

The Town of Oyster Bay sanitation collection schedule will be modified in observance of the Thursday, November 22nd, Thanksgiving holiday, according to Town Councilman Salvatore R. Mosca.

"Residents who normally have collection on Thursday

will receive a special pickup on Friday, November 23rd," Mosca stated. "Friday collections will be made on Saturday, November 24th."

Mosca noted that all Town offices will be closed on Thanksgiving, but all park facilities, except skating rinks, will be open.

What Photo Judges Look For

With six prizes worth \$3,000 at stake in the First Annual "Happy Holidays Photo Contest" at La Belle Camera and Stereo in Syosset, Long Island shutterbugs will want to know what the panel of judges will look for when they evaluate the hundreds of photos that will be submitted.

"In news photography, technical merit is always less important than the inherent news value of the shot," says Harvey V. Fondiller, former movie/film editor of Popular Photography, and editor of The Encyclopedia of Photography.

"But in this contest, which focuses on a theme that lends itself to 'artistic treatment', technical quality will play an important role."

Mr. Fondiller is one of the judges in La Belle's photo contest in which photographers in three separate age categories will compete against their peers. Photos must illustrate the theme of "happy holidays on Long Island."

"The entry begins even before the photographer picks up the camera," says John Maguire, president of Matar Studio in Manhattan, and a professional photographer for more than twenty-five years.

"The photographer has to decide whether to shoot people, a place, a nature scene, or a combination. Usually, the people-oriented shots are the most compelling and interesting."

Hessio Bellem, president of Ad Methods Advertising, St. James, NY, believes the successful photographers will be "those who let their cameras become an unobtrusive part of the scene, rather than a self-conscious intruder."

"Still, posed shots are usually disastrous," he says. "You're never really happy with the results--and neither are your subjects."

Another judge, Tony De Martina, president of ADM Video Productions, Jericho, NY, says that some photographers mistakenly think they'll need a very expensive camera to take a good picture.

"Some of the all-time greatest shots have been grabbed with the simplest, most unsophisticated cameras. It just takes being in the right place at the right time...and having the imagination and initiative to know it!"

Joe Cohen, owner/manager of La Belle, and the fifth judge of the five-member panel, said the contest is designed to offer everyone, regardless of age or experience, a chance to win one of the six prizes.

He said entry blanks are available at La Belle at 224 West Jericho Turnpike (east of Routes 106/107), in Syosset.

Deadline for entries is January 13. Winners, who will be selected by a voting system involving both the judges and the general public, will be announced on February 14.

NEEDED: A GOOD WORD!

On November 18, 1861, the Lord began to speak a beautiful word of hope to a fractured American society as a woman by the name of Julia Ward Howe slept fitfully while troops marched in the streets below. As she lay waiting for the dawn, the lines of a beautiful poem began to fashion themselves in her thoughts. The memory of some of the greatest lines in the Old Testament came to her mind, mingled with the faces of soldiers seated around campfires and battle trumpets recently heard. The cost of the Civil War had not been counted; the horror of the war had not been foreseen. And now the pleasurable fervor had given way to determination and the solemn acceptance of sacrifice.

She got out of bed and began to write, "Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord"...and minutes later a beautiful gospel message flowed from the pen. "In the beauty of the lilies, Christ was born across the sea, With a glory in his bosom that transfigures you and me; as he died to make men holy, let us live to make men free, While God goes marching on."

It was over a year before her poem was discovered and set to a familiar tune that the soldiers knew. Very quickly it was being sung in many Army regiments. On one occasion a Chaplain McCabe sang it at a mass meeting in Washington. The audience joined in on the chorus, "Glory! glory, hallelujah! Glory! glory, hallelujah! Glory! glory, hallelujah! Our God is marching on." The effect was magical as people wept and sang together...and above the applause was heard the voice of Abraham Lincoln, exclaiming, "While the tears unashamedly rolled down his cheeks, 'Sing it again.'"

Julia Ward Howe was a beautiful Christian lady who permitted God to use her to present his gospel of hope to her troubled world.

Today God has a good word for our nation's problems. Permit him to speak it through you.

Our Museum Evaluated

The Hicksville Gregory Museum, a member of the American Museum Association, was evaluated this past week through the Association's prestigious Museum Assessment Program. Dr. Robert West, Director of the Carnegie Museum of Natural History in Pittsburgh undertook a day-long tour of the Gregory Museum as part of his study and analysis of the Hicksville earth science institution's quality as a collection and its effectiveness as a museum.

The Museum Assessment Program is undertaken

voluntarily by an institution desirous of improving its organization, funding, exhibition techniques and its in-museum and outreach services to the public. Dr. West will present a constructive critique of the Gregory Museum in the near future. His services as a professional paleontologist and Director of a nationally known museum with a staff of over forty persons were defrayed by a grant from the Museum Assessment Program.

On hand for the Museum's inspection and for day-long conferences were: the

Gregory Board of Trustees President, Douglas Uzakevicz; Executive Director Harry Chandler, Asst. Director-Historian Richard Evers, and Curator Thomas Daunt. In addition to an opportunity to meet the Museum's staff, Dr. West was able to witness two school groups being given guided tours of the museum and slide lecture instruction,

by curator Daunt and long-time museum volunteer, Elizabeth Pearce.

Among the aspects of the Museum being observed and evaluated by the Museum Assessment Program representative were: the museum's scope and purpose; its formal governing structure; the size and nature of the paid staff and volunteers; the museum financial base and its funding methods; the size, facilities and condition, of the

building and grounds; the significance of the collections, and the acquisition, cataloging and storage policies; the conservation and care of the museum's collections; the nature of the museum exhibits and of display space; the relevance of the Gregory's in-house and outreach programs and the type of audiences served; the size of the museum's membership and the degree of community support.

Dr. West appeared impressed by the wide-range of efforts the Gregory Museum undertakes to provide to Long Island and by the strong support of the Hicksville community. The limited building space and the extremely modest paid staff of the museum were not lost on the Carnegie Museum assessor. In the museum's favor, it seemed, was the trustees' and staff's

realistic awareness of the museum's problems and long-range needs.

All information provided by the museum and the recommendations made by the surveyor are confidential. The final report is released only to the authorized official of the museum.

geness and wild aspect of the scenery is beautiful and impressive, and the mind can scarcely comprehend the fact that such utter stillness and seclusion and such an exhibition of nature, in more than its primeval rudeness, should occur within three hours' ride of the great metropolis. Almost as far as the vision reaches, the eye rests only upon a sea of waving bushes... This rude wilderness extends from Farmingdale to Riverhead, a distance of almost 43 miles... When the Long Island railroad was constructed, about twenty years ago, it penetrated an unbroken wilderness in which appeared no dwelling, no culture and no evidences of civilization except an occasional path which traversed the island from north to south, connecting the two opposite shores."

Today's photography captures this mysterious solitude in its modern, endangered state, a film worthy of our interest and concern. The showtime is 2:30, Sunday, Nov. 18th, at the Hicksville Gregory Museum, Heitz Place. Hicksville residents admitted free.

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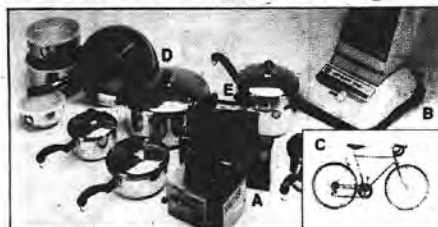
