Public Places Must Be Safe Places

It used to be that the day after Thanksgiving murked the onslaught of holiday advertising and gaily deco-rated stores. Then busi-nesses began gearing up before Thanksgiving by putting their best goods for-ward. Now, even before November 1st, we see visual signs that prod us to begin thinking of the coming

The lestive spirit also encourages us to take advantage of holiday concerts and shows and to dine

out more frequently.
The Town of Oyster Bay's Department of Planning and Development is very aware that at this time of

year all places of public assembly - restaurants, stores, theatres, etc., are used more heavily than any other time. That makes any tragedy that might possibly occur at such a place that much more devastating.

For that reason the inspectors working for Planning and Development have begun a series of spe-cial night-time visits to insure that all necessary safety rules and regulations being complied with They are checking for faulty

lighting, exit doors blocked or not conspicuously marked, occupancy in excess of the posted maxi-mum number and any other violations which might lead to a potentially dangerous situation.

Prior to the spot checks being conducted by the inspectors, letters were sent to owners and operators of facilities in the Town who hold public assembly licenses to alert them of the apcoming inspections. The letters contained information as to the general time frame of the inspections and excerpts of the local law to

indicate what the inspectors will be looking for during their visit.

Because of the advance notice given it is obvious that we don't want to harass business owners. But, we do want to make them aware of the safety rules and regulations in an effort to avoid potential tragedy.

In the Town of Oyster Bay we'll do our best to keep stores, restaurants and other places of public assembly aware that an "ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!" We hope that you. as individuals. remember this too.

Parola Objects To Higher Phone Rates

In a letter to New York State Public Service Com-mission Chairman Paul Giola, Assemblyman Fred-erick E. Parola (R-C, Wantagh) today charged the New York Telephone Company with unconscionable profit gouging following the company's proposal of a \$775 million rate hike.

Parola accused the company of using deregulation

as an excuse to charge local consumers higher rates.

Referring to the phone company's claim that it had to increase local rates because it no longer received a subsidy from profits made on long distance services, the assemblyman said, "I was under the impression that this past year's \$342.9 milion rate increase was

made to solve that problem. Now. New York Telephone seems to be suggesting that the problem is permanent and that their rates will keep on going up and up.

"The latest request adds insult to injury to low and middle income residents who possibly face a \$75 charge for a residential phone hook-up next year, and when each month's tele-

phone bill brings a 'wire investment charge' equal to the cost of that wire on the open market," he continued.

The state Public Service Commission must not approve any part of this rate increase. Adding to the oppressive utility burden Nas-sau County residents already pay cannot be toler-ated," Parola concluded.

School Board Votes On Teacher Negotiations

The Hicksville Board of Education tackled one of the heltiest agendas in recent months at the November 28 meeting. Heading the action section was the Fact-Finders' Report regarding the current negotiations with the HCI. The Board voted unanimously to accept the report.

The Board went on to accept as a policy exhibit the evaluation instrument for the Superintendent, and they adopted revised policies on field trips and diploma requirements.

adopted revised policies on field trips and diploma requirements.

Financial matters dominated much of the rest of the agenda as the Board voted to change the district's Pupil Accident Insurance Coverage and place it with J.J. Newman and Company. This will represent a substantial savings for the district, eliminating a \$250.00 per accident deductible while receiving 100% coverage for accident claims. Authorization was also granted for a contract with consultants to prepare specifications and to advise on the placement of insurance programs in the areas of general liability coverage and fringe benefits. The estimated cost of this Insurance Program Review is \$6,000.00. The Board then authorized the establishment of a reserve fund for insurance deductibles in the amount of \$12,500.00 for 1985-86 to be replenished in succeeding years for losses paid from the fund.

In further actions, the Board received the First Quarterly

In further actions, the Board received the First Quarterly Financial Report for the current school year and accepted the report of budget transfers made from July 1 through September 30 in the amount of \$106,882.13. A change order modifying materials for roofing materials was also approved.

approved.

Bids were awarded for audiovisual supplies in the amount of \$8,099.22, photocopy equipment (\$2,950.00), physical education equipment (\$14,223.02), and industrial arts and woodworking supplies (\$5,287.95). The total bid award was \$30,560.19. Claims and warrants in the amount of \$15,567,314.33 were also approved.
