## Deli Fire -- \$50,000 Loss

Hicksville Firefighters closed out 1984 with a store fire which caused \$50,000 damage to store and contents injuring two firefighters.

The fire was reported via alarm box by a passerby at 2:49 AM on Dec. 31st. At Antonios Deli at 113 Broadway Hicksville located in the center of the block of stores. Vamps fearing the heavily involved fire would spread to other stores sounded a second alarm for additional manpower and equipment. Mutual Aid Assistance was requested from the Jericho, Bethpage and Levittown Fire Dept. - the Plainview F.D. stood by at fire hdq.

120 men responded under Chief Owen Magee. Chief Magee said an aggressive attack by firefighters and the fact the building was one of excellent construction unlike some of the newer stores enabled firefighters to confine the fire to the deli.

Stores on either side suffered very minor damage. The fire is believed to have started in the rear of the store. The cause is being investigated by fire officials.

Injuries to two firefighters were of a minor nature. Both members have returned to duty.

# Some Plans For Tax Reforms are All Conceived

In 1983 building permits for single family home construction numbered 253 and in construction value topped the \$18,000,000 mark.

In terms of dollars lost to the County, it would mean an estimated \$585.9 million in currently allowable deductions for 1985-6; in effect, penalizing taxpayers for supporting the necessary services of government.

On your behalf, I have written to the United States Senators and Congressmen who represent the residents of Oyster Bay to object to this proposal which is ill-conceived and potentially harmful. I am urging them to defeat a measure which would be financially debilitating for us and for all single family neighborhoods throughout Long Island.

What will 1985 be? That depends a great deal on whether the United States Treasury Department has its way.

As single family homeowners, you and I would see property values lowered by perhaps 10%. More expensive homes would have greater value depreciation.

**Parola's Legislative Priorities**

Assemblyman Frederick E. Parola (R-C, Wantagh) released his legislative priorities for the 1985 legislative session.

**TAX CUTS** -- My number one objective is my continued fight to gain meaningful relief for New York's overburdened taxpayers. The projected \$700 million revenue surplus must be returned to the taxpayers who built it by paying one of the highest personal income tax rates in the nation!

**LILCO/SHOREHAM** -- I will be working to insure that LILCO, not Long Island ratepayers, bears the fiscal responsibility for the vastly over-budgeted Shoreham nuclear plant.

**CRIME** -- Battling to bring about a constitutionally acceptable death penalty will be a major focus of my efforts, as will tougher penalties for career and violent criminals.

## GO FOR IT IN THE NEW YEAR

On New Year's Eve it is both customary and a good practice for all to consider one or more New Year's resolutions. We take stock of ourselves with a critical eye for our flaws in order to resolve to make our lives in the new year more pleasing to God. New Year's resolutions, when taken seriously, are not all that pleasant to make, for they involve an effort on our part to change some behavior of ours that we might not particularly like yet have grown accustomed.

Colossians 3:12-17 could be labeled, "The Christian's Guide to Effective New Year's Resolutions." First, Saint Paul reminds us who we are. We are God's chosen ones, holy, and beloved. In our Baptism we joined the Christian community and were embraced by God in his love. Through our Lord's birth, death, and resurrection, we are cleansed from sin and declared holy. Sure we continue to sin daily, but at the same time we are daily forgiven by God through Christ. We are encouraged, instructed, and even commanded to put on the virtues of compassion, lowliness, meekness, patience, and forbearance. "For the New Year I resolve, with the help of God, to be more sensitive to the feelings and needs of my family. I will be patient and forgive their behavior as God so graciously forgives me each and every day." Not a bad resolution for any of us. Our family life would certainly be better for it.

Now we have the possibility of making a New Year's resolution to make it not only a happy New Year for someone else, but a happy New Year for ourselves. Let the peace born at Bethlehem not be packed away with your Christmas decorations this year but let it rule in your hearts. "In the New Year I resolve, in recognition of God's blessings, to dwell on all I have rather than what I lack.

And now we have come to some other great possibilities for resolutions. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly,

teach and admonish one another in all wisdom. Praise God today, all of you, by resolving to attend a bible study this year. The Holy Spirit will provide direction, leadership, and motivation. "Resolved in the New Year, I will attend at least one bible study class."

"Sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs with thankfulness in your hearts to God." For God's sake, let's all commit ourselves to weekly worship. Yes, for the sake of God, for he loves our gathering for worship each week. He looks forward to hearing your voice along with others. If you only are willing to make two resolutions for the new year let one be, "I will worship God every Sunday unless I am too sick to get out of bed."

And if you are a person who is not into making New Year's resolutions, or is only willing to make one, be guided by the last words of our text. "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him." Here is the best resolution you can make...the really big one...are you ready? "In the New Year I resolve, with God's help, to bring every area of my life under Christ's control." Whatever I do, I will discuss it with the Lord in prayer and seek his aid that what I do would be consistent with what my Lord would do in the same circumstance...and give glory to His name.

It may sound presumptuous but it is certainly biblical. "In the New Year I resolve to be more like Jesus." That's the one to go for. That is the one that would put the broadest smile on God the Father's face.
