Nevada St. Widening Update

Residents of Nevada St. in Hicksville are concerned, and rightly so, on the proposed widening of Nevada St. by the State Dept. of Transportation. If done, this would take 8 ft. from the front property of several homes and 5 ft. from several other homes. This is one of many, many projects which the State wishes to do in their attempts to alleviate the traffic flow on Broadway.

The traffic at certain times of the day (commuting hours) is already gridlock. There are feasible, alternate suggestions which must be considered before the State DOT, which has already wrecked downtown Hicksville when they widened Broadway 14 years ago, proceeds with this project.

To condemn so much of the front of these homes which are located on a residential street, will adversely affect their value and render them practically unsalable. This is unacceptable.

Both Senator Marino and Assemblyman Parola, who represent this area in the State Legislature, have received a great deal of mail opposing this proposal and, within the next two weeks they propose to set up an informational meeting to consider this problem.

Many other alterations are being considered by the State DOT to help alleviate a very real traffic problem on Broadway and many of their proposals are feasible. They will help to solve the present traffic problems in this area. However, elected officials are to be complimented for their prompt response to the plight of the affected residential areas on Nevada Street.

AS WE GO TO PRESS: State Assemblyman Fred Parola held a local forum on Wed. evening in the community room of the Hicksville Library.

In regard to the proposed widening of parts of Nevada St.,

(which is a residential Town of Oyster Bay street) he answered one question as follows:

Question: I understand that this proposal has gone through and will be done by Dec. 1985. Is this true?

Answer: No! It hasn't gone through yet. No contract has been given ... no bids have been entered.

Assemblyman Parola told those present that he and State Sen. Ralph Marino are planning to hold a meeting with Mr. Ted Hoffmann of the NY State Dept. of Transportation Regional office within the next day or two because they have both received much mail on this subject.

Mr. Parola explained that the State is planning to redesign the lighting system on Broadway (Route 107) to see if this could help to alleviate the traffic problem.

Local residents reported to Assemblyman Parola that they have noted that much of the Nevada St. traffic problem is caused by the fact that many motorists use this shopping center as a short cut and are actually not shopping at all, only adding to the congestion. They felt that if these two short streets from Nevada St. to the Plaza were either shut off completely, or both made into entrances (not one as an entrance and one as exit as they are at present), the traffic problem in this immediate area would be somewhat alleviated and that in no way would this affect shopping at the Plaza.

This part of Mr. Parola's forum was completed when he stated that he would set an informational meeting for sometime within the next two weeks or so, in order to go into the matter in greater detail.

Both residents and officers of the local civic association in this area thanked Mr. Parola for his help in this matter.

Senator Ralph H. Marino (R-C, Syosset), chairman of the Senate Committee on Banks, announced that a toll-free "hotline" has been established by the State Banking Department to answer consumer questions and complaints regarding banks.

"Bank customers can now

speaking directly with state bank examiners about any comment, question or complaint they have concerning banking practices," Marino said. "The new, toll-free number is 1-800-522-3330 and the hotline will be in service every weekday from 9 a.m. through 5 p.m."

"This new service will give consumers direct access to knowledgeable banking department staff to help them resolve banking problems they may not have been able to resolve in dealings with their local banks," Marino concluded. "As the new chairman of the Banking Committee, I am pleased to see the Banking Department move beyond its more

traditional role as a regulator of banking practice into the broader area of customer assistance, a trend I will encourage the Department to build upon in the future."

Calls made to the bank customer hotline number

must originate within New York State. In New York City, however, residents in the 212 and 718 area codes cannot use the 800 number but instead should call (212) 488-2336 in order to utilize the new service.

On the South and East: Old Country Road from its intersection with the Long Island Railroad, Westerly to Newbridge Road, then Southwest along Newbridge Road to Elmira Street, then West along Elmira Street to Blueberry Lane, then North along Blueberry Lane to Beech Lane, then West along Beech Lane to Levittown Parkway, then North along Levittown Parkway to Arrow Lane, then West along Arrow Lane, and as projected to the District's West line.

Election District No. 4 Lee Avenue School

The news of a terminal diagnosis induces all kinds of reactions in the patient and the people who are close to the patient. Frequently patient and family alike, if informed of the prognosis, will start to anticipate the impending loss. This is called preparatory or anticipatory grief.

and work through some of the emotional turmoil a little sooner. When, and if, it occurs, anticipatory grief should be accorded the same respect as postdeath grief. Caring friends and family should try, within the limits of their own grief process, to help the individual cope with these feelings.

The feelings and behaviors may be much the same as might be expected to follow the death of a loved one. It is, quite literally, grieving before the death. In rare cases, the grief process is completed by the survivors before the patient actually dies. More often, it merely affords the opportunity to begin to grieve
