

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

#### TWO GENERATIONS OF SERVICE **GRIEVING BEFORE DEATH**

VERN & BILL WAGNER

The news of a terminal diag-nosis induces all kinds of reac-tions in the patient and the peo-ple who are close to the patient. Frequently patient and family alike, if informed of the progno-sis, will start to anticipate the impending loss. This is called proparatory or anticipatory grier.

The feelings and behaviors may be much the same as might be expected to follow the death of a loved one. It is, quite liter-ally, grieving before the death. In rare cases, the grief process is completed by the survivors before the patient actually dies. More@ften, it merely affords the opportunity to begin to grieve


