

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

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

# **Postal Service Offers Help For Hearing Impaired**

"Hearing impaired peo-ple, who are more than ordinarily dependent upon their mail, are getting new help from the postal Ser-vice," says Hicksville Manager/Postmaster Roger Nienaber.

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A telecommunications device to help deaf custo-mers who want to call in with inquiries or complaints about their mail service has een installed at Postal Service Headquarters Consumer Advocate's Office in Washington D.C.," said Nienaber

The Postmaster said that any deaf person who has access to a "TDD", a telecommunications device for the deaf, may call 202-245 3858 to communicate by means of a TDD in Postal Service Headquarters. The Postal Service device was put in as the result of a request made last year by a deaf postal employee. Garden City, N.Y. Letter

Carrier John Passarella wrote to the Postmaster General asking that the TDD be installed. Passarella, who uses a TDD him-self, has had a hearing impairment all his life.

The National Association of the Deaf estimates that about eight million Americans have difficulty using a telephone. More than 75,000 of them have TDDs.

A TDD enables its operator to type out messages on a

keyboard and transmit then by electronic signals over the telephone lines to a receiver which prints out the origina message. The receivin TDD can then be used to transmit a response.

"I'm pleased that we ar able to provide this servic to hearing impaired cit zens," Postmaster Nienabe said. It's good that we hav this way to reach out to people who have difficult using the telephone."


