## Residents Unite In Opposition

# White Castle Day/Night Hearing Set For Tuesday, March 26th

On March 12, residents living within 300 feet of the proposed White Castle fast-food emporium at Willet Ave. and Bethpage Rd., received registered letters informing them of the day and night hearings on this petition set for the Town Hall on Audrey Ave. in Oyster Bay on Tuesday, March 26th. The day hearing will start at 10 a.m. and is primarily held to give those who cannot attend the night hearing an opportunity to testify. The night hearing will start at 8 p.m. at the same location and at that time the major presentation

of the Riemac Corp. and White Castle System, Inc. will be given for that corporation by their attorneys, Marino, Bernstein and LaMarca.

At both hearings those who wish to may testify. The newly-reactivated Midland Civic Association and numerous ad-hoc committees are working feverishly and with great enthusiasm to oppose the issuance of the requested variance. Over 300 voters have joined the Midland Civic and their membership grows daily. Over 1300 signatures opposing this venture at this loca-

tion have been collected so far.

For the convenience of people who cannot or do not choose to drive in the evening, two buses will transport citizens, free-of-charge on a first-come, first-served basis. The buses will arrive at the Willet Ave. School about 7 p.m. and leave about ten or fifteen minutes thereafter. For reservations call Gloria Mange at 822-6594, Gert Paul at 941-1740 or Ellie Draycott at 935-5793.

"Zero hour is approaching. We need everyone of

you at Town Hall on Tuesday, March 26th. Voice your objection to a fast-food establishment abutting people's homes, where bedrooms are only 40 ft. away and dumpsters will be backed up to their backyard fences," these active civic leaders urged.

"We are not obstructionists! We welcome orderly development of property that would serve the needs of this community. A White Castle, fast-food restaurant, or any other fast-food operation is simply the wrong business at this particular site," they concluded.

## Set Apr. 16 Hearing On Hicksville Zone Change Request

Oyster Bay Town Councilman John Venditto announced that the Town Board has scheduled an April 16 public hearing on a request for a zone change in Hicksville at an old gasoline station.

Venditto said, "The appli-

cant, Texaco, Inc., is requesting a change of zone from 'G-1' business district (central business) to 'G' Business district (general business) to renovate and modernize the existing gasoline service station, which will include the demolition of the existing gasoline service sta-

tion, which will include the demolition of the existing building and pump islands, and the construction of new pump islands, a canopy, a food mart and, on the northerly portion of the premises, a car wash."

The property is located at

the northeast corner of Old Country Road and Newbridge Road, in Hicksville.



**A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,555,000 SERIAL BONDS AND \$135,000 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF NEW REFRIGERATION SYSTEMS AND RELATED IMPROVEMENTS AT THE EXISTING ICE SKATING RINK COMPLEXES OF THE MASSAPEQUA PARK DISTRICT, BETHPAGE PARK DISTRICT AND SYOSSET PARK DISTRICT IN AND FOR SAID TOWN.**

WHEREAS, the Massapequa Park District, Bethpage Park District and Syosset Park District of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, each presently own and maintain ice skating rink complexes;

WHEREAS, said Districts and said Town have entered into a Mutual Cooperation Agreement pursuant to Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law dated February 5, 1985, which Agreement, among other things, provides for

said Town to purchase and install new refrigeration systems and related improvements at such ice skating rink complexes; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed pursuant to this resolution is the purchase and installation of new refrigeration systems and related improvements at the existing ice skating rink complexes of the Massapequa Park District, Bethpage Park District and Syosset Park Districts in and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$2,700,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

a) By the issuance of \$2,555,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and  
b) By the issuance of \$135,000 capital notes of said Town hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers, in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner,

as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the princi-

## Postal Service Offers Help For Hearing Impaired

"Hearing impaired people, who are more than ordinarily dependent upon their mail, are getting new help from the postal Service," says Hicksville Manager/Postmaster Roger Nienaber.

"A telecommunications device to help deaf customers who want to call in with inquiries or complaints about their mail service has been installed at Postal Service Headquarters Con-

sumer Advocate's Office in Washington D.C.," said Nienaber.

The Postmaster said that any deaf person who has access to a "TDD", a telecommunications device for the deaf, may call 202-245-3858 to communicate by means of a TDD in Postal Service Headquarters. The Postal Service device was put in as the result of a request made last year by a deaf postal employee.

Garden City, N.Y. Letter

Carrier John Passarella wrote to the Postmaster General asking that the TDD be installed. Passarella, who uses a TDD himself, has had a hearing impairment all his life.

The National Association of the Deaf estimates that about eight million Americans have difficulty using a telephone. More than 75,000 of them have TDDs.

A TDD enables its operator to type out messages on a

keyboard and transmit them by electronic signals over the telephone lines to a receiver which prints out the original message. The receiving TDD can then be used to transmit a response.

"I'm pleased that we are able to provide this service to hearing impaired citizens," Postmaster Nienaber said. "It's good that we have this way to reach out to people who have difficulty using the telephone."

Gary Olsen, Executive Director of the National Association of the Deaf, said, "I assure you there will be a high demand for using the Postal Service TDD. I thank them for the fine effort to become more accessible. The NAD is grateful."
