On March 26, at 8 P.M., about 700 people crowded every seat, aisle and entrance at Town Hall at Audrey Ave. in Oyster Bay to protest the building of a "White Castle" on Bethpage Rd. and Willet Ave. The sense of purpose, the enthusiasm, and the strong feelings of community were absolutely overwhelming. How proud I am of all of us! I don't believe Hicksville will ever be taken for granted again!

There are so many people to thank for our outstanding defense against "White Castle" and their prestigious representatives. Everyone did such a superb job, contributing time, energy and talent. I wish I could mention every single name but space does not permit. I must, however, mention some key people whose actions made our defense what we hope will be a verdict in our favor. Firstly, Ellie Draycott, whose idea of reactivating the Midland Civic Assoc. so that we could be a bona fide community group and meet in the public schools, and who also gave of her civic expertise, sharp intellect, and her son's free and expert advice; secondly, Eileen Richards,

"The applicants, Adam Realty and Ernie's Finishing Touch, Inc., are seeking a special use permit to operate a hand car wash, buffing, polishing and pinstriping business in an 'F' neighbor-

hood business district," Diamond stated. "The parcel is located on the south side of Old Country Road at the intersection of the east side of Maple (Halsey) Avenue."

The hearing will be held in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay on April 30. Diamond noted that the meeting will begin at 11:30 AM rather than the usual 10 AM because of Senior Citizen Recognition Day ceremonies.

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The Humanities In Europe

For twenty-three students in the Humanities Program at Hicksville High School, the spring recess will offer a change of scenery and a unique personal and educational experience: they will be in Europe on a ten-day tour of the continent. The Humanities in the tenth grade is based upon the study of the culture of Western Civilization, emphasizing history, literature, art and music, and this trip will provide first-hand knowledge of that culture and its impact on American life.

The students who are paying for this trip themselves, will be departing via Sabena Airlines from Kennedy Airport on Sunday, March 31, arriving in Brussels, Belgium, prior to moving on to Amsterdam, Holland, for a two day visit. In this city of 160 canals, the group will visit the famous Rijksmuseum, the homes of Anne Frank and Rembrandt, the Van Gogh Museum, an afternoon side-trip to the fishing villages of Marken and Volendam, all culminating in a canal boat trip cruising the city's waterways and harbor.

They will depart Amsterdam on an overnight ship cruise across the North Sea, landing eventually in London, England. During the three days in London, the tour will see the sights familiar to all: from St. Paul's Cathedral and the Houses of Parliament to Buckingham Palace and the Tower of London. An afternoon excursion to historic Windsor

Castle will be followed by attending a theatrical performance in London.

Leaving London, the students will proceed on to Paris, France, via Catherbury, the White Cliffs of Dover, and a channel crossing to Calais. In Paris for several days, the tour highlights excursions to the Louvre, Notre-Dame Cathedral, the Champs-Elysees, the Arc de Triomphe, and a "Bateau Mouche" cruise on the River Seine. Ample time is also provided throughout the tour for shopping and enjoying nightlife entertainment in each city. A day trip to the city of Chartres and its famed cathedral will provide the final memories before moving on to Brussels and the return trip home on Tuesday, April 9.

"Throughout the year, the students and faculty in the Humanities have been very grateful for the support and encouragement received from the parents and the school district regarding our various special programs: the trips to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Cloisters, the Guggenheim Museum, the Metropolitan Opera's production of "Porgy and Bess," the Hofstra Shakespeare Festival, the West Islip Renaissance Chamber Singers, and the symphonies at Bush-Brown Concert Theater at C.W. Post College. This tour of Europe is no exception, and we extend our thankfulness and appreciation for their continued interest and concern," said a spokesperson for these fine programs.

News from Hicksville Water District

The Board of Commissioners of the Hicksville Water District is pleased to announce to their consumers that a "Certificate of Waiver from Requirements of Mandatory Disinfection" has once again been granted to the District by the State of New York, Department of Health, Office of Public Health.

Simply put, this means that all of our supply wells are pumping water from each separate source that is bacteriologically pure at each well head. With this waiver it is not mandatory for the District to chlorinate the supply system. However, in the interests of public health, so long as we continue to have interruptions of service due to recent

house services, continuing settlement in the highways and other threats to the integrity of our supply mains, the Commissioners will continue to treat the system with a light chlorine residual as in the past. This latest waiver was granted by the Southern Regional Office of the Health Department on February 27th, 1985.

The Commissioners,

Nicholas J. Briganti, Gilbert E. Cusick, and Richard A. Humann, have also recently reported to the New York Section of the American Water Works Association that our new Air Stripping Plant is basically complete except for certain punch list items. All tower samples that have been taken to date have been satisfactory and we are now able to anticipate the plant

being brought on line soon.

When all systems are go, the Board will make the proper public announcement and at that time anticipates the public will be given an opportunity to view this most significant addition to our plant. We will continue to be able to supply Hicksville with a high quality and potable water supply.

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Dear Friends...

LAST WEEK we told you about the items in this column written in 1969 regarding the traffic-flow problems in existence in 1969, by Rotary and Jeannens Places which go into and out of the northern part of The Mid Island Plaza into a residential Street ... Nevada Street. This problem was already in existence in 1969!

Now we bring you up to Nov. of 1977, in this continuing story of what we consider to be the infringement on the rights of residents whose homes were there before these short streets were brought into existence and dedicated by The Mid Island Plaza to the Town of Oyster Bay, many years ago.

Mr. Robert Fischer of 28 Nevada St., addressed a lengthy letter filled with practical suggestions for correcting the problems made by traffic in this area, to our Councilman and sent copies to all Town, County and State officials involved, in an attempt at that time to address and correct this problem.

Excerpts from Mr. Fischer's 1977 letter are:

My recommendations would be:

(1) Nevada St. be made one-way westbound with both Jeannens and Rotary Pl. serving as ENTRANCE ONLY to Mid Island Plaza from Nevada St.

(2) Princess St. be made one-way eastbound. In order to make this possible the median on Broadway and Princess St. has to be opened up and a traffic signal installed.

(3) The traffic in Mid Island Plaza should be made to go one-way only - counter-clockwise (as in Roosevelt Field). This would eliminate the approximately twenty percent of the traffic using the shopping center as a short cut between West John St. and Broadway and Newbridge Rd.

(4) The median at the exit by Nathans should be lengthened to accommodate the three lanes of traffic that exit there to travel north."

There was much more in Mr. Fischer's 1977 letter, and all his suggestions would have helped to correct this traffic problem around Nevada St. without large costs (paid for, of course, eventually, by all of us).

NOW in 1985 we are currently beset with the same problems and the State Dept. of Transportation has made the suggestion (among many others) that Nevada St. (a residential street and owned by the Town of Oyster Bay) be widened. This would take 8 feet from the front of the homes located on one side of Nevada St., and 5 feet off the front of the homes on the opposite side of this residential street. There could be no argument that the value of homes to which this would be done, would end up being lowered by many, many thousands of dollars. There are other workable solutions, some of which Mr. Fischer has addressed.

Many citizens have already written to both their State Senator Ralph Marino and Assemblyman Fred Parola, up in Albany, asking them to help solve this problem which at present is putting in jeopardy the homes of Hicksville residents in this area unnecessarily.

The houses predate these short streets into Nevada St. and other solutions are possible. Both Sen. Marino and Assemblyman Parola, beginning next week after they have completed their work on our State budget up in Albany, will be sitting down with representatives of the State DOT in an all-out effort to solve this serious problem.

The Interfaith Nutritional Network which will be opening a soup kitchen on April 1, to help feed the hungry in our area five days a week, needs empty coffee cans with tops, or any other covered containers into which they could put food which those in need may take home with them. If you would like to help, please put your coffee cans or other containers into brown paper bags or any other convenient bags and drop them off in the kitchen of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church on the corner of Jerusalem Avenue and Old Country Road. Thanks a million.

We congratulate each and every person who worked together with such enthusiasm and zeal on two local projects...

One in Hicksville whereby many residents from all areas of Hicksville and some areas of Jericho, opposed the building of a 24-hour White Castle next to a residential area. You all did a great job which culminated in a well-attended night hearing which was informational and helpful to all who were present. Also, you all conducted yourselves as we knew you would, in a most courteous fashion. When almost 700 people are together this speaks well of their standards.

Then, in Plainview, we spent a really great Sunday on March 24, taking part in their Discovery Day II.

Enough praise cannot be given to those who have been working for the second year on a project to bring their community together and to help preserve its identity. It was truly inspiring.

At The Town Board Meeting

Decision was reserved on the petition of Lester Rosenfeld and Lester Operating Corp. and the Pickwick Motor Inn for a special use permit in an Ind. H district, for the construction, and operation of 20 additional rooms on the westerly end of the existing motel and to erect a three story office building on the westerly portion of the premises at the intersection of South Service Rd. of the LIE and Round Swamp Rd. Although there was no resident opposition to the petition, the Town Board expressed its concern for the increase in parking necessary and the additional traffic that would be generated by this construction.

* Decision was reserved on a petition of John DeMonaco, Henry Präus, Grand Prix Performance, Ltd. and Joseph Friszell for

a special use permit in a Bus. G district to operate and maintain a car waxing business at Broadway and Farm Lane, Hicksville.

Residents in opposition came to the meeting and explained the reasons for their feeling. They feel that the fence that has been erected to buffer their property is not sufficient to buffer them from the improper language used by Mr. Friszell and his employees. They also stated that the business operates after the stated closing times and although it is not supposed to be used for private use (only corporate accounts) the business does use the facilities for private use.

The Town Board suggested that the owner and the residents try to come to an amicable accord privately to solve these problems.

* Resolution No. 261 directed a hearing date of

April 16 to be advertised by the Town Clerk for a hearing to consider proposed amendments to the code of ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay to amend chapter 11 - garbage, litter and waste - and various sections.

The Town is proposing to tighten the existing codes governing the permits granted for dumping at the landfill. These codes have been reviewed in regard to land fees, permit fees, permit requirements and the standardization of requirements for trucks and carters.

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Dunne Proposes New State Aid Formula

Most County school districts could see their state operating aid boosted by thousands of dollars under a bold, new plan to revise state "Save Harmless" aid proposed by Senator John Dunne (R-Nassau).

The plan, known as equalized minimum increase guarantees (EMIG), would, for the first time, increase state funding to school districts under the state's Save Harmless aid formula. The Save Harmless formula guarantees that a school district cannot receive less operating aid than it did in previous years.

"Operating aid represents nearly two-thirds of each individual school district's total budget," Senator Dunne pointed out. "It is a school district's single, most important source of state funding."

Senator Dunne said the proposal would increase operating aid to the state's Save Harmless school districts by nearly \$40 million. He added that Nassau County schools would get \$5.6 million of the increased funding.

"Local education costs have soared," Dunne noted. "Yet each year the Legislature must fight the Governor just to ensure that school districts don't LOSE operating aid from the state."

"This places an excessive burden on local property owners and makes it very difficult for schools to maintain quality educational programs."

"Our schools, especially those in high-tax, low-wealth areas, desperately need additional state operating aid and the best way, I believe, to ensure that they

get it is by revising the present aid formulas."

Senator Dunne said that passage of his bill was even more crucial in light of the Governor's proposed cut back in education aid and elimination of Save Harmless funds that would reduce state aid to Nassau County schools by over \$13.5 million.

"I will be doing everything I can over the course of the budget negotiations to ensure that our other school districts receive their fair share of state education aid," Dunne stated. "And I will work closely with my colleagues in the Legislature to bring about the needed changes in the operating aid formulas to make sure our schools have the resources they need to adequately educate our children."

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




