Hicksville Board of Education Meeting

A major item on the agenda of the April 25 Hicksville Board of Education meeting was the public hearing and formal Board adoption of the budget that will go before the voters on May 22. The figures are:

- General Support - \$4,981,050
- Instruction - \$23,584,415
- Transportation - \$1,605,050
- Commun. Services - \$101,700
- Undistributed - \$9,476,615

The resulting total for the 1985-86 school budget is \$39,748,830, an increase of approximately 5% over last year's budget. The additional state aid projected for next year brings the estimated tax increase down to \$1.49 from the \$1.68 figure shown in the brochure.

In Other Matters

During the preliminary section of the meeting, Mr. Wolfson suggested that the Board send a letter to Pres. Reagan regarding his proposed controversial visit to the German cemetery during his coming trip to Europe. He noted that the visit was an insult to every veterans' group and to the 11 million victims of the Nazis during the Holocaust. He also suggested that letters be sent to federal legislators on the subject of tax reform, particularly noting the proposed elimination of deductions for state and local taxes which are currently part of the tax laws. He further requested that the Board go on record in opposition to tuition tax credits. This point was reinforced by Mrs. Rudin, who noted that such a resolution is part of current Board policy and that a copy should be forwarded to our state legislators. Mrs. Rudin also reported on an interesting and informative legislative presentation conducted by the New York State School Boards Association, and she commented on the appearance of the Vienna Choir Boys earlier this month, describing the performance as a highlight of the kind of cultural presentations we can bring to the Hicksville community.

This section of the meeting ended with committee reports and the general public session, which included some ques-

tions and comments from the public regarding the Bible study group at the high school and the administrative regulations accepted by the Board to implement requirements of the federal Equal Access Law.

The Board approved two textbooks which had been submitted for information and hearing at previous meetings. The texts recommended for use in grades 4 and grades 7 and 8 respectively are The World and Its People-New York Yesterday and Today and A Proud Nation.

A resolution was adopted nominating Richard L. Ornauer for re-election to the Board of Directors of the New York State School Boards Association representing Area 11, which covers Nassau County and New York City.

The Board took action on a recommendation of the Curriculum Committee and approved drama course offerings for the 1985-86 school year. The courses are Introduction to the Theater, Physical Education for Actors, Acting Techniques, and Stage Craft and Management. The addition of these courses is part of a plan to integrate drama into a comprehensive fine arts curriculum.

In further actions, the Board changed unemployment compensation consultants from the Gibbons Company to Portnoy, Messinger, Pearl and Associates for the coming year at a savings to the district and elected to participate in the Index System. This is a national network sponsored by the American Insurance Association to share information about personal injury claims filed in Worker Compensation cases. The Board further approved the extension of contracts for transportation for an additional year.

PTA Donation

The Hicksville Council of PTAs made a donation of \$2000 to the district which was accepted by the Board. These funds, revenue from ticket sales to the Vienna Choir Boys concert, were presented for use for further cultural arts programs.

Plainview Election & Budget Vote, Wed., May 8

In the Plainview-Old Bethpage School District, a budget of \$36,405,755 will be presented for the voters approval. This represents a tax rate of \$28.03 per \$100 of assessed valuation, or a 7% increase from the past year's budget.

Incumbent Miriam Ravad is opposed by Ben Taubenfeld and incumbent Sylvia Samuels is being challenged by Anna Goidel and John Zohn for a three-year term, on the Board of Education.

Irwin Enteen, incumbent, is running unopposed for the Library Board.

The voters are also being asked to vote on the transfer of \$295,000 to the capital reserve fund for reconstruction of the Parkways School roof...this will have no effect on the tax rate.

Voting is from 10 am to 10 pm at the Jamaica Avenue School, the Joyce Road School and the Old Bethpage School.

Information received regarding each candidate is listed herewith alphabetically:

As program chairman for P.T.A. Council, I scheduled the first P.T.A. program to address the problem of drug and alcohol abuse among our students. I served as president of Plainview-Old Bethpage High School for 2 separate terms - 2 years each. Honorary Life Membership in P.T.A. was bestowed upon me. I spent 16 years teaching English and Speech in this community's schools. I served as faculty advisor for Plainview Junior High School's student newspaper and also revived the Kennedy Players. I worked to keep the Plainview-Old Bethpage Middle School open. Upon my retirement, I volunteered to work on the District-wide Panel for Talented Education. I have served and still serve as a member of the Board of Directors of Plainview-Old Bethpage Youth Activities Council. I worked to establish the Council's Youth Employment Service. Living on a fixed retirement income, I know that needs must be balanced carefully against costs.

Anna Goidel

I am the only candidate who knows and understand the needs of our community from 4 different areas - parental concerns, P.T.A. and community concerns; educational concerns; and the concerns of the retired senior citizen. A resident of Plainview-Old Bethpage for 31 years, I have been actively involved in school affairs through P.T.A. and community organizations both as a parent and teacher. I earned a B.A. degree in Brooklyn College and an M.A. degree from C.W. Post. Married for 38 years, my husband Eugene and I have 2 sons who graduated from our schools. Our older son is an environmental scientist, and our younger son is a lawyer. As an active member of P.T.A. for over 20 years, I fought to create a remedial reading program, driver education program.

Among the many problems the Board of Education must address are the following:

(1) Improvement of the academic program for the average student.

(2) Preparation of staff in the regular classroom to meet the needs of the students who will be mainstreamed. The teacher must be able to understand the special student.

(3) Work with state and federal legislators to secure funding for educational programs.

(4) Development of a new staff to replace the large number of retired teachers.

(5) Develop better lines of communication with parents, students, staff, retired citizens, and the entire community.

I strongly believe that what works educationally, need not cost more.

Because of the language barrier, many Spanish speaking elderly in our County are not aware of the support services available to them. Through using a bi-lingual counselor we hope to help our Spanish speaking elderly understand the support services they may use, we were told by a spokesperson for the Dept. of Senior Citizen Affairs of our County.

Applications Available For July 4 Women's Championship Run
