June 18 Hearing Set On Hicksville Special Use Permit

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond announced that the Town Board has scheduled on June 18, public hearing on a request for a special use permit in Hicksville.

Diamond said, "The applicant, Tomfor Transportation Corporation/Gus Riedlinger's Towing Service, Inc., is requesting a special use permit to use property in an 'H' Industrial District for a parking lot and depot for tow trucks and other commercial vehicles, temporary storage of damaged vehicles and the repair of tow trucks, in

conjunction with the operation of a motor vehicle towing business."

Diamond noted that, "The business is located at the west side of Charlotte Avenue, just north of the intersection of Charlotte Avenue and Old Country Road, in Hicksville."

The hearing has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 18, beginning at 10 AM in the Town Hall East Hearing Room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

1985 Memorial Day Parade & Services

Hicksville will honor its deceased members of the armed services, particularly the community's 38 casualties of the nation's four 20th century wars with its annual Memorial Day Parade and Services on Monday, May 27.

The Hicksville Combined Veterans Organization Memorial Day Committee, with the Henry Biel Post 46 of the Masonic War Veterans chairing the program, has announced that this year's parade will follow the long-traditional route down Broadway to the Hicksville High School, parade and memorial service coordinator, Ted Platkin, of the Masonic War Veterans, asks that all groups wishing to take part in the parade, form at the Sears north parking lot between 8 and 8:30 a.m., Monday, May 27th.

The Memorial Day Parade will start at 9 a.m. sharp with the Hicksville Fire Department leading off. The parade route will be as follows: south on Broadway to Old Country Road; west on Old Country Rd. to Newbridge Road and south to the High School playing fields.

This year's Memorial Day Services at the Hicksville High School will include as honored guests Masonic War Veterans Post 46 Chaplain, John Lillie, who will render the Invocation. Pastor Douglas MacDonald of the Parkway

Community Church, Hicksville's senior clergyman, will give the Benediction, and Rev. Father Alfred Rogers of St. Ignatius Loyola Church will close the services with prayer.

The Principal Speaker for the Memorial Day Services will be Lt. Fred Bauer of the U.S. Marine Corps. Students speakers from the Hicksville High School will be Elinor La and Paul Greenfield.

Among other honored guests for the Memorial Day Parade and Formal Ceremonies afterwards, at the high school will be: Gold Star Mothers escorted by members of the Charles Wagner Post 421, American Legion Auxiliary; Honorary Parade Grand Marshals Sanford Weiss, Ex-Chief of the Hicksville Fire Department and a member of the Manetto Lodge 1025 of the Masons, and Vincent Edwards, Past Commander of the William Gouse Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars. The Memorial Day Parade's Grand Marshal will be John Ritter of the Masonic War Veterans, recipient of two Silver Star decorations in World War II, who will be honored by Assemblyman Daniel Frisa of the 15th N.Y. Assembly District. Other governmental dignitaries will be Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond and Ann Ocker, Town of Oyster Bay Clerk, who will represent Supervisor Joseph Colby.

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At The Town Board Meeting

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regular meeting of the Town Board on May 21. The following actions took place at this meeting:

Decision was reserved on a petition of Jesco Company, for a change of zone from Ind. H district to Bus. C district to renovate and modernize an existing gas station located at W. John St. and Burns Ave. in Hicksville. The zone change is necessary due to the fact that the gas station was built on the premises before the Ind. H zone was imposed.

The petitioner would like to add an additional bay to the existing gas station. Residents in opposition to the change expressed their dissatisfaction with the fact that the present lease has Sunday hours at the station. The residents also feel that the bell used to announce the arrival of customers is an annoyance.

Christine Maddigan and Joanne Brokska spoke in opposition to the petition. There were other residents present also in opposition to this change.

Decision was reserved on the petition of Renvin Corp., for a change of zone from Res. A to Bus. F at South Service Rd. of the E and Sunnyside Blvd.; Plainview. This unzoned piece of property was purchased from the New York State Dept. of Transportation in 1975. The developers would like to construct a three story office building with underground parking facilities at the site. There was no opposition to this petition.

Decision was reserved on the petition of Charlotte Ave. Associates and Nassau County Industrial Development Agency for a special use permit in an Ind. H district to construct a one story, 4200 square foot building for utilization by AllState Insurance Co. for the storage, salvaging and disposition of damaged motor vehicles, the adjusting of claims, the training of personnel and other related uses at the south west corner of Charlotte Ave. and the land of the LIRR. There was no opposition to this petition.

Decision was reserved on the petition of Steven Wolf and Albert Weisinger, owners of Ski Stop, Inc. and Lisa Industries, Inc. as lessee, for a special use permit to increase the retail sales area and office space in an Ind. H district at South Service Rd. and Sunnyside Blvd., Plainview. There was no opposition to the petition. The Supervisor did recommend a change in the sign now being used, to something more esthetic.

Resolution No. 423 - Directed the Town Clerk to advertise a hearing date of June 4 to consider proposed local law concerning the consumption of alcoholic beverages in a public place, in the Town of Oyster Bay. The Town must redefine the present law concerning

public drinking and this redefinition would make the law more stringent.

Resolution No. 424 - Directed the Town Clerk to advertise a hearing date of June 18 on the petition of Albert H. & Henrietta Treiman for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O Residence-Office at South Oyster Bay Rd. and Ontario Ave. The address is 465 South Oyster Bay Rd.

Resolution No. 425 - Directed the Town Clerk to advertise a hearing date of June 18 on the petition of Tomfor Transportation Corp., Gus Riedingers Towing Service, Inc. for a special use permit in an Ind. H district to use the premises for a parking lot and depot for town trucks and other commercial vehicles, temporary storage of damaged vehicles and the repair of its tow trucks, in conjunction with the operation of a motor vehicle towing business at Charlotte Ave. and Old Country Rd., Hicksville.

Resolution No. 426 - Approved the site plan submitted by Donald Monti, et al for a change of zone granted by Resolution No. 1039-84 at Old Country Rd. and Gerhard Rd., Plainview.

Resolution No. 427 - Approved the site plan submitted by Abcon Assoc., Inc. for a special use permit granted by Resolution No. 433 - Approved the award of contract and directed the consultant to proceed with the construction phase of the highway improvements at Briarcliff Rd., Jericho.

Resolution No. 434 - Approved a change order on the contract for the construction of recharge basin at Winding Rd., Old Bethpage.

Resolution No. 435 - Approved the extension of time and change order on the contract of the off-site groundwater monitoring program at Old Bethpage Solid Waste Disposal Complex. It was necessary to install three additional monitoring wells and to change the type of pump being used at the site. This caused the change order and the need for a time extension.

Resolution No. 447 - Approved the amending of Resolution No. 365-85 in connection with the petition of 125 East Bethpage Assoc. for a special use permit at 125 East Bethpage Rd., Plainview. The resolution was amended to allow for the outside storage of garbage, but it must be in an approved enclosed container.

Resolution No. 458 - Approved the awarding of a contract and directed the consultant to proceed with the construction phase of the construction of storm water recharge basin and

drainage structures at the intersection of South Woods Rd. and Woodbury Rd., Woodbury. The contract was awarded to Guy Pratt, 608 Union Ave., Holtsville in the amount of \$557,000.

Resolution No. 462 - Approved the final payment on the contract for the Nassau County sewer improvements at the Blueberry Lane area of Hicksville.

Resolution No. 463 - Approved the final payment on the contract for the Nassau County sewer improvements at Cherry St., Herzog Place, Railroad Ave. and adjacent areas in Hicksville.

Resolution No. 464 - Approved the increase of engineering fees on the design phase by the consultant on the contract for the removal of architectural barriers to the handicapped at Bethpage and Plainview-Old Bethpage Community Parks. This is an on going plan to facilitate the use of the parks for the use by the handicapped.

Resolution No. 479 - Authorized the consultant to proceed with the renovation of the Highway Facilities at 100 Miller Place, Syosset. The bay areas and the building arc in need of renovation, due to age.

Resolution No. 483 - Approved the material substitution on the construction of storm water recharge basin in the vicinity of Humphrey Dr., Syosset.

Resolutions No. 484 and 485 - Approved the change orders necessary to complete the contracts for the improvements being made to the fourth floor at Town Hall, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay.

Resolution No. 488 - Approved the petition of Richard Bower, as fee owner of 117 Oak Drive Corp. for a special use permit to operate an insurance business at Oak Dr. and Cedar Place, Syosset.

Resolution No. 489 - Denied the petition of Lester Rosenfeld and Lester Operating Corp., The Pickwick Motor Inn, for a special use permit to add 20 rooms to the motel and a new three story office building at the site.

The Board denied the petition due to the lack of sufficient parking available at the site. 148 more parking spaces were needed.

Resolution No. 490 - Awarded the contract for the construction of a fourth parking field at TOBAY Beach. The contract was awarded to Kings Park Industries for \$183,990.

The next scheduled meeting of the Town Board is June 4th.

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Hicksville Gardens Civics Discuss Parks

On Monday, May 20th, the Hicksville Gardens Civic Association met at East St. School. The newly organized civic, now has 66 families as paid members. The Board Members were sworn in by Councilman Tom Clark. The President is Virginia Germer, the Vice President is Kevin Doyle, Treasurer is Rose Maggio, Recording Secretary is Mike Kanuck and Corresponding Secretary is Irene Doyle.

There was a very good turnout for this meeting since the main topic of the evening was the development of the park site located at the triangular piece of land formed where New South Road, Plainview Rd. and Old Country Rd. meet. It is the property adjacent to the Redeemer Lutheran Church.

Tom Clark presented a sketch of the property as it would appear minimally developed. There would be a fenced in children's playground. A small parking field on the Plainview Rd. side of the park of about 150' X 150'; enough to accommodate about 15 cars. This would alleviate some of the parking problems on Plainview Rd. and allow mothers with small children to drive directly to the playground facility. The rest of the park would be outlined by shrubbery, and left cleared with areas for benches. Many of the residents had ideas as to what they would like to see the

park become. In order to make the park useful to most of the residents in the area, questionnaires will be circulated so that the residents of both sides of the park can give their input for the best development of the site. These questionnaires will be given to the Town for evaluation and consideration.

Many of the residents expressed their skepticism in regard to the fact that the Hicksville Water District may be leasing a parcel of this land to install a pumping station as a back up well for Hicksville. This is contingent on the quality of the water found, in a test well at the site.

The feelings expressed showed concern and opposition to having a water tower at this site. The residents were also concerned that the size of the property required by the Water District took too much land away from the park site. Some residents were also concerned that the price of \$100,000 dollars for the 99 year lease was a small compensation for this land.

The Water District reiterated the fact that there were no plans for a water tower at this site. The reason for the size of the plot required for the pumping station (190' X 240') is determined by the Department of Environmental Conservation. This is to insure a "Clean" piece of land for the pumping station. It also provides for the driveway needed for the trucks coming and going while monitoring the well.

The site will be landscaped. The amount of money which will be paid for leasing this property was decided by a "gentleman's agreement". If the Water District must pay more for the site, the water users (all of us) will have to pay more for the water.

Although the Water District has not found it necessary to close any of Hicksville's wells due to contamination, they are prudent enough to look for possible sites before that time comes. These sites are very difficult to come by.

Since the development of the park is already budgeted for, the development of the park does not hinge on the Water District's lease. The lease does facilitate the development since the money generated by the lease will be spent directly on the park.

The next scheduled meeting of Hicksville Gardens Civic Association is scheduled for June 20th. All those interested in the park's development are encouraged to attend.

Parents of missing children would become eligible to apply for trauma counseling services provided through the New York State Crime Victims Board under a bill sponsored by Senator Ralph J. Marino (R-Oyster Bay) and passed by the senate (Wed., May 8).

"This bill is a logical and compassionate extension of the special counseling services the Board currently makes available to certain applicants such as victims of rape or the families of homicide victims," Marion said. "It is consistent with the Legislature's growing recognition of the fact that crimes often have serious mental and emotional impact on victims and their families and that assistance should no longer be limited to compensation for physical injuries."

Under the Marino bill, the Crime Victims Board would be authorized to contract for counseling services upon the request of parents or legal guardians of children under

the age of sixteen who are missing from the home for at least seven days and whose whereabouts or safety cannot be determined.

"Few losses are felt more deeply than the loss of a child, particularly when coupled with fears for the well being of the child and absolute uncertainty as to the child's location. At present, the Crime Victims Board is prohibited from assisting parents or guardians during their agonizing wait to learn the fate of a missing child, the period during which their anguish and sense of loss is particularly acute. That unfair and unfeeling restriction would be lifted should this bill become law."

The Marino bill now goes to the Assembly where it is sponsored by Assemblyman James Tedisco of Schenectady.

TO THE EDITOR:

In the performance of his responsibilities to represent his constituency, Assemblyman Fred Parola often conducts opinion polls. This is a practice that should be followed by all elected officials when considering legislation on controversial topics such as the Long Island garbage crisis has become. Citizen's input should be evaluated before, not after, they deal with problems adversely affecting citizen's health, environmental, and financial status.

Assemblyman Parola has informed constituents that 84% of responses answered affirmatively to the question in his 1985 poll: "To reduce the volume of solid waste (garbage) and to promote environmental conservation, would you accept the inconvenience of separating certain refuse such as newspapers, metals, or non-deposit containers?"

I spoke with Assemblyman Parola about this wonderfully positive response but was disappointed when he stated: "It doesn't mean anything because people will say one thing and do the other." If elected officials choose not to believe people who bother asking their opinion? I choose to believe people intend to do what they say to the best of their ability in the same way Assemblyman Parola assures his constituents that their views are crucial in helping him to vote to protect our area's interest to the best of his ability.

Since the "garbage crisis" became big news more than three years ago, I have attended Board meetings and written letters beseeching County Executive Purcell and the Board of Supervisors to obtain the views of taxpayers on the subject of mandatory source separation as a variable PARTIAL solution. For instance, last October I believe Supervisor Colby should have taken the time to ask Town of Oyster Bay taxpayers: "Would you prefer a tripling of the tax rate for shipping unseparated garbage upstate, or would you accept a mandate to source separate and recycle newspapers, metals, glass, and plastic non-deposit containers to maintain the present lower tax rate?"

Because Mr. Colby failed to ask that question news tabloids and all media have been filled with stories about political feuds, litigation, and controversy while the garbage crisis continues and no solutions are found.

Assemblyman Parola is a state legislator but to me his 84% affirmative response should be a positive indication to local public officials. It should support them morally so they will no longer hesitate to pass

"home rule" legislation and immediately implement mandatory source separation. Certainly no elected official should feel hesitant to enact source separation legislation for the reason expressed by Assemblyman Parola that: "In areas where such source separations have been implemented, compliance falls below the levels we would wish to see." It stands to reason that every area is not the same nor are all people's incentives to cooperate the same.

County Executive Purcell and the Board of Supervisors should realize that a large majority of Nassau County citizens would willingly comply with the mandatory source separation program to protect health, environment and lower their taxes. It is sincerely hoped that a mandate for source separation will be a partial but definite solution that will partially correct the garbage crisis, while its final solutions are put into place.

Three years of asking and waiting for local-elected officials to believe in this mandatory source separation program and to have faith that most of the people will adhere to it, is a long time. I believe that the people are entitled to an opportunity to prove that they mean what they say in answering politicians' questionnaires...and I also believe that they will do what they say to the best of their ability, too.

I, for one, look forward to our elected officials reply to this letter very soon...hopefully fellow frustrated taxpayers will join in urging their response.

I know that you are a friend of environmental groups and I wanted to bring to the attention of those in Hicksville an important meeting to be held the day after Memorial Day at Trinity Lutheran Church on May 28, 8:00 P.M., 40 W. Nicholas St., entitled a SUPERFUND FORUM which is sponsored by NYCAN (the NY Community Action Network). I am sure many of you know Hicksville has the dubious distinction of having 3 of the top 100 NYS superfund sites: Hooker Chemical, Anchor Lithkemko and General Instruments and as far as I know only the latter has made appreciable efforts to clean up their site.

Two months ago I attended a Saturday meeting in Norman Lent's office wherein a wide range of community leaders urged him to do what he could to pass the current Superfund Legislation in Congress and help clean up the Old Bethpage site. Afterwards I wrote him asking him to exercise his considerable statesmanship ability to bring together the TOB, State government officials, and the business community to break the stalemate that exists in this matter. To date I have not heard from him or Senators Moynihan, D'Amato or Gov. Cuomo. A sense of futility and frustration prevails among anyone who has been involved in hazardous waste

Sheer Determination Gets Dorsey Through College

By Robert Graves

Sheer determination enabled Donald Dorsey to fulfill his dream of a college diploma.

He can't see well enough to read books.

He couldn't write his lessons while attending college because of the debilitating effects of multiple sclerosis.

Confined to a wheelchair and weakened by the disease, the 39-year-old Viet Nam veteran found going to classes each day a struggle.

Yet he recently graduated from the St. Leo College at Langley Air Force Base cum laude with a 3.5 academic average out of a possible 4.

"I found it hard to study while ill," he said. "I couldn't move much because of being stuck in a wheelchair, and I

always sat up close to the blackboard so I could see better."

"But I am a very determined individual."

Majoring in human resources administration, Dorsey received a bachelor's degree.

"I feel great about getting my degree," he said. "I just wish my eyes were good enough to go on and get my master's degree. I would love to teach at the university level. If my eyes got better, I would go to Golden Gate University at Langley for further study."

When Dorsey started at St. Leo in August 1982, he was living at home in the Riverdale Apartments and was able to walk to the first two classes with a crutch. But since then, he has been in a wheelchair. Dorsey today is in the nursing home of the Veterans Administration Medical Center, where he has been since Jan. 24, after spending 110 days in the VA hospital for MS treatment.

"The day I went into the hospital, I answered the question of the last test at St. Leo," he said.

Dorsey said his classes were moved to the bottom floor because he was unable to use the stairs. His vision was fading, so he obtained his books early and his mother, Evelyn M. Dorsey

of Hicksville, N.Y., read them onto tapes.

"My eyes were getting pretty bad," he said.

His wife, Sibylle, drove him to St. Leo.

Dorsey started his studies at the University of Maryland in Frankfort, Germany, while in the Air Force, receiving a two-year associate degree in the arts in January 1982.

Dorsey's problem was first diagnosed as multiple

sclerosis on June 14, 1979. He said after earning the degree, he accepted retirement as a master sergeant because "I was getting very ill."

"I waived retirement and disability payments and accepted VA care and disability payments."

Dorsey, who was a top bowler on the Peninsula when he was stationed at Langley in 1963 and 1964, and again in 1970 and 1972, goes to Langley for wheelchair bowling every Monday.

"I was third highest on the Peninsula," he said. He once bowled a perfect game of 300, he said. "I enjoy it, and get to see a lot of people I have known for many years."

Dorsey said he served in Vietnam for 90 days and served in Thailand for six months resupplying the Cambodians with rice and ammunition.

Dorsey said his father, Frank Dorsey of Hicksville always wanted to have someone in the family go to college. Well, it really happened.

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STRESS REACTIONS

Surviving the death of a loved one, especially a child or spouse, ranks very high on the list of stress-producing life events. While a moderate amount of stress may motivate and stimulate us, a high level of stress is potentially harmful to our health.

Evidence indicates that those who are bereaved have a decreased resistance to infections and other diseases, some which may be life threatening. One study, for instance, showed a striking correlation between severe stress and the onset of cancer.

This stress is also likely to lead to problems in other relationships. The incidence of separation and divorce in parents who

experience the death of a young child is exceptionally high. The death rate is higher for bereaved persons than others in the same age and social categories. This is especially true for the first year following the death. It is a critical period during which the health and welfare of the bereaved should be of prime concern.


