



There was a very good turn out for this meeting since the main topic of the evening was the develop-ment of the park site located at the triangular piece of land formed where New South Road, Plainview Rd. and Old country Rd. meet. It is the property adjacent to the Redeemer Lutheran Church. ing station as a back up well for Hicksville. This is contingent on the quality of the water found, in a test well at

the site. The feelings expressed showed concern and opposi-tion to having a water tower at this site. The residents were also concerned that the size of the property required by the Water District took too much land away from the park site. Some residents were also concerned that the price of \$100,000 dollars for the 99 year lease was a small compensation for this land. The Water District reiter-

ated the fact that there were no plans for a water tower at this site. The reason for the size of the plot required for the pumping station (190'X240') is determined by the Department of Envir-onmental Conservation. This is to insure a "Clean" piece of land for the pump-ing station. It also provides for the driveway needed for the trucks coming and going. while monitoring the well.



Parents of missing child-ren would become eligible to apply for trauma counseling services provided through the New York State Crime Victims Board under a bill victims Board under a bit sponsored by Senator Ralph J. Marino (R-Oyster Bay) and passed by the senate (Wed., May 8). "This bill is a logical and

compassionate extension of the special counseling servithe Board currently makes available to certain applicants such as victims of rape or the families of homvictims," Marion said. 'lt is consistent with the Legislature's growing recognition of the fact that crimes often have serious mental and emotional impact on victims and their families and that assistance should no longer be limited to compensation for physi-

cal injuries." Under the Marino bill, the Crime Victims Board would be authorized to contract for counseling services upon the request of parents or legal guardians of children under the age of sixteen who are missing from the home for at least seven days and whose whereabouts or safety can-not be determined.

"Few losses are felt more deeply than the loss of a child, particularly when coupled with fears for the well being of the child and absolute uncertainty as to the child's location. At pres-ent, the Crime Victims Board is prohibited from assisting parents or guardians during their agonizing wait to learn the fate of a missing child, the period during which their anguish and sense of loss is particu-larly acuted that unfair and unfeeling restriction would be lifted should this bill become law.

The Marino bill now goes to the Assembly where it is sponsored by Assemblyman James Tedisco of Schenectady.

I know that you are a friend of environmental

groups and I wanted to bring to the attention of those in Hicksville an important meeting to be held the day after Memorial Day at Trinity Lutheran Church on May 28, 8:00 P.M., 40 W. Nicholai St., entitled a SUPERFUND FORUM which is spon-sored by NYCAN (the NY Community Action Net-work). I am sure many of you know Hicksville has the dubious distinction of hav-ing 3 of the top 100 NYS superfund sites: Hooker Chemical, Anchor Lith-kemko and General Instruments and as far as I know only the latter has made appreciable efforts to clean up their site.

Two months ago I attended a Saturday meet-ing in Norman Lent's office wherein a wide range of community leaders urged him to do what he could to pass the current Superfund Legislation in Congress and help clean up the Old Beth-page site. Afterwards I wrote him asking him to exercise his considerable statesmanship ability to bring together the TOB, State government officials, and the business community to break the stalemate that exists in this matter. To date I have not heard from him or Senators Moynihan, D'Amato or Gov. Cuomo. A sense of futility and frustration prevails among anyone who has been involved in hazardous waste (Continued on Page 5)



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

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

There was a lovely social hour, where cookies and beverages were dispensed from a colorful, flower


