Our Nevada St. Problem
In the near future the Oyster Bay Town Board will be taking the necessary steps to make Jeanson Place one way into the Mid Island Plaza. Inamuch as a recent Town traffic survey showed clearly that a very high percentage of traffic using both Rotary and Jeanson Places into and out of the Plaza as a short cut to and from John Street, this will be eliminated by making both Rolary and Jeanson Places as entrances into the Plaza from Nevada Street. Also, it will make the State DOT proposal to widen Nevada Street by taking 8' off the small front yards of several homes on one side of Nevada St, and 5' off several homes on the other side of this street, unnecessary. Had this been done it would have rendered these homes worthless. It is good to know that, after a careful analysis of this problem, the Town has taken a stand using a viable alternative which does no damage to these homes. It is also a much less expensive solution. No doubt we will see this item on the Town Board's agenda in the
