Our Nevada St. Problem

In the near future the Oyster Bay Town Board will be taking the necessary steps to make Jeanson Place one way into the Mid Island Plaza. Inasmuch as a recent Town traffic survey showed clearly that a very high percentage of traffic using both Rotary and Jeanson Places into and out of the Plaza as a short cut to and from John Street, this will be eliminated by making both Rotary and Jeanson Places as entrances into the Plaza from Nevada Street. Also, it will make the State DOT proposal to widen Nevada Street by taking 8' off the small front yards of several homes on one side of Nevada St. and 5' off several homes on the other side of this street, unnecessary. Had this been done it would have rendered these homes worthless. It is good to know that, after a careful analysis of this problem, the Town has taken a stand using a viable alternative which does no damage to these homes. It is also a much less expensive solution. No doubt we will see this item on the Town Board's agenda in the near future. We will keep you informed.

At The Town Board Meeting

The Town of Oyster Bay held a regular Town Board meeting on June 18 at Town Hall, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay. The following hearings and resolutions were acted upon:

* Decision was reserved on the petition of Tomlor Transportation Corp./Gus Riedlingers Towing Service, Inc., for a special use permit in and Ind. H district to use the premises for a parking lot and depot for tow trucks and other commercial vehicles, temporary storage of damaged vehicles and the repair of its tow trucks, in conjunction with the operation of a motor vehicle towing business at Charlotte Ave. and Old Country Rd. in Hicksville. The owner of the adjacent property was concerned about additional traffic congestion in the area and tow trucks being parked on the street.

* Decision was reserved on the petition of Albert H. and Henrietta Treiman, for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O district at 465 South Oyster Bay Rd., Plainview. At the hearing, Mr. Treiman, an attorney, represented himself at the hearing. Mr. Treiman bought the property in 1970 for use as his office and residence. He later moved to a new residence and rented the upstairs of the house. He received a summons and now wishes to legalize with a zone change.

There were about 15 residents from the area at the

hearing to oppose the change. They complained about the house being unkempt and an eyesore to the neighborhood. They said that the lawn was overgrown and in the winter, the snow is not shoveled. The garage door is in disrepair and detracts from the appearance of the house. The residents of the area stated that they would like the house to be rented to tenants so that the appearance could be maintained. The Board said that they would investigate the property before decision was made.

* Resolution No. 528 - Approved a hearing date of July 9 on the petition of Thomas N. Fazio for a change of zone from Res. D to R-O district at Jackson Ave. and Edward Ave., Syosset.

* Resolution No. 529 July 30 on the petition of Joseph Sorok, William Stewart and Old Country Car Service, Ltd. for a special use permit in a G-I district and an H district to construct, maintain and use premises as a Subaru Automobile dealership and automobile repair shop at Old Country Rd., East of Broadway in Hicksville.

* Resolution No. 530 - Approved a hearing date of July 30 on the petition of Richard & Thomas Notey and Ethly Marketing Corp. for a change of zone from Res. D to Bus. E district at Old Country Rd. at the intersection of Plainview

Rd. and Manetto Hill Rd., Plainview.

* Resolution No. 537 - Approved the reallocation of engineering fees on the contract for the construction of storm drains and appurtenances on Elliman and Horton Places and Anita Ave. in Syosset. There was a zero change in the amount of the contract.

* Resolution No. 538 - Approved the reallocation of engineering fees on the contract for the construction of an overflow line from existing Devine Ave. recharge basin to the Humphrey Dr. recharge basin in Syosset. There was no change on the dollar amount of contract.

* Resolution No. 539 - Approved the reallocation of engineering fees on the contract for the construction of storm drains and appurtenances on Devine Ave. and adjacent areas in Syosset. This reallocation does not change the amount of the contract.

* Resolution No. 543 - Accepted the site plan approval on Town Board resolution no. 44-85 for the special use permit granted to Emmaus House Foundation Inc., Syosset. The residence at 232 Cold Spring Rd. will house eight seniors and one staff member. It is a residence for people 62 years old and older.

* Resolution No. 558 - Approved the reallocation of engineering fees on the contract for the construction of storm drains and appurtenances on Winding

Rd., Old Bethpage. There was a zero change in the dollar amount of this contract.

* Resolution No. 559 - Approved the increase in engineering fees by the consultant on a contract for the construction of storm drains and appurtenances on Convent Rd., Syosset. These changes were necessitated by the need to relocate concrete monuments as a result of realignment of roads.

* Resolution No. 560 - Approved the increase of engineering fees by the consultant on the contract to construction of storm drains and appurtenances on Railroad Ave. and adjacent areas in Syosset. These changes were needed because of the realignment of roads in the area.

* Resolution No. 561 - Approved the change order on the contract for the reconstruction of the tennis courts at Marjorie Post Park. It was necessary to change the base of the courts.

* Resolution No. 562 - Approved the change on the contract for the rehabilitation of Plainview-Old Bethpage Pools, Plainview for the installation of 3/4 sound conduits for the wiring for the sound equipment.

* Resolution No. 566 - Approved the appointment of Buddy Mazzara from Bethpage to fill the position of Dr. Charles Artale as a member of the Town Board of Zoning Appeals.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Town Board will take place on July 9.

Violations Must Be Corrected By Aug. 1



After being granted five court postponements, the court has set Thursday, Aug. 1 as the last day that you will see these large trailers on the Remington Building Products, Inc. property on Andrews Road in Hicksville. By a reliable count, there has been between 180 and 200 of these trailers parked on this property most of the time.

This property is zoned for H-Light Industry, but, as can be seen by these pictures, a tremendous number of trailers are parked, not only against the homes in the adjacent residential areas, but also, right up against a Town of Oyster Bay Children's Park!

Also, it is alleged that unknown people have broken into some of these illegally-stored trailers and mattresses, chairs,

even curtains, have been discovered in more than one trailer!

Many local civic activists have been working for over two years to correct this rapidly-deteriorating industrial site which was previously occupied by General Instrument and McKesson & Robbins.

Present owners have recently employed a landscaper to fix one small circle and have promised to bring the equally dilapidated building up to its past neat, clean appearance, in the near future.

After Thursday, Aug. 1, which is the last date for the removal of all these trailers, should they not comply, fines of \$500 a day plus \$25.00 additional for each remaining trailer will be assessed against Remington.

Mower Safety Is A Must

Last year over 62,000 persons were injured in lawn mower accidents. Many of these injuries were burns caused by careless use of the mower. The Plainview Volunteer Fire Department suggests that you follow these safety tips before using or cleaning your mower.

1. Do not smoke while fueling lawn mowers. Gasoline is explosive.
2. Wait for machines to cool before refueling. Wipe up spilled fuel immediately. Never fuel a running mower.

3. Store and pour gasoline carefully and keep it in an approved container with a tight-fitting lid.

4. Check electric mower cords for frayed or damaged spots. Frayed insulation added to a metal mower, damp or wet grass, can cause lethal shocks or severe electrical burns.

5. Leave blade sharpening and electric repairs to professionals.

6. If you do your own cleaning and tune-up; dis-

connect the spark plug or remove it before beginning. If a blade is turned by hand, the mower can start if the spark plug is still intact.

7. Never leave the mower

without turning it off. It takes only a few seconds to run inside and only a few seconds for the mower to run over someone and cause serious injury.

PERPETUAL CARE

Some cemeteries include in the price of a plot or crypt a charge for its perpetual care. Others charge a separate fee. This money goes into what is called an endowment care fund, which is placed in trust. Its earnings are used to maintain the grounds or mausoleums in perpetuity.

Some states require such funding by law. A prospective buyer should ascertain whether the funds in the cemetery under consideration are sufficient to maintain the plot or crypt. In many cases, a state agency is responsible for the proper administration of the trust fund, and a buyer can check with the appropriate agency (the com-

tary may be able to inform buyers which agency governs this fund) about the provisions for endowment care of cemetery property being considered.

If perpetual care is optional, a buyer should inspect grave sites with and without the special care to determine whether it is worth a premium.
