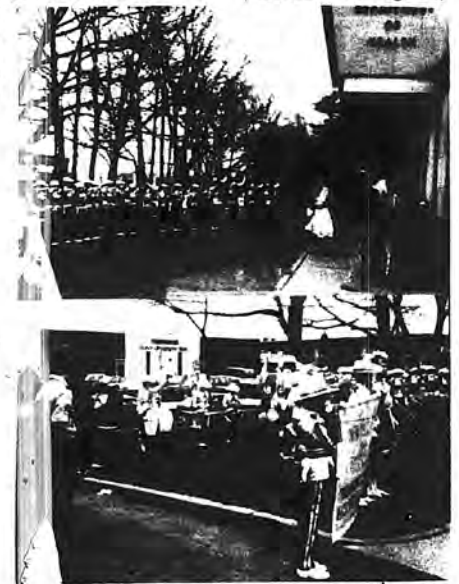

## More Good News

On June 18 the Oyster Bay Town Board authorized two home rule messages to be sent to the NY State legislature in support of legislation which would permit the creation of a Town-wide sanitation disposal district and also allow the Town to refund tax monies saved since the Town has avoided shipping Oyster Bay residents' refuse off of Long Island. As soon as the State Legislature approves the necessary legislation, the Town will be able to refund these tax monies. "Simply stated," Supervisor Colby told us, "if this legislation is passed, the Town will be able to refund the money if the DEC Commissioner approves our requested temporary landfill extension. If the extension is denied, the Town will apply any portion of money which may be left after a shipping contract has been awarded to its next Town budget." Sounds reasonable to us.

# Record Breaking Blood Drive At Hicksville Post Office

"Life is Worth Fighting For - Give Blood" is the theme of this year's blood drive conducted by the Long Island Blood Services of Melville.

"We know we can count on the Hicksville Post Office to come through for their neighbors who need blood," said Steve Brady of L.I. Blood Services. "This year through the cooperation of Manager/Postmaster Roger Nienaber and the coordination of Postal Blood Drive Coordinator, Rolf Huebner, we were able to increase the Hicksville Post Office blood donations by 31% to 265 pints. This is a remarkable achievement since Hicksville was already the largest post office blood drive on Long Island.

Over 600 pints of blood are needed daily for the patients of Long Island's 41 hospitals. However, this goal is not easily met because most Long Islanders are not aware of how important it is to donate blood. To make up the deficit, about one-third of our area's total supply must be collected from volunteer donor centers in Europe where there is a surplus of healthy voluntary blood.

Rolf Huebner summarized the need very well in the following words he gave to each postal donor.

Tomorrow - Some leukemia victim is going to get his white blood cells.

Tomorrow - Some hemophiliac is going to get his platelets.

Tomorrow - Some burn victim is going to get his plasma.

Tomorrow - Some person is going to have that operation.

Tomorrow - Some accident victim is going to live.

Tomorrow - These people are going to make it.

Because.....

Today - You said "Yes"

Today - You gave your blood

Today - You cared enough!

Yesterday's commitment became today's reality and will be tomorrow's hope for someone.

My thanks to you all on behalf of all the unknown lives you have brightened. No just the lives of those who will receive this blood, but also of their families. May God bless each and every one of you.

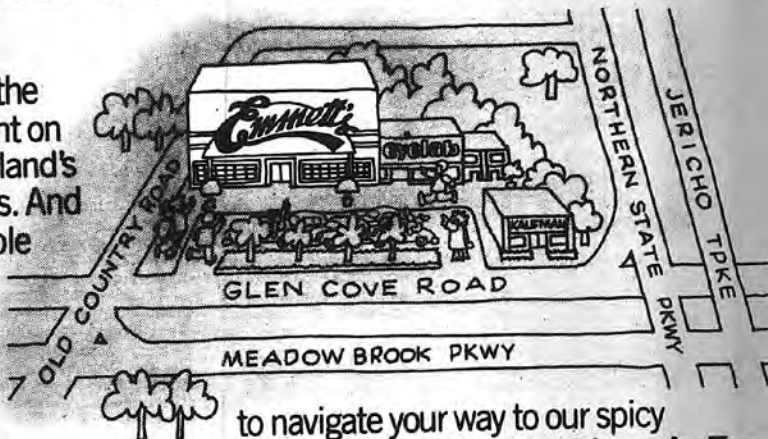

## LOVE CASTS OUT FEAR

"So we know and believe the love God has for us. God is love, and he who abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him. In this is love perfected with us, that we may have confidence for the day of judgment, because as he is so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear." I John 4:16-18a

Believe it or not, psychologists now list and have names for some 700 phobias. No one is really immune, everyone fears something at some time or another. These phobias range from arachibutyrophobia, the fear of getting peanut butter stuck to the roof of the mouth, to phobophobia, the fear of fear. Most of our fears are more commonplace. We are often fearful that something might happen to a loved one, lose our job, break up with a spouse, boyfriend, girlfriend. We fear that we might fail in some way; a test, as a parent, at a job. When we are ill, we fear that we might have something terribly wrong with us. Mostly, we fear that we might fail in some way; no one wants to be a failure.

When we analyze fear, we discover that fear, to a large

extent, is a self-centered emotion. Fearful, we have a heightened awareness of ourself. The cure for much that we fear can be affected by the removal of the external threats to the self. We can stop eating peanut butter. We can avoid people who might hurt us again, etc. A better solution to fear is to eliminate this excessive consciousness of self—our self-centeredness. Love helps us do this, for the essence of love is self-denial and self-surrender. Love makes us outgoing, willing to seize life, to extend ourselves to God and his people. Our love is love not regulated by another's response, but our love loves as a response to God's loving us. For our fear is an indication of imperfect love.

How do we get perfect, fearless love? Join God's union. For God's union with us made possible by Christ's death and resurrection and the faith created in our lives by the ministry of the Holy Spirit. Through the Word of God and the Sacraments, the Holy Spirit enters our lives and creates faith which unites us with God. The gift of the Spirit of God is motivated by God's love for all humankind.

Abiding in the love of

God does not even fear death. Greet each new day as a gift from God, another day of life to be appreciated, enjoyed, shared to its fullest. We will begin to appreciate things like a trace of a smile on someone's face, the laughter of children, a ray of sunlight — these are the beautiful moments of a lifetime. We commit the past to God. We can't change the past, but we can certainly ruin the present by worrying about the future. Learn to leave the past to the mercy of God; the present to His love, and the future to His safekeeping. There is no place for fear in the heart that is filled full of the Lord. For in God even our physical death is but a pause before we are together with the Lord in paradise. Sure we all have our share of heartaches and problems, but we can be confident in meeting these experiences. Abiding in God we meet them together. We trust in the power of God's love — a love that accepted and saved you and me, one that compels us to forgive as we are forgiven, a love that casts out fear.
